Cookbook by Cartoonist Ace Reid To Contain "Hard Times" Recipes

KERRVILLE — The name "Son-of-a-Gun-Stew" might raise eyebrows on Park Avenue but to a westerner it's just "larapin' good!"

Recipes for son-of-a-gun, green tomato pie, mountain oysters, jalapeno corn bread and about three score more early ranch favorites are included in a new book, "Cookbook and Cartoons — rare recipes of necessity and stories," by Ace Reid, famed cowboy cartoonist.

To a space age cook, some of the recipes make the West sound really wild — for instance, those for Chocolate Gravy, Shut Up NOW sirup, Glass Eye and Broiled Porcupine.

Each recipe carries with it a

recalled from her childhood on the Martin Ranch near Sonora. One is for Shut Up NOW Sirup.

She explained in her story that there were eight children in her family. "... we were noisy and Papa didn't take kindly to noise." If a couple of warnings didn't quiet the brood he would call, "Shut Up — NOW!"

"Since Papa was a stern and impatient man, only idiots would have ignored that order, but sometimes we qualified," she remembered.

"The primary focus of the committee's work will be to move and restore an authentic collection of 17 ranch buildings on the 75-acre site of the new Museum at Texas Tech, recreating a living outdoor museum of ranch life dating from the 1830's."

The cookbook provides a social commentary on ranch days remembered from the late 1880's through the Depression years of the 1930's mentioning in one recipe the only slightly refined "Hooverized" sugar and another giving the ingredients for "radish pie" — made when a homesteading family had no other fresh filling.

Reid said he expected the cookbook to have a successor with additional recipes including one called, "Gentleman from Odessa" — apparently a variation of son-of-a-gun stew.

Reid's cartoon cowpokes, Jake and Zeb, are featured throughout the cookbook, the eighth of his published volumes. The cartoons are read in more than 300 newspapers and this fall, Reid is scheduled to appear with Will Rogers Jr. in a television series for farmers and ranchers, to be called "Will Rogers Reports."

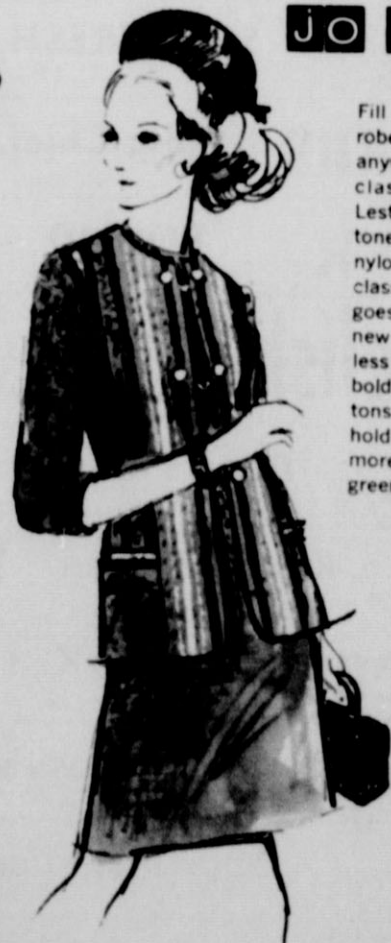

25th ANNUAL BOYS RANCH RODEO SET

OLD TASCOSA (Special) —The boys at Cal Farley's Boys Ranch are expecting a new record attendance for their 25th annual Boys Ranch Rodeo during the two performances that will be held over the Labor Day weekend, Aug. 31 and Sept. 1.

All of the ranch's 384 boys will have a part in the rodeo with more than 100 riding professional rodeo animals under R.C.A. rules. Top honors will go to the senior and junior All-Around Cowboys with trophies also awarded to boys with the best rides on bucking broncs, Brahma bulls, steers, calves and stick horses.

Other Jobs
Boys not competing in the rodeo arena will have jobs as ushers, chute helpers, concession helpers, or working at some assignment necessary to the rodeo's production. Making their first rodeo appearance will be members of the Boys Ranch band under the direction of Richard Kidwell of the Amarillo Public Schools System.

For rodeo fans arriving early to picnic, giant-size barbecue beef sandwiches will be prepared and served for \$1. The barbecue concession is expected to be one of the biggest attractions of the rodeo. The only outside participation in the rodeo will be riding clubs of the area appearing in the Grand Entry. The Boys Ranch Rodeo is considered the only one of its kind in the nation.

formance at 2 p.m. on Sunday and Monday are available at the Boys Ranch office, P.O. Box 1890, or by calling 372-2341. Reserved box seats are \$2.50. General admission is \$1.50 for adults and 75 cents for children and servicemen in uniform.

Highlights and Sidelights FROM YOUR STATE CAPITAL

AUSTIN — Legislature is roaring through the final full week of a called special session with accomplishment of its major goals — adoption of a budget and a tax bill — in sight.

Senate scored a major breakthrough on its tax bill after a four hour floor debate and days of gloomy predictions of a deadlock.

Here are how tax bills passed by the House and Senate stackup, pending conference committee adjustment:

Senate — An increase in the sales tax rate from three to 3.25 per cent with the levy extended to beer-liquor and telephone-telegraph services, four cents a pack increase in the cigarette tax, from 11 cents to 15 cents; 50-cent raise in corporation franchise tax rate (to \$3.25 per \$1,000) with base for computing the tax expanded to include 25 per cent of out-of-state sales; boost in the

natural gas production tax from seven to eight per cent and addition of a new documentary stamp tax of 50 cents per \$500 value on land transfer documents.

House — An increase in the sales tax rate to 3.5 per cent; a new services tax of the same amount on telephone and telegraph, professional entertainment, auto, appliance and jewelry repairs, parking, laundry and dry cleaning; a five cents a pack raise in the cigarette tax and a 10-cent transactions levy on sale or purchase of stocks and other securities.

Total yield of the House bill was calculated at about \$325 million. Senate bill originally was figured at \$360 million, but a delay in its effective date may reduce the take sharply.

Senate bill would share with those cities levying a local option sales tax the new income from tax on telephone and telegraph and alcoholic beverages. House bill did not propose such a sharing from services levy.

Differences in the \$1.2 billion Senate and \$1.1 billion House general revenue budgets also are being hastily adjusted.

WELFARE BENEFITS TO RISE — Proving that what comes down will eventually go up, state welfare benefits will increase September 1.

Aid to Families with Dependent Children (AFDC), sharply reduced May 1 due to fund shortages, will rise at least 50 per cent.

Maximum grants to the aged also will increase from \$110 to \$125 a month. Aid to the disabled maximums will go up from \$84 to \$100 and aid to the blind from \$96 to \$110.

Increases were made possible by voters' August 5 adoption of the constitutional amendment to raise welfare spending ceiling from \$60 million to \$80 million a year.

Public Welfare Board authorized an increase in AFDC to 75 per cent of budgeted family needs. AFDC checks were reduced May 1 to 50 per cent of budgeted needs.

New level of assistance will represent a 30 per cent increase over the average AFDC grant as of

Jan. 2, 1968, effective date of a federal requirement that by last July 1 amounts used to determine needs in the AFDC program must reflect regular cost-of-living increases.
