## Routine Business Items Cleared At Commissioner's Court Meeting

Routine business items, such as
approval of outstanding bill for payment, were disposed of in regular monthly session of Commissioner's Court, Monday. Total expenditures came to $\$ 13,026.79$. Fines collected during July totaled $\$ 6,566.50$, a percent of which goes to the state. The county's share amounted to $\$ 5,045.00$. Most o the fines were for speeding. Total outstanding delinquent taxes due ar this time come to $\$ 13,235.00$. Or is amount, the county's share is $\$ 6,249.45$; $\$ 5,906.80$; and Hospital District, $\$ 1,078.75$. Most of the county's revenue comes from tax November and December. The court was informed by Judge Billy Whitaker, that Dickens County is raising its budget, and that the cost of keeping prisoners in the Dickens County iail would be increased from the current $\$ 30.00$ per day that is charged. "The increase could bring the cost to as much as $\$ 100.00$ per day per prisoner,"
Judge Whitaker said. Since the Motley County iail is no longer in use, local prisoners have been confined in the Dickens facility However, there are other
neighboring options to be considered the judge said considered, the judge said. four to six prisoners per month according to Sheriff Alton according to Sheriff Alton
Marshall.
