# Soil Stewardship Week 



## 50 Years Of Conservation

The year 1985 marks the 50th<br>nation for all generations to anniversary of America's Soil movement. It was in 1935, during the midst of the "dust bowl days" that Congress and Hugh Hat Congress and Hugh Soil Erosion Service. Now called the Soil Conservation Service, the birthday of an agency; it is a milestone in a voluntary conservation program that has involved more than two million farmers, ranchers and othe land users.

The effect of the conservation novement has touched the live States, both in directly United States, borh directly and practice pachice conservarion and stewardship of the soil so that a and fiber may remain just such a worse economic crisis to ever face the American farmer and rancher, he realizes that conservation of the natural resources is vital to not only his existence.
The Upper Pease Soil and Water Conservation District, founded originally in 1944, joins the Golden Anniversary of the conservation movement and urges all local farmers, ranchers and residents of Motley County co support soil and water Board W.H. Marshall states "As important as the last 50 years of conservation have been to the nation, they are not near as important as the next fifty years." The soil and water must be protected for future generations.

## Rangeland Recovery <br> By Joel Hol

The weather of the last few rangeland in poor condition and
many of the important native grasses in low vigor. Now is the time to give these grasses a rest so they can begin to recover to heir once productive state.
The Soil Conservation service can help you develop. planned grazing system that will give these grasses the rest they planned grazing system? planned grazing system? managing rangeland so it is grazed and then rested in a planned sequence. Why does this work? Livestock are selective in the plants they graze. They tend to repeatedly graze the desirable and leave the less desired plants. This is often called "spot grazing" which weakens the more desirable
plants and allows unwanted plants and allows unwanted
p'ants to thrive and multiply. $F^{\prime}$ ants to thrive and multiply.
Grazing and resting plants in a planned sequence gives the better plants a chance to regrow, compete and multiply,
thus gradually increasing the
amount of high quality plants available per acre.
Deferred grazing and brush your rangeland recover faster from the last couple of years. With the early moisture we have received, this is looking like an excellent year to spray mesquite. By deferring the pastures that
are sprayed, the grasses can make good growth and recovery from the moisture and sunlight that will be released when the mesquite has been controlled. Remember the best times to
spray for maximum root kill is 42 63 days and $72-84$ days after bud break. This year bud break was during the first week in April. Make sure soil temperature at 12-18 inches are at $75^{\circ}$ or above.

Planned grazing systems and timely brush control are just a few of the management items that can help rangeland in a more productive condition. If you these items, Conservation Service in the Motley County Courthouse.

The hottest item going in conservation of cropland is residue. This controls wind
