Matador Remembers 'That Day'

On May 1, Matador will be extremely conscious of the fact that one year ago on that date we suffered a devastating tornado.

As a community we pulled together to help each other. Everyone raked and hauled. Church ladies cooked and did baby sitting. Out-of-towners poured in to lend a hand.

Our city, county and school officials worked hard to gain grants to rebuild homes and our school. Although they exceeded themselves in effort, no grant for our school was available. So independent and proud Motley County voted bonds and will take pride in their new school next year.

Many tales of that infamous day will be told for years to come by our local residents.

In remembering that day, here are a few reminiscences:

Renee Burns

Renee Burns remembers thinking that a tornado would never happen here! She heard the siren sound and as she and daughter, Leah, went to her husband's pickup, Renee remembers seeing the tornado and felt very panicky knowing this time it was for real. The cellar the Burns were in had a two-way radio. The radio announced that

the school had been hit. At that moment Renee knew her home was gone because it was located directly behind the school. Renee was right.

Greta Smallwood

Greta Smallwood, daughter Debbie Haralson and granddaughter, Jennifer found cover in the basement of the Bob Jamesons. There were other neighbors at the same place. Greta recalls everyone visiting and not hearing the storm. As they exited the basement, everything around seemed orderly and this group had not even visualized the destruction which had occurred less than a block away. As they attempted to go home, Greta's first sign of the tornado was some downed electric wires. At that sight, it became apparent what had occurred.

Syd Pipkin

Syd Pipkin, whose home was completely destroyed, looks back on the past year with much difficulty. She and her family were in the closet of their home when the storm came. Daughter Amy had just returned from a UIL contest in which she competed in storytelling. Syd remembers trying to speak above all the noise of the storm saying, "Amy, tell me your story!" She wanted

to hear her daughter's voice. "The sounds of glass breaking and tearing up of walls", Mrs. Pipkin recalls was horrifying. This has been a hard year for the

Pipkin family thinking back on how close they were to physical harm. Mrs. Pipkin says not only did her family suffer a loss but also the former owners of the

house which had been in the family until the Pipkin's purchase.

Billie Dean & Joe Smith

Billie Dean and Joe Smith were in their restaurant when the tornado approached although they immediately went to the courthouse. Reflecting, Joe says, "It was bigger than anything I had seen - but like a train coming down the tracks, after it goes by, it doesn't look near as big."

Shane Jones

Shane Jones and her mother Helen Stevens were painting at the Matador Variety which Shane and her sister, Sandra, had recently purchased. When they became aware that a tornado was near, they went to the Steven's home west of town for shelter. After the tornado passed, they came up out of the cellar and Shane recalls

watching the storm hit Matador and hearing the sounds of breaking glass. Johnny Stevens, her dad, was making accurate speculation as to what was being hit. They turned to go get in the pickup just to find that the Steven's garage had been demolished.

Arrie Aulick

Arrie Aulick is a 'homebound' Senior Citizen who requires a walker. She remembers being scared and praying that we all would not be blown away. Mrs. Aulick also remembers the concern her neighbor, Johnny Phillips, showed by coming to get her to go to his cellar although she chose to stay in the hall of her home. Mrs. Aulick house is

located about a block from where the destruction was.

SPAG Declares April 21-27 Severe Weather Awareness Week For The SOUTH PLAINS

An official communication and statistical report from the U.S. Department of Commerce, National Oceanic and Atmospheric Administration, National Weather Service, Lubbock Forecast Office was sent to SPAG officials and members. This information was contributed by Bill Hand.

This communique emphasized the necessity of the warnings of severe weather given by spotters, DPS and others. It also stated that plans both local, county and area wide for these warnings were indispensable.

