## HEART ATTACK IS FATAL FOR CHAS. S. POSEY

Charlie S. Posey, 50, a former resident of Matador and Roaring Springs, died at 7 a.m. Friday in a Floydada hospital after he had suffered a heart attack late Thursday.

He had lived in Floydada the past year. He died in People's Hospital, where he was taken after being stricken.

Funeral services were held at 2 p.m. Sunday in the First Baptist Church here. Rev. Gene Hawkins, pastor, officiated, assisted by Rev. Bob Moore, pastor of the Roaring Springs First Baptist Church, and Rev. Ed Bowles, pastor of the First Baptist Church, Floydada.

Special music was a solo by Mrs. W. F. Jacobs, who sang, "How Great Thou Art," with piano accompaniment by Miss Roberta Jameson. Organ background music for the service was played by Mrs. John Stevens.

Mr. Posey had been a long-time Baptist deacon, and at the time of his death was a deacon in the Floydada First Baptist Church. He was a 32nd degree Mason.

Burial with Masonic graves rites was in the Roaring Springs Cemetery under the direction of Eudy-Seale Funeral Home.

Nephews were pallbearers: Larry Bell, Virgil Boothe and Lloyd Brawner, all of Lubbock; Curtis Leatherwood, Crosbyton; Don Probasco, Floydada; and W. B. (Son) Watson, Roaring Springs.

**Former County Commissioner**  
While living in Roaring Springs, Mr. Posey served as Motley County Commissioner of precinct 4, for six years. He was married in Roaring Springs to Miss Susie Watson, Oct. 14, 1933 and they made their home there until 1958 when they moved to Matador. They moved to Floydada about a year ago. He was born November 5, 1909 at Paris, Texas and died September 9, 1960 at the age of 50 years, 10 months and 4 days.

Survivors include his wife and two daughters, Ronda, of the home and Mrs. Gary Laughlin, Odessa; his mother, Mrs. Mae Posey of Talco, Tex.; four sisters: Mrs. Ural Deshong of Cunningham, Mrs. W. E. Sain, Talco; Mrs. Clifton Brown of Blessing, Tex.; and Mrs. Carl Guthrie of Clute; two brothers, Buford and Kenneth Posey, both of Houston; and two grandchildren.

## County Cuts Taxes, Yet on Cash Basis

**A DREAMED OF** day has arrived. Taxes have been cut in Motley County. Published elsewhere in this issue of the Tribune is the county's financial statement as of Sept. 1.

The county tax rate has been cut from \$1.50 to \$1.30 per \$100 valuation. County Judge Elbert Reeves said the reduction will save tax payers about \$11,000.

Budget estimates were necessary before the county valuation had been determined. The actual 1960 valuation figure is \$7,778,070 and an increase of \$387,461 over 1959. Increased valuation is the result of cattle being returned to ranges after the selling of the Matador Ranch, increased oil property valuation and the tax valuation on new homes constructed within the past year.

Taxes were raised from \$1.25 to \$1.50 in 1959 because \$1.25 did not cover the cost of county government. The county had operated by borrowing funds from other county accounts and transferring them to the general fund. During 1959 the county operated approximately six months in arrears in its finances. With all funds depleted there was no alternative but to raise the tax rate, in order to put the county on a "pay as you go" basis. (By contrast the State of Texas general revenue fund, as of Aug. 1, 1960, has a net deficit of \$59,610,860.)

The rate was raised rather than valuation since a raise in valuation would have increased state taxes and required longer for the county to relieve its position.

For one of the first times on record, Motley County purchased for cash, a new road maintainer for the Flomot precinct No. 2.

Two old bonds have also been liquidated in the past year, which effect a 3c saving to be added to the general fund.

**MORRIS PARKS IN CAR WRECK**

Morris Parks this week was released from a hospital in Flat Rock, Ill., where he had been a patient following a recent car accident in which he and two brothers-in-law were injured.

The three men, Parks, Roy Ledbetter of Odessa (Mrs. Parks' brother) and Will Daniels of Graham had been to the funeral on Sept. 4, of another brother-in-law, Ralph Moore of Flat Rock. As they were leaving the cemetery, their car was rammed and demolished, hospitalizing all three men.

Mr. Parks sustained broken ribs and injured shoulder. A telephone call informed friends Monday night that he was out of the hospital, but that the two other injured men were still hospitalized.

Mr. and Mrs. Parks were called to Illinois by the death of Mr. Moore, the victim of a heart attack. They are presently with Mrs. Moore, who is a sister of Mrs. Parks, at her home on Rt. 2, Flat Rock.

## Warning is Made On Trailer Lights

Farmers are warned in this area that all farm and cotton trailers must be equipped with two reflectors and a burning tail light when they are used on public highways.

Highway Patrolman F. E. (Buck) Johnson said yesterday that the law will be rigidly enforced. Owners of the vehicles will be fined.

The patrol will be in all of the area and it is suggested that cotton growers who expect to be pulling trailers at night, have the necessary reflectors and lights installed or put into condition at once.

Patrolman Johnson also warned that it is illegal to pull two trailers at once and that officers are required to issue tickets to offenders.

