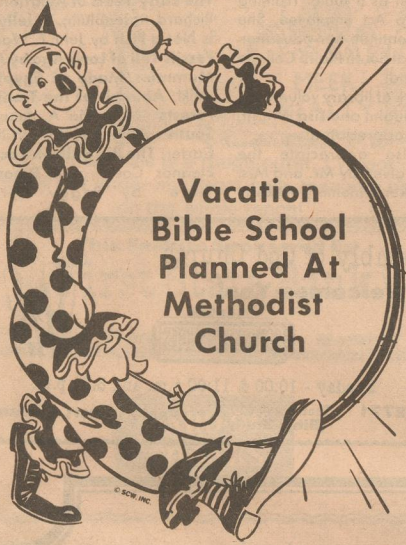

This Week In Commissioners Court

Motley County Commissioners met Monday, June 10 at the Motley County Courthouse for their regular monthly meeting. Those present were Commissioners Bill Washington, Billy Hand and Joseph (Gid) Simpson, Judge Billy Joe Whitaker and County Clerk Lucretia Campbell.

The Motley County annual audit was presented at the beginning of the meeting. Following this, the commissioners reviewed the bills for the month to be paid, totaling approximately \$9,000. Approximately \$491.44 for library expenses, approximately \$362.74 for sheriff's office, approximately \$3,372.70 miscellaneous and approximately \$1582 for Precinct I, \$1489.96 Precinct II, \$368.59 Precinct III and \$1253.65 Precinct IV. Each bill was read aloud and discussed by the court.

Treasurer's Report, Sheriff's Report and Library Report were all given to each commissioner.

Tax Collection Discussed

Mr. Wayne Fincher, Tax Specialist, representing the law firm that Motley County has hired to collect back taxes then addressed the Commissioners Court. Fincher explained the contract read that the tax office will furnish taxing information. Fincher has worked one week with Nell Berryman in the City Office and one week in the courthouse. He gave detailed plans for consolidating the different taxing entities so that collecting could begin.

Fincher went on to explain that if a taxpayer could not be notified by mail that their name will be published in the local newspaper and this would constitute adequate notification of delinquent taxes. The group discussed the situation in detail.

Harry Hamilton, a Lubbock realtor and Matador native son, explained his interest in the tax collecting process. Hamilton stated that agriculture alone cannot support Motley County. In his opinion, we are entering a new era in that Matador itself is

sitting in the center of oil activity which presents great opportunities for us all. The fact that lots (or property) in Matador are so difficult to gain a clear title to, due to these taxes, can be a tremendous problem for long-range benefits for this county. "We all need to be pulling together and working in harmony for this opportunity Matador has but we must clear title on some property," Hamilton concluded.

Commissioners then discussed what it will take to get this information to the law firm. Some possibilities suggested were checking with the appraisal office, hire new employees or grant overtime for current employees. None of these were definitely decided upon except to check with Forrest Campbell in the appraisal office to see what records he had that could aid in this matter.

The contract reads that Motley County will pay the law firm 15% of what is collected.

MHMR Supported

Seth Holbert and Judge Abernathy of Central Plains MHMR in Plainview then came before the commissioners court to give each an annual Sponsorship Report. The report showed that 23 Motley County residents used the center the past year. Long range plans of the MHMR center were discussed. The commissioners approved a \$640 donation to the center which with matching funds will equate to \$4267.00.

Holbert and Abernathy expressed their appreciation to the Commissioners Court for their continued support.

Senior Citizens Building

Mrs. L. B. (Lucretia) Campbell addressed the commissioners concerning the Senior Citizens Building. Judge Whitaker explained that there were still a few detailed loose ends to tie up before the commissioners could approve the building but that it will be soon.

Meeting Concluded

With a few other non-essential discussions and no other new business to be discussed, the court was adjourned.

WTU Sponsors Teacher/Student For UTA Science Symposium

West Texas Utilities sponsored thirty outstanding students and teachers from the WTU service area to attend the 25th Annual Texas Energy Science Symposium at the University of Texas at Austin.

Paul Block, student, and Mr. Ron Richards, science teacher from Matador were among those sponsored by WTU to attend the sessions Tuesday, June 4th, through Friday, June 7th.

The 400 high school science students and teachers chosen from across the state were given the rare opportunity to hear some of the nations' outstanding scientists speak and to observe some of the finest science facilities available.

The Symposium was jointly sponsored by the Texas Atomic

Energy Research Foundation and the University of Texas. West Texas Utilities is one of the sponsoring companies in the Foundation. As a sponsor, West Texas Utilities paid all expenses for the 30 students and teachers from the schools in their service area.

The Foundation was formed for the primary purpose of conducting the worlds first and largest privately financed research effort in the field of nuclear energy. Currently, the Foundation and the University are sponsoring a program in nuclear fusion research aimed at controlling thermonuclear reactions for the production of electric power.

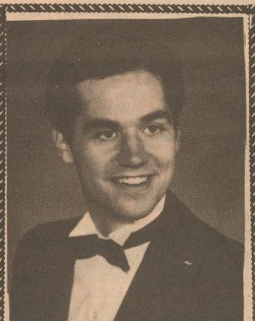
"Tho He slay me, yet will I trust in Him". Job 13:15