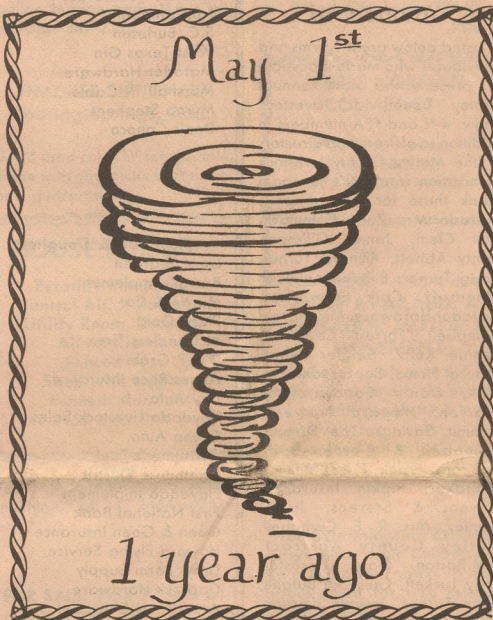
Awareness is a must to be promoted by news media, weather services and government officials.

SPAG declared April 21 - 27 as Severe Weather Awareness Week for the South Plains.

The communique further stated: **As all of you know Matador was devastated by a tornado last year. However, it is not surprising no one was killed and only one person suffered minor injuries...the awareness and warning plan for Matador worked...all good plans work and lives are saved.**

What About The School?

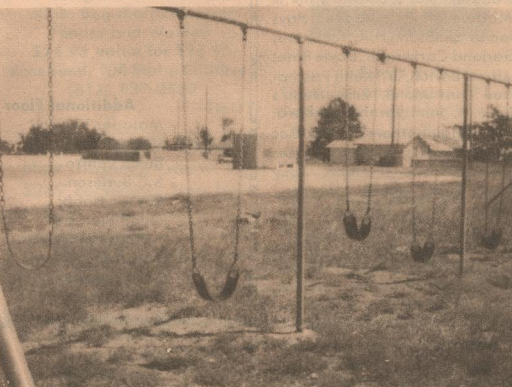


This pile of rubble was all that was left of Motley County School at daybreak, May 2nd, 1984. (Photo by Mary Renfro)

postoffice beginning Saturday morning. For your convenience the old postoffice will remain open through the weekend so that all old boxes may be vacated.

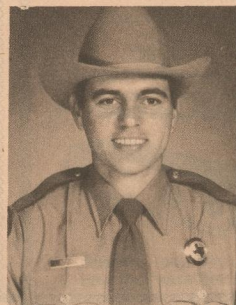
On Monday, April 29, all mail and all services will be in the new postoffice only.

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The Tornado Of '84

Matador has its tales to tell. Our heritage, the ranches and even the jail. Now there will have to be one more - It's the terrible tornado of '84.

"Where did you go? What were you doing? Did you realize a storm was a-brewing?"

At Grandma Stanley's a group took cover. With four minutes warning, we were happy to holler. A mortician, two nurses, farmers and families Plus children, puppies, babies and daddies.

Have you seen the schoolhouse today? The wind levelled it like a stack of hay. They say the old building of solid brick Might have withstood the forceful licks. But what's the use to speculate. What happened, happened on that date. "Does this mean no school today?" "Yes, son, you are free to play."

Pipkins house is hit real hard. The porch and roof are now in the yard. Addie Murphy got under a table. The story of her rescue reads like a fable. The new postmistress had just moved in. Her house was destroyed from end to end. The Dicksons were out of town that night. What greeted them was a dismal sight. Ricky Lawrence sought his family in the basement of a church.

They weren't there. He found himself in a lurch. The door was locked and he was trapped. In the stairwell as about him limbs snapped. The block across from the school Housed a Green, a Paschall, a HoGland, a Wallace. Nothing was left to be seen but a stool. The sight - oh, how it shocked and stunned all of us.

Block after block, the destruction was awesome. But with all the debris, there still were some blossoms. The Methodists and Catholics joined together to cook To feed the homeless, the workers and even some who came to look. The Methodist ladies even did baby sitting Which seemed awfully nice and very fitting.

As if from nowhere, we had the Highway Patrol To protect us from looters. The H.P. took control. The Salvation Army was on hand to serve. The Red Cross provided help to those who deserved.

Neighbors grabbed a broom to help sweep. Everyone was too busy to even weep. People came from out of town And worked from dawn to dusk. We saw no frowns.

May Day, '84 will be remembered by all. In Matador's history, a black day will be recalled. But as we work together and stand tall as a town History will record that with tragedy we found New love for our neighbors As we rebuild our town.

