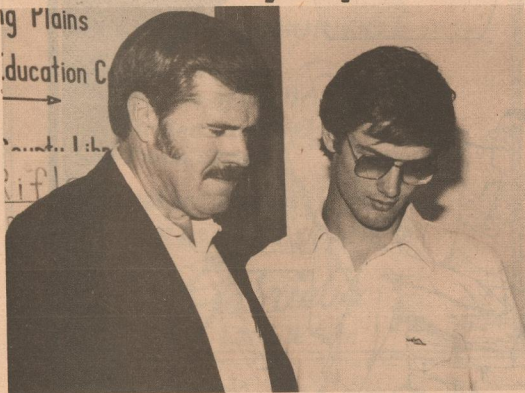

Paul Block, a Junior of Motley County High School, and Mr. Ron Richards, Science Teacher with MCISD, have been chosen to attend the 25th Annual Energy Science Symposium at The University of Texas in Austin, June 4th-7th.

WTU will pay all expenses for 28 students and teachers from their service area to attend the week-long Symposium in June. "I think the Science Symposium offers WTU a wonderful opportunity to assist in the advancement of scientific knowledge in our public schools," said Jesse Turner, WTU Matador local manager.

The Symposium is jointly sponsored by the Texas Atomic Energy Research Foundation and The University of Texas. West Texas Utilities is one of the sponsoring companies in the Foundation.

Paul Block and Ron Richards will be among the four hundred high school science students and teachers throughout the state who have been selected to attend the sessions in Austin. 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County Agent's Corner

A drip irrigation system can be the answer to growing plenty of quality vegetables during dry weather.

Such a system applies water to the soil at the center of the row with great precision and economy. It's possible to reduce water usage in a garden by more than 50 percent with a well-designed drip system.

Drip irrigation involves a system of plastic pipes with tiny openings called emitters which deliver water, drop by drop, into the soil at the base of plants along the row. The water soaks in immediately when the rate of irrigation is adjusted correctly. No water is wasted because there is neither flooding nor runoff.

Home barden drip systems operate at low pressure—4 to 10 pounds per square inch of tubing. Most gardeners quickly learn how often and how long to operate their drip systems to satisfy their plant's water needs.

Even when a drip system is on, the middles between rows are dry enough to walk on, permitting harvesting and other garden work during irrigation. On the other hand, sprinkler and

furrow-irrigated gardens are too wet to walk in for a day or two after each irrigation.

Drip-irrigated plants are more productive, and water is not sprayed over the leaves as with sprinkler irrigation, thus reducing disease problems. Soil is not waterlogged as with furrow irrigation, so more oxygen is available to plant roots at all times. The entire soil surface can be mulched without interfering with irrigation; this stops moisture loss by evaporation.

At the current rates for city water, savings in water cost alone can pay for a drip system in less than two growing seasons. A homeowner using furrow irrigation on a 1,000 square foot garden twice weekly for a month in midsummer applies about 10,000 gallons of water. That amount could be cut in half with a drip irrigation system. Thus, over a full season of gardening, water savings can be substantial.

Drip irrigation system costs vary widely but are reasonable for the home gardener. A system can last for 4 to 10 years,

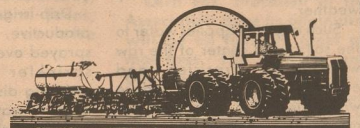
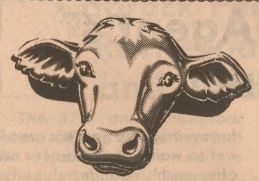

Program Features Texas Women For GFWC El Progreso Club

The role of Texas women in the development of community life in hundreds of towns and cities, making life worth living for millions of Texans was the featured theme of a Texas Heritage program given for GFWC El Progreso Club last week.

Meeting at the ranch home of Mrs. Harold Campbell, Thursday, April 25, the club heard a most interesting paper given by the president, Mrs. Robert M. Dickson, detailing accomplishments and contributions made by Texas women as the state grew.

Mrs. Dickson called the meeting to order and minutes were read by Mrs. W.F. McCaghen, in the absence of the secretary, Mrs. Joe Campbell. A full report of the GFWC/TFWC convention April 18-20, was given by Mrs. Harold Campbell, who, with Mrs. Dickson attended the meeting in Dallas. Both ladies serve on committees in the Texas Federation of Women's Clubs. GFWC El Progreso Club won club honors and Mrs. Dickson, individual honors at the convention.

In her introduction to the program, Mrs. Dickson gave credit to the Institute of Texan Cultures, a department of the University of Texas in San Antonio for the material on Texas Women.

"They (the women) wanted entire communities to experience beauty, education, culture, nature, history and religion and they acted to get what they wanted by creating, enhancing and preserving institutions, buildings and traditions," she said. All this, she pointed out, involved building cities, homes, churches, schools, museums, libraries and parks. "Men joined in the projects, but the women led," she asserted.

Among women's early organizations were the Texas Federation of Women's Clubs,

organized in 1897; The Texas Federation of Colored Women's Clubs, set up in 1905, which played a major role in enhancing the lives of black Texans; and Mexican-American women who were involved in similar activities in service organizations such as the auxiliaries of the League of Latin American Citizens (LULAC).

Women's clubs organized 85% of Texas libraries started before 1950, Mrs. Dickson said. "The goal of Texas Federation of Women's Clubs was to have a free library in every county in Texas.

Texas women founded the hospitals of Texas—many of them members of Roman Catholic orders and prompted by the leadership of nuns; and that women started schools at every level. "Before 1870 the only schools which provided quality education for women were the private female academies."

"The worlds of literature, fashion, sports, entertainment, art and drama felt the impact of Texas Women," Mrs. Dickson pointed out.

We have just scratched the surface of the history of the Texas women," Mrs. Dickson concluded. "But it is not finished. True, you've 'come a long way baby,'—BUT Texas women, we still have a long way to go."

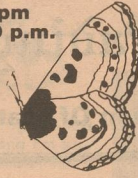
