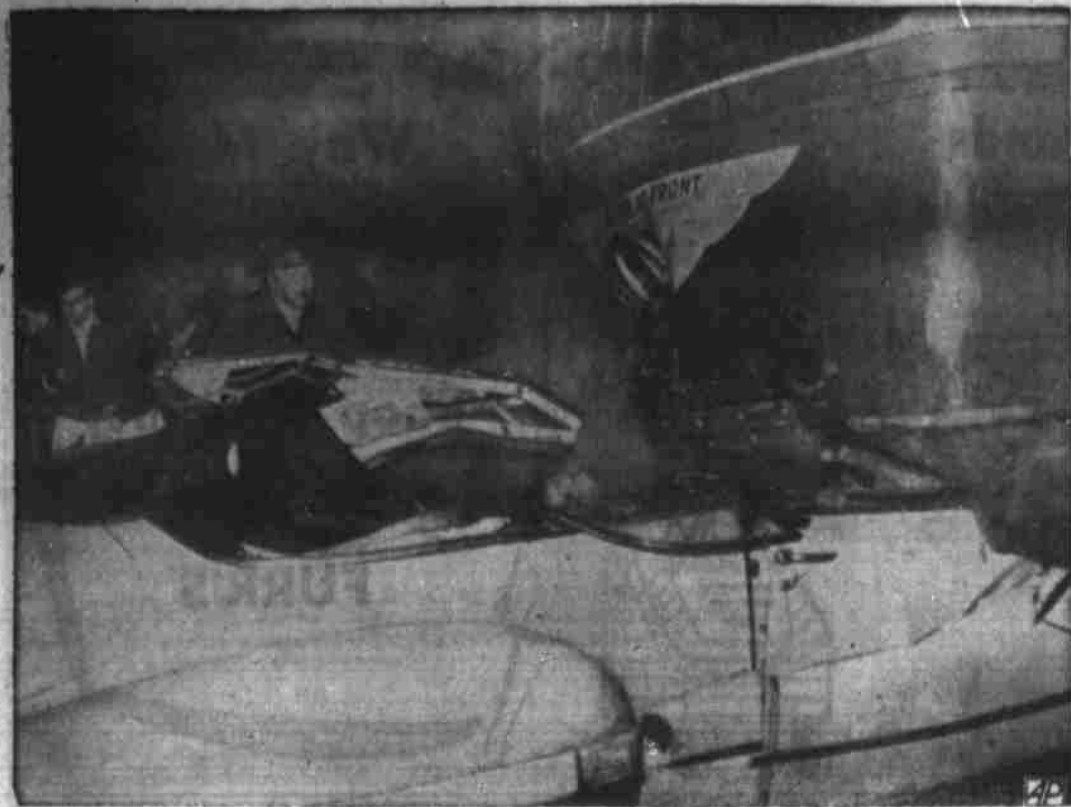

### Jealous Lover Kills Trio And Then Suicides

ATLANTA (AP)—A jealous lover shot and killed a former Georgia legislator, a Tennessee shoe salesman and the woman he was dating and then committed suicide last night.

Another woman was injured seriously in the wild burst of gunfire which broke up a gay party in a northeast Atlanta home.

One of the victims was John Verlyn Booth, 49, member of the Georgia House of Representatives from 1934 to 1938 and longtime Fulton County (Atlanta) campaign manager for Sen. Richard Russell (D-Ga) when Russell ran for governor. Booth was divorced.

Police Capt. E. O. Mullins and Homicide Detective L. L. T. Bulard identified the jealous man as Alton Nix Treadway, 45, an Atlanta electrical engineer.

They said he smashed his way into the house with a .22-caliber target pistol in hand and fired with deadly accuracy at all four persons.

The other dead were listed as: Mrs. Ella Warren, 39, in whose one-story brick bungalow the shooting occurred, and Ira D. Lane, 49, a shoe salesman at Chattanooga, Tenn., who was in Atlanta attending a convention. Lane also was divorced.

The injured woman was Mrs. Anna Padgett Cone, a widow employed at Chattanooga. She suffered bullet wounds in the head and stomach and cuts about the head.

Capt. Mullins said Treadway had been dating Mrs. Warren and just recently purchased an engagement ring for her.

Mrs. Cone, the sole survivor, told police she was in bed when Treadway burst into the room. She said he hit her on the head with a gun, banged her about, and then shot her. She fled to a neighboring house.

### Davenport Infant Dies At Colorado

COLORADO CITY — Thomas Glenn Davenport, day old son of Mr. and Mrs. Thomas Davenport of Cuthbert, died Sunday afternoon in the Root Memorial Hospital in Colorado City. Davenport is a Mitchell County rancher.

Funeral services are to be held at the graveside, Monday afternoon at 4 p. m. with burial in the Westbrook Cemetery under the direction of Kiker and Son.

He is survived by his parents, a brother George, of Cuthbert; five sisters, Shirley, Neva Jo, and Ruby Davenport all of Cuthbert, and Mrs. Floyd Barr, of Colorado City and Mrs. Carrel Pace of Austin.