Topping 34 blocks of paving in Matador has been completed. Mayor Bill Seale said the council would have done more work on paving here except for the matter of finances.

He said it will be the policy of the council to attempt to do some work each year so that streets may be kept in repair without the need of raising taxes or resorting to other financing.

Money was on hand to pay for the work completed last week. Mayor Seale said he had received some criticism with regard to the quality of work done here, but that the city had hired a qualified engineer and that the council was completely satisfied with the topping work.

He said the topping job equaled or exceeded the specifications in the city's contract with the paving firm and that it was approved by the city's engineer.

## Cal Farley Accepts Guthrie Boy Forger

**CAL FARLEY**, the best friend a boy in trouble ever had, arrived here Friday morning, to attend the hearing of the 15-year-old Guthrie school boy, who had previously admitted six forgeries. A benevolent destiny has interceded in the youth's behalf and he has been accepted for Boys Ranch at Old Tascosa north of Amarillo on the Canadian river.

Here he has joined hundreds of other boys in one of the greatest institutions in the world, which is a monument to Cal Farley.

Except for the interest of Mr. Farley at the hearing the boy would have been committed to Gatesville Boys School of Correction. He had previously been involved in a filling station burglary episode. Now he will be given a chance to heal the scars on his young life and develop into a useful member of society.

Boys Ranch modern plant has grown from little more than a dream. There are no guards, no hand-cuffs, no barred rooms. Good food, work, fresh air and sunshine, schooling and a congenial atmosphere are the things that develop erring boys into responsible men.

Boys Ranch is supported mostly by public contributions. Donations of any size may be sent directly to Cal Farley, Amarillo.

Mr. Farley came to Matador personally when informed of the nature of the case. He discussed details with County Judge Elbert Reeves before the hearing. George Humphries, former King County sheriff for 20 years, for whom the boy worked, paid each person who had received a forged check the full amount of his loss.

## Matadors Put Mark On Steers 12 to 8

**BRANDING FIRES** have cooled since Friday night when the Matador Matadors branded and marked the Rochester Steers (Dist. 10-B) 12 to 8 on the Rochester range. It was the Matadors' second game and second winning overture of the 1960 season. It wasn't easy and the game wasn't decided until the final seconds.

Coach Chas. Johnson's charges put up rugged defense, headed by Gale Stafford, Guy Campbell, Dale Dixon and Jimmie Don Green, and halted the Steers' ground and air attacks, except for one sudden scoring thrust.

The Matadors moved 94 yards in eleven plays to score their first touchdown. They came back to move 43 yards in ten plays after Buddy Davis blocked a punt for their second tally.

Quarterback Dink Wilson and fullback Guy Campbell took care of the Matadors scoring. Wilson sneaked two feet for the first touchdown and Campbell raced 7 yards for the last one.

The Matadors took the opening kickoff on their 44-yard line. They marched to the Rochester 13-yard line where an incomplete fourth down pass cost them the ball. Rochester, running from an unexpected Double Wing Spread formation, moved out to midfield but lost the ball back on the 36 when a punt attempt was stopped because of a bad pass from center.

The Matadors drove to the Steers' 14-yard line but a fourth down pass again fell incomplete. Rochester took over, gained one first down, then punted. A clipping penalty against the Matadors put the ball on their six yard line. The Matadors then started their scoring march.

Halfback Lloyd Martin opened it with a five-yard sprint to the 11-yard line. Guy Campbell broke loose to the Matador 47. Three plays and a penalty put the ball on the Rochester 22 yard line. Ros Bearden carried twice getting to the 15 and then the 11. Wilson slashed to the 7. Campbell moved to the 2 and then to within 2 feet of the goal line. Wilson, behind fine blocking by J. Welling, P. Timmons and D. Dixon streaked into the end zone for the score. The Matadors led 6-0 with 2:38 left in the half. The extra point try failed.

Unlike food, clothing, and shelter—staples which are much more important in the average man's day-to-day life—prescription drugs normally take a small part of one's income. But because illness and its costs are so unpleasant, the cost of drugs is naturally a matter of concern. Are drug prices really high? Here are a number of pertinent facts:

It is true that the cost of prescription drugs has risen, like everything else, in the past 20 years. But drugs still take only a tiny fraction of the per capita income - much less than one percent .00.57% to be exact.

In 1939, the average prescription cost \$1.11. On the average, each person in the U. S. took a little more than one prescription, making the yearly cost \$1.29. By 1958, the cost had risen to \$3.08 and the per capita expenditure was \$10.32. Now, though, the average person was taking well over three prescriptions per year.

If the rise in cost of the average prescription from \$1.11 to \$3.08 sounds high, remember income also went up - more so, in fact, than prescription costs. In 1939, a production worker had to work 106 minutes to buy a \$1.11 prescription. In 1958, a production worker needed to work only 86 minutes—a saving of 20 minutes—to buy a \$3.08 prescription.

Additionally, most of the "miracle" drugs - penicillin streptomycin, the broad spectrum antibiotics, cortisone, tranquilizers, and more—were unknown in 1939.

The conclusions are clear: The small average yearly sum spent on prescription drugs—a little more than \$10.00 for every person in the U. S.—buys one of the most valuable bargains on the market today.