BIRDHOUSES FROM TRASH

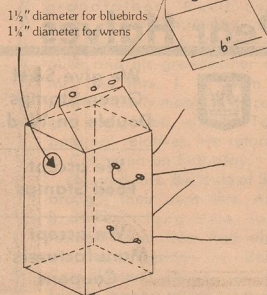
Don't throw your empty milk cartons in the trash. You can make a neat house for wrens from two quart-sized cartons. And you can build a house for bluebirds, tree swallows, or other larger birds with two half-gallon-sized cartons.

Cut an entrance hole about four inches below the pouring end of a carton as shown in the drawing below. Poke four holes in the back of the carton. Then reach inside and run wire through the holes for mounting. Poke holes in the bottom (floor) for drainage, then close up the top.

To make a roof, cut a piece from two sides of another carton. (The corner can be the peak of your roof.) Make sure that the roof is long enough (about six inches long for a half-gallon house) so that there will be an overhang to shelter the entrance hole.

Fold the roof over the top of the box and hold it in place. With an ice pick, poke holes through both the roof and the top flaps of the box. Push a brass fastener through each hole and attach tightly. A dab of white glue under each side of the roof will help keep it in place in a strong wind.

Wrap the wires around a tree or post, making sure the top of the carton tilts toward you. That will help keep the birds snug and dry when it rains.



Library Receives J. Frank Dobie Trust Award

The Awards Committee of the J. Frank Dobie Library Trust has awarded the Motley County Library a grant for the purchase of books in the amount of \$4,000.

Sam G. Whitten, Chairman of the Awards Committee, stated in a recent letter to the Library Board, **There were many deserving libraries among the more than 20 applications we received and the decisions were very difficult. We congratulate you that among so many good applications, yours was outstanding.**

The check for \$4,000 will be presented at the membership meeting of the Texas Library Association Conference in Dallas on April 26. Library Board Chairman, Mrs. Frank Potts, will be on hand to receive the check. Mrs. Potts who wrote the grant application was assisted by the comprehensive statistics, information, and reports that Librarian Mrs. Robin Darsey keeps as a matter of record.

In an interview Mrs. Potts stated, **With this grant our financial needs for book-buying money has eased, but our need for increased space to house our growing collection is emphasized.**

Due to the lack of space to expand in the otherwise excellent downtown location, Librarian Darsey is culling those books that are older or

in bad condition or not checked out enough to warrant keeping them on the

shelf. These books will go into storage until more shelf space can be managed. This culling, with the addition of the new books from the grant money, will improve the overall quality of the library while keeping the number of volumes available for checkout about the same.

As specified in the grant application, the award grant will be used primarily to upgrade the children's non-fiction, adult non-fiction and biography, and Texana collections. The set of Encyclopaedia Britannica which was originally included in the application has been purchased with other contributions from foundations and Friends of the Library donations.

The awarding of this grant exemplifies the faith that others have in Motley County Library and will spur us to make our library the best it can be. We are very appreciative of support of the county commissioners and school board in paying our day-to-day bills, the American Legion for the unselfish use of their building, and our over 800 registered patrons for their support and continued interest.

Club Hears Rape Prevention Speakers

GFWC Eternas Junior Study Club met at the Methodist Parlor on April 18 for their monthly meeting.

Guest speakers were Mrs. Frances Sams and Mrs. Norriene Owens from the Hale County Rape Crisis in Plainview. Mrs. Sams and Mrs. Owens informed us that the center is a group of citizens who have organized to provide support and counseling to victims and their families, that rape is not a selective crime. It happens on streets, in cars, in schools, in parks and in alleys. The rapist has no regard for age, race or social status. Only a few years ago rape was one of the least reported crimes of violence. Today rape is the fastest rising violent crime in our country.

It is so important that all of our children (boys as well as girls) learn that their bodies belong to them and that they can say **NO** to any adult who tries to harm their bodies.

The national statistics indicate that one out of four girls is sexually molested before age eighteen and one out of seven boys is victimized by age

eighteen. In 85% of reported child sexual abuse cases, the abuser is someone known to the child - most often a family member. So when a child tells you that someone has forced him or her, believe your child. Children seldom lie about sexual abuse. Reassure the child that he or she is not responsible for what happened.

