## Matador Ranch Families Participate In Ranching Heritage Program

"Family Reunion" was the theme for Ranch Day 1985 on September 21, at Texas Tech's Ranching Heritage Center in Lubbock, but welcomed rain could have been reason enough for celebrating when Johnny Stevens, the last ranch manager of the Lower Matador of the Matador Land & Cattle Co., Ltd., and Mr. and Mrs. Steve Stevens and Ashley represented the Matador Ranch Office building, talking with visitors about the ranch once owned by a Scottish syndicate. To add an unusual touch, bag pipe players dressed in their clan's bright plaid kilts played "Amazing Grace" from the porch of the ranch office as history enthusiasts toured the 14-acre living history museum.

The bonneted Mrs. Harold Campbell read H.H. Campbell's 1891 Farewell Address to the Matador Ranch cowboys. This was read at the conclusion of a sampler of the historical drama, God's Country, produced by the Crosby County Sesquicentennial Committee. The scene featured in the morning presentation was "The Postmaster's Episode" which depicted a run-in of Aunt Hank Smith with the postal inspector.

Later in the afternoon, a sketch, "Getting Ready," depicted Rollie Burns, Van

Leonard, and other cowboys spiffing up for the year's big social event, a dance. Author Pat Brown of the Pioneer Historical Museum in Crosbyton is credited with bringing the history of Crosby County to life. Area residents will eagerly look forward to the Labor Day 1986 presentation in the Blanco Canyon Amphitheatre, near the ruins of the old Hank Smith House.

Old Matador hand Ben Loe of Spur was on hand to greet visitors to the Matador Half-Dugout originally from the Red Lake Line Camp near Roaring Springs. In 1936-37 Loe, then about 16, spent the winters feeding cottonseed cake to the Matador cattle, and the summers rustling (looking after rather than stealing) horses and doctoring screw-worms. He recalled the half-dugout was home to himself and eight other cowboys, and a pretty cozy one at that.

Though many of the planned outdoor activities were curtailed by the rain, those inside including spinning and weaving, making corn husk dolls, autographing of books by guest authors, with the art show and barbeque continued as planned.

The MC Mavericks were defeated 30-6 by a strong Crowell Jr. High football team last Thursday in Crowell.

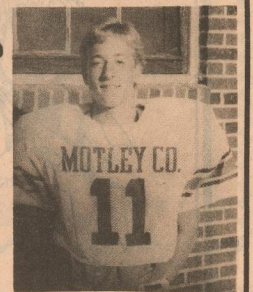

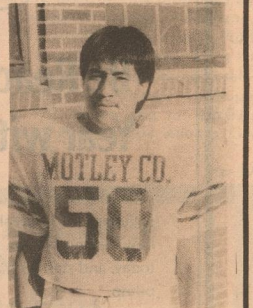
The MC Matadors continued to show improvement in their battle with heavily favored Amherst Friday night. The two teams slugged it out trying to gain an advantage over the other.

MC is open this Friday and will travel to Chillicothe next Friday, Oct. 4, 1985 to take on the Chillicothe Eagles.

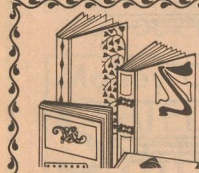
### Cross Country

Last Thursday, four players faced the rains--and braved the elements, managing to play between showers--before the downpour started.

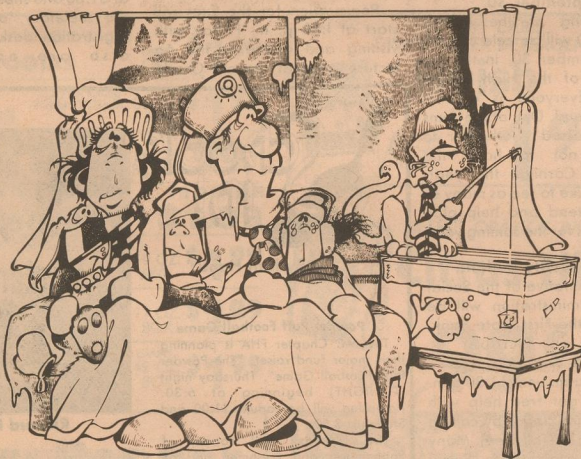
Olivia, Louise, Geneva and La Voe played, with Louise winning the ball--getting closest to the pin on No. 6.

## County Agent's Corner

### 4-H Beef, Swine Programs Offers Valuable Skills

4-H members can gain basic skills in animal production and marketing through beef, sheep and swine projects.

These projects offer learning skills and living experiences as well as a host of opportunities for education and exploration.

Specific objectives of programs in beef, sheep and swine are these:

1. To learn basic principles of animal science by owning, caring for and keeping records on one or more head of livestock.
2. To demonstrate a knowledge of sound breeding, feeding and management practices.

3. To identify types and grades of animals and fleece and employ efficient marketing methods.
4. To develop integrity, sportsmanship, decision making ability and public speaking skills through participation in demonstrations, tours, judging

and exhibits.

5. To learn the value of scientific research in its influence upon animals and the meat and fiber industries.

6. To identify quality in wholesale and retail cuts of animals and animal products and understand their relationship to management practices.

7. To improve management skills to increase wool production and fiber quality (sheep program).

4-H youth who excel in these programs have an opportunity to capture a host of awards, including County or State Stock Show premiums, scholarships, and trips to the National 4-H Congress supported by Clayton W. Williams, Jr., the Independent Cattleman's Association of Texas, the Texas Sheep and Goat Raiser's Association, and the Texas Pork Producers.

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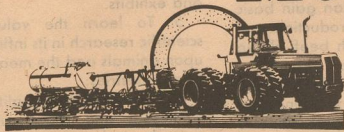
