Motley County Commissioners met Monday, June 10 at the Motley County Courthouse for their regular monthly meeting. Those present were Commission-Those present were Commissioners Bill Washington, Billy Hand and Joseph (Gid) Simpson, Judge Billy Joe Whitaker and County Clerk Lucretia Campbell. The Motley County annual audit was presented at the beginning of the meeting. Following this, the commissioners reviewed the bills for the

ers reviewed the bills for the month to be paid, totaling approximately \$9,000. Approximately \$491.44 for Approximately \$491.44 for library expenses, approximately \$362.74 for sheriff's office, approximately \$3,372.70 miscellaneous and approximately \$1582 for Precinct I, \$1489.96 Precinct II, \$368.59 Precinct III and \$1253.65 Precinct IV. discussed by the court.

Treasurer's Report, Sheriff's Report, Justice of the Peace Report and Library Report were all given to each commissioner.

Tax Collection Discussed

plans for consolidating the

that if a taxpayer could not be
notified by mail that their name
will be published in the local
newspaper and this would
constitute adequate notification
of delinquent taxes. The group

Some possibilities suggested were checking with the appraisal office, hire new employees or grant overtime for current employees. None of these were definitely decided upon except to check with Forrest Campbell to the generating office to see in the appraisal office to see what records he had that could aid in this matter.

The contract reads that Motley County will pay the law firm 15% of what is collected.