While driving never pick up hitchhikers, keep car doors locked at all time. Before entering your car, look into the back seat and always have your keys ready to unlock the car door and enter without delay.

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Local Irishman gives account of St. Patrick's Day celebrations

(Editor's Note: This article was in the Floyd County Hesperian prior to St. Patrick's day. Father Burke is the priest of Our Lady of Guadalupe Catholic Church in Matador.)

St. Patrick's Day is coming up and what better way to celebrate it than with a real honest-to-goodness Irishman. Father Terry Burke, of the St. Mary Magdalen Catholic Church in Floydada is straight from Waterford in the Republic of Ireland.

Father Terry sees a big difference in the way St. Patrick's Day is celebrated here and in Ireland. When asked if they drink green beer in Ireland, Father Terry laughed and said, "No, they don't drink green beer because all the bars are closed. It's a national holiday in Ireland, sort of a combination Memorial Day and Independence Day. There are big parades in honor of patriots who were killed in the struggle for Independence from the British. The parades usually end up in the cemeteries of the slain patriots, where there is a 21 gun salute."

"Instead of wearing green," says Father Terry, "everyone tries to have the biggest spray of shamrock on their shoulder. Some people go all over the country gathering shamrock and putting them together to form beautiful decorative sprays. It's the nearest thing to Thanksgiving Day that we have over there. All the families come together and celebrate. It's also a big religious festival with everyone going to church."

No one knows for sure the dates of the birth and death of St. Patrick but it is generally believed that he was born in Britain sometime about 385. His father

was a deacon. About the opening year of the 5th century when Patrick was 16, he was captured by Irish raiders and taken back to Ireland as a slave. For six years he tended to the sheep of his master, with religion becoming the center of his life during this time. At the end of this six years he escaped, making his way 200 miles to the coast and securing passage on a ship manned by Irish pagans. The ship landed in Gaul, and it is believed that his education for priesthood took place on the continent of Europe. It was probably around 432 that he returned to Ireland to try and convert the people to Christianity.

Father Terry told this reporter that there is a lot of tradition and folklore surrounding St. Patrick, but St. Patrick is believed to have converted Ireland from paganism to Christianity. "Every one that was sent to Ireland to preach Christianity before St. Patrick failed, said Father Terry. "Tradition says that after Patrick's escape from Ireland he

had a dream in which the people of Ireland kept calling him to bring Christianity to them. When he came back to Ireland he already knew the customs and traditions of the people, so he was able to communicate with them better. He was a good storyteller and very persuasive. Ireland was very religious at this time, but only in the practice of black magic and the belief in the occult. Even though St. Patrick faced many hardships such as imprisonment and possible death he continued to preach Christianity. He didn't try to convert the common man at first. He first went to the Kings and converted them. From there the first steps toward the people of Ireland practicing Christianity were taken."

Father Terry Burke, who comes from a family of 13, still hasn't lost his Irish accent since coming to Amarillo in 1973. He studied Theology and Scripture in England for eight years before coming to Texas, obtaining degrees in Philosophy and Psychology, Theology and Scripture and Canon law (church law).

"Before being ordained a priest," Father Terry told the Hesperian, "I felt it was necessary for me to travel and work along side other people not involved in Theology study. I needed to

know how the common man related to Jesus in his everyday life, so the church could better relate to them. So I took jobs in factories and construction without telling anyone about my background. I came to Amarillo originally to stay for six months to do some research, and ended up staying here. When I came to Amarillo I started working at St. Mary's Church and was eventually

appointed as the Catholic Chaplain to the Hospital District, and also the Nursing Homes and the Penal Institute in the Diocese of Amarillo. Then in 1981 I came to Floydada."

Father Terry is also the pastor of Matador and Paducah churches and travels constantly serving all areas.

When asked how he likes all this flat land compared to the rolling green hills of Ireland, Father Terry said, "I loved it when I first came. The sky is so beautiful, and you can see forever, it seems like eternity. In Ireland the hills always get in the way and you can't see that far. I sort of miss the hills now that I've been away for a few years, but I know I'd miss this land too if I couldn't be around it for awhile. You tend to take what you have for granted and fail to appreciate all the beauty around you wherever you are."
