The Matadors ground out 140 yards to the Turks 90 in the 1st half but could not reach pay dirt. Early in the 3rd quarter the Matadors took the ball on their own 19 yd. line and in 12 plays drove 81 yards for the first score. Lloyd Martin ran through a hole at right tackle that had been opened by David Rattan, Pete Davis, Charles Ezzell and Mike Barton. Gary Lancaster ran around left end for the extra points to make the score 6-0. He came back a few seconds later to run 38 yards over the same spot for the touchdown, and also ran the extra points around the same left end to make the score at the end of the 3rd, 16-0.

Early in the 4th Richard Campbell intercepted an attempted screen pass and ran 35 yards for the Matadors' 3rd touchdown to make the score 22-0. Gary Lancaster broke over tackle and outran the secondary to put another 6 points on the scoreboard. He ran the extra points to make the score 30-0. Coach Chas. Johnson inserted his sophomore and freshmen into the line at this point and they proceeded to drive for another score with Kenneth Pitts taking handoff from Charles Ezzell and driving 7 yards into the end zone over his right guard, David Rattan, then kicked the extra point to make the final score 37-0.

Matador Homecoming fans cheered the fine play of the all-senior Matador backfield, consisting of quarterback Gary Lancaster, fullback Kenny Barton, with Lloyd Martin and Mike Barton at the halfbacks.

The Matador line led by co-captain Pete Davis and aided by tackles Richard Campbell, Vaden Hayes, Jack McCallie, Robert Brandon, David Rattan, Johnny Thomas, Tim Green, Tommy Green, Charles Ezzell, Ronnie Cox and Kenneth Pitts, held the Turks offense to a net of 20 yards in the 2nd half, while opening holes for the Matador backs to advance.

The Turks also had some heroes, especially during the 1st half when Don Guest, Billy Farley, David Hutton, Derrel Fuston and Bunky Mullins played their hearts out to hold the Matadors back.

KYLE KINGERY and Prize-Winning Violins . . .

**Native of County Makes Violins for Hobby; Wins County and State Prizes**

A graduate of Roaring Springs High School has become well known in New Mexico for his skill at making violins.

He is Kyle Kingery, son of Mr. and Mrs. Arvel Kingery of Plainview, former residents of Matador and Roaring Springs.

Although Kyle does not play, he has earned quite a reputation for his craftsmanship. Four years ago when he couldn't find anyone to repair a violin for his son, he decided he would do it himself.

Since then he has also made ten violins, fashioning all the parts himself. These instruments have been approved by the teacher from whom the Kingery children take music lessons.

The violins won him trophies in both the 1961 and 1962 Otero County (N.M.) Fairs. He also received a first place ribbon in hobbies in the 1961 New Mexico State Fair and grand championship in this year's county fair.

Kingery, a veteran of World War II is a civil service worker at Holloman AF Base, near Alamogordo. His wife, the former

Edna Duggan, is a beauty operator. They have five children.

**Children Own Violins**

Two of their children, John Arvie, a student in junior high school and Kyla Kay, who attends a different school, are taking lessons on violins made by their father. He has also made violins for his other children, Kyle Kenneth Jr., Martha Bernice and Tommy Dean, and for his father and niece. All his children say they are going to learn to play their violins.

According to an article in the Otero County Star, published at Alamogordo, the whole thing started when John Arvie had the opportunity to take violin lessons in the Tularosa elementary school. Kingery's father told the boy he would give him his violin if he would learn to play it.

When the instrument arrived, it was broken.

This started the repair job

which eventually made Kingery wonder how he would come out making a complete violin.

He orders his wood and special varnish from Germany. The neck, scroll, back and sides are made of maple; the top of spruce; the fingerboard, keys, and tail piece, of ebony.

He also makes his own designs on the back.

It takes approximately five months to make a violin, Kingery says. He can complete it in four, however, if he has a lot of extra time.

Since moving to Alamogordo in July he has had a room set aside for a shop.

Kyle is a nephew of Mrs. Velma Fulfer, Matley County treasurer.
