Funeral services for William Marvin Lawrence, 73, former long-time resident of Matador, were held here at 2:30 p. m. Tuesday at the First Baptist Church.

Mr. Lawrence died in North-west Texas Hospital early Monday.

Dr. Frank A. Godsoe of Spavinau, Okla., formerly of Amarillo, officiated, assisted by Rev. Harold A. Webb, pastor of Central Baptist Church, Amarillo, and Rev. Miller Robinson, Matador.

Burial was in East Mound Cemetery with Eudy-Seale Funeral Home in charge of arrangements.

Mr. Lawrence was born July 25, 1888 at Farmersville, Texas, and died April 2, 1962 at the age of 73 years, 8 months and 6 days.

He was married May 28, 1911 to Miss Minnie Stafford at Farmersville and they moved to Motley County in 1915. They lived in this area for about 30 years before moving to Amarillo about 15 years ago. Mr. Lawrence had been a member of the Baptist church since early in life and was a deacon in the Central Baptist Church.

He is survived by his wife; three daughters, Mrs. Virgie McMahon, Houston; Mrs. M. C. Wisdom, Amarillo; and Miss Peggy Lawrence, Wichita, Kansas; one son, Fred Lawrence in the Air Force, stationed in Kansas City; five sisters, Mrs. Roy Johnson, Farmersville; Mrs. Nannie Stafford, Spur; Mrs. Al Collins, Celeste; Mrs. Jim Lancaster and Mrs. Ethel New, both of Matador; one brother, E. D. Lawrence, Matador; five grandchildren and one great grandchild.

She was accompanied to Lubbock by her nephew, Glenn Woodruff, and continued from there by train to Los Angeles. After a visit with friends there, she flew to Seattle and joined the remainder of the party for the trip overseas.

Approximately 5,000 gallons of acid went into a new wildcat producer five miles east of Roaring Springs today. The Pan-Am venture is known as the No. 1 W. A. Freemont. A pump is being installed and testing will start immediately. The new well is deeper than the two established fields and believed a different pay zone. Additional drilling is expected as soon as the testing is completed, to offset the new wildcat.

Following is a report of the new strike as reported in the Lubbock Avalanche: In south central Motley County, Pan American Petroleum Corp., Lubbock, recovered discovery shows of oil on Permian-Pennsylvanian reef drillstem test at its No. 1 W. A. Freemont, wildcat try, five miles east of Roaring Springs.

At last report Wednesday, the strike was taking a third Permian reef test from 4,345-80 feet, total depth.

On the first test from 4,255-95 feet, open one hour and 45 minutes, recovery was 275 feet of oil and gas cut mud, 100 feet of free oil, 50 feet of oil and gas cut salt water and 10 feet of salt water. No gas, oil or water surfaced.

The discovery location between the Roaring Springs and West Roaring Springs field, both of which produce from Permian reef zone, is 3,400 feet from north and 787 feet from east lines of Section 3, Block O-2, A. M. Bourland survey, 3/4 mile northeast of West Roaring Springs field.

CAR TAG SALES SHOW INCREASE

Automobile license tags sales showed an increase of 18 over a year ago on April 1. Total number of automobiles registered in Motley County when sales closed late Saturday, was 921 as compared with 903 a year ago, according to a report from the office of Sheriff, Tax Assessor and Collector Jinks Wilson.

License sales on farm vehicles also increased for the same period, from 295 in 1961 to 323. Commercial licenses issued number 210 in 1961 as compared to 220.

More trailers were licensed in 1961 with 36 as compared with 31 this year. Only one farm truck tractor was registered in the county on the first as compared with two last year. Last year 14 truck tractors were registered on the first of April as compared with nine this year.

By contrast two years ago a total of 352 votes were cast at which time the same men were elected to the same offices.



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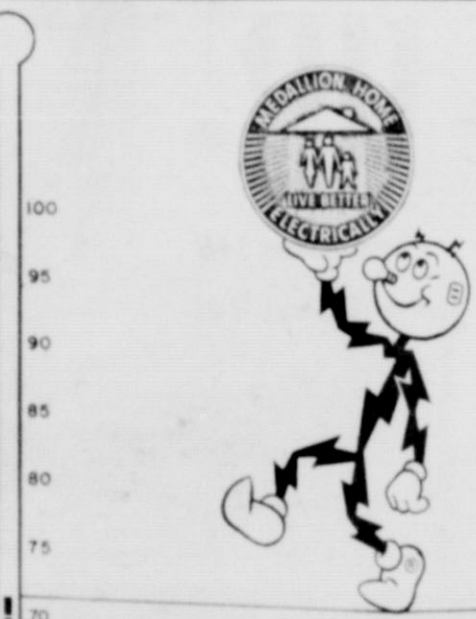
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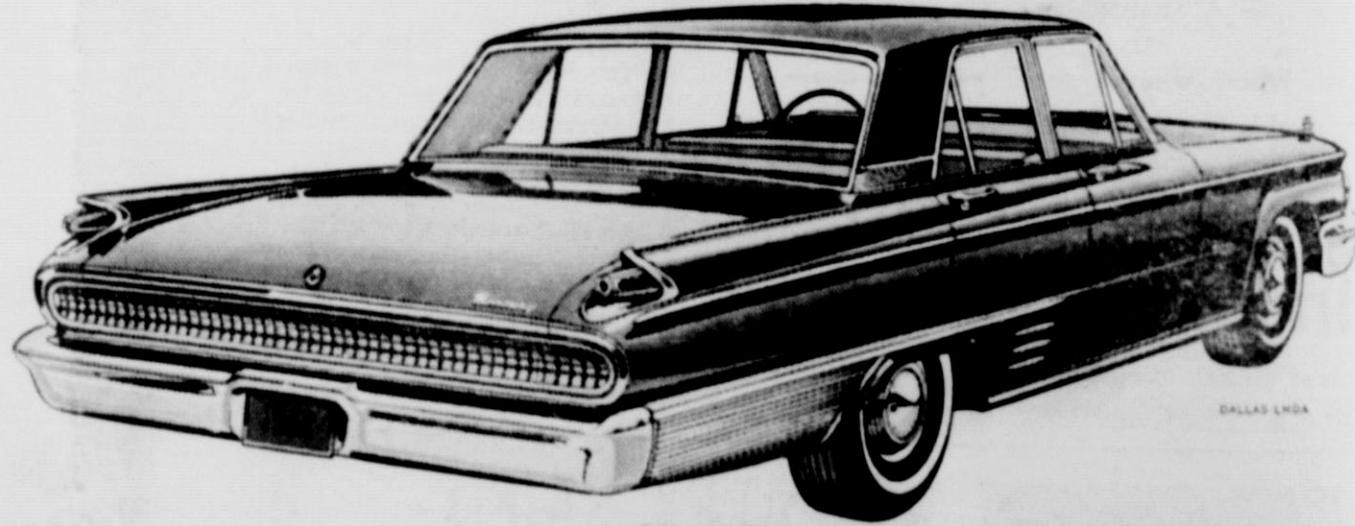
