Grim War Sequence Is Briefed for Lions

Accident is Fatal To L. H. Clifton, 76

PIONEER RESIDENT Louis H. Clifton, 76, of Roaring Springs, died about 10 a. m. Tuesday in Traweeck Hospital, as result of a freak accident on Farm to Market Highway 1045, about 2 1/2 miles east of Buzz Field airport. The tragedy which resulted from the confusing light at about 6:30 Monday evening, involved a cotton trailer being struck by an automobile.

The car was driven by Mrs. Clyde Clifton, Mr. Clifton's daughter-in-law, Mrs. Maudie, 13, was critically injured in the impact. He was rushed to Methodist Hospital in Lubbock where an emergency surgery was performed Tuesday morning.

Cattle Testing Started

Deputy Steadham Conway, who investigated the accident with State Highway Patrol said a neighbor, Fred Dawson, had pulled a bale of cotton out of the field for Mr. Clifton. Two pickups were parked off of the road and it is assumed that one would be hitched to the cotton to take it to the gin. The cotton had been unhitched from the tractor when the lights of a car were observed from the west. Mr. Dawson told Mr. Clifton to step behind the trailer until the car passed.

Shortly afterwards the car driven by Mrs. Clyde Clifton approached from the east. Probably in the confusion of lights and the difficult twilight at that hour, Mrs. Clifton struck the trailer. Tongue of the trailer whipped around and struck Mr. Clifton, knocking him down, and under the load of cotton he suffered a broken collar bone, internal injuries and shock.

Funeral services were held Wednesday in Roaring Springs First Baptist Church at 2:30 p. m. Rev. Gene Hawkins, Baptist pastor here officiated, assisted by Rev. Jess Terry of Enochs, Texas. Interment was made in Matador East Mound Cemetery under the direction of Eudy-Seale Funeral Home. Pallbearers were Junior Bearden, Clyde Williams, Dean McInroe, Earl Osborn, Billy Hand and Bill Palmer.

Mr. Clifton was born August 25, 1864 in Young County, Texas and moved to the Motley County area with his parents in 1895. He was married to Miss Esther Collett, Oct. 29, 1911 at Roaring Springs before the townsite was founded and they had made their home in the adjoining community of Teepee Flat since that time. He was a member of the Baptist Church. He died November 1, 1960 at the age of 76 years, 2 months and 6 days.

He is survived by his wife, four daughters, Mrs. James Renfro, Matador; Mrs. Elbert Terry, Matador; Mrs. Edward Bartley, Tahoka; Mrs. Bill Rainbolt, Nocona; four sons: Clayton of San Manuel, Ariz.; Clyde of Roaring Springs; K. J. of Clovis, N. M.; and L. H. Jr. of Olton, 17 grandchildren; four brothers, George Clifton, Amarillo; Walter and Emmitt of Portales, N. M.; and Ben Clifton of Costa Mesa, Calif.; and two sisters, Mrs. W. E. Bowen of Roswell, N. M. and Mrs. Tommie Graves, Amarillo.

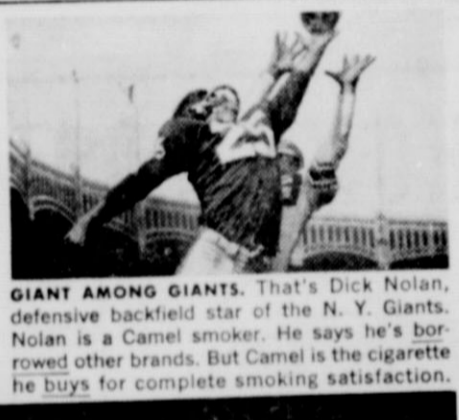



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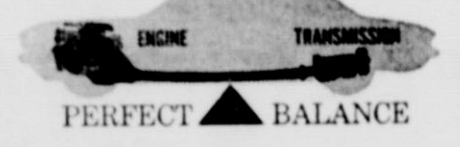