### Coast Guard Cutter Comes Through Again

BOSTON (AP)—The Coast Guard cutter Eastwind has survived another near disaster.

A below-decks fire yesterday destroyed the cutter's engine room and threatened an ammunition magazine before it was extinguished by sea and land fire fighters.

Five years ago, the Eastwind collided with the oil tanker Gulfstream off Cape May, N. J., with the loss of 11 members of its crew.

No one was injured in yesterday's blaze aboard the 289-foot, 3,000-ton craft, which returned only two weeks ago from Greenland and was tied to a Castle Island pier for repairs.

### Plane Wreckage Sighted In Hills Of Central Italy

VIGNA DIVALLE, Italy (AP)—The wreckage of a Belgian Sabena airliner that crashed eight days ago with 29 aboard including four Americans was reported sighted today by pilots of a search plane and helicopter in the snow-covered Apennines of central Italy.

A plane from Vigna di Valle Air Rescue Center reported sighting the wreckage of the plane on the Sasatelli crest, at an altitude of 6,000-feet on Mt. Terminillo, about 60 miles northeast of Rome.

Carabinieri and police set out immediately on skis for the scene of the crash. There was virtually no chance any of the 21 passengers and eight crewmen could still be alive.

The area where the wreckage was sighted is rugged and wild. Fog and storms prevented search planes from covering the area adequately until today.

The airliner—a DC6—was heard Sunday night, Feb. 13, a few minutes before it was scheduled to land at Rome's Ciampino Airport. It was on a regular flight from Brussels to the Belgian Congo.

### Earth Tremor In Los Angeles Area

LOS ANGELES (AP)—A fairly sharp jolt, apparently a single earthquake shock, awakened scores of sleepers in the west and southwest section of Los Angeles early today but no damage was reported.

# Income Tax Slash In Committee

By RUSSELL BRINES

WASHINGTON (AP)—The House Ways and Means Committee meets today to endorse a Democratic proposal for a \$20-a-person income tax cut that probably will set off the first partisan clash over legislation in the new Congress.

Although the committee's Democratic majority reportedly has promised to vote solidly for the plan, the group invited Secretary of the Treasury Humphrey to testify in closed session in advance of the vote. Humphrey was expected to oppose both the timing and the method of the proposed cut.

The plan is to add the income tax cut to an administration bill to continue present corporation and excise tax rates, now due to drop April 1.

Its final passage in that form would give President Eisenhower the choice of approving an estimated loss of \$1,400,000,000 in income tax revenues or of losing three billions by vetoing the corporation and excise rate extensions at a time when he has said taxes must be kept at their present levels.

The tax cut plan, sponsored by Rep. Mills (D-Ark.), would give each taxpayer a \$20 cut for himself and each of his dependents, including his spouse, on income earned after next Jan. 1.

If finally adopted, the cuts would be reflected first in withholding tax deductions on the individual's first 1956 pay check. Those not subject to withholding taxes could make the deductions when they pay their taxes.

Republicans called the Democratic proposal "a political move" and termed it "absolutely irresponsible."

House Speaker Rayburn of Texas announced after a Democratic strategy meeting Saturday that the committee's Democratic majority would support the tax extension proposal but would take on the tax-cutting amendment.

The bill and the amendment may reach the House floor Thursday. A key Democrat, who declined to be identified, said there is "no question" the tax-cutting amendment will pass the House and perhaps the Senate later.

But Sen. Byrd (D-Va.) chairman of the Senate Finance Committee which would consider it, promptly announced that he opposed this or any other tax reduction until the federal budget is balanced.

### Grocer Accused In Huge Thefts

LAREDO (AP)—Laredo grocer Daniel Flores faces charges of receiving and hiding thousands of dollars in property stolen from Houston, San Antonio and Corpus Christi.

Flores was accused yesterday after Manuel Diaz, 32, of Jalisco, Mex., was brought here by San Antonio officers.

Police said the homes were entered by a man who used a small, butane-fueled torch to crystallize door and window glass. Then he would gently tap holes in the glass, reach inside and unlock the door or window.

Dist. Atty. E. James Kazen of Laredo quoted Diaz as estimating goods valued at \$40,000-\$50,000 were taken. Officers said some of the loot was recovered. Kazen said Flores, released under \$5,000 bond, had agreed to try to recover more of the loot. Diaz was returned to San Antonio.

## Unemployed Steelworker Kills Four, Then Takes Own Life

UNIONTOWN, Pa. (AP)—An unemployed steelworker killed his wife, 17-year-old daughter and two men, then shot himself to death. Police were looking today for a motive.

Officers found the bodies yesterday in the home of the steelworker, Robert Miller, 42. Miller was clutching a .25-caliber pistol in one hand and a flashlight, still burning, in the other.

A search of several hours uncovered the bodies of his wife Helen, 47, and his daughter Dolores buried in a pile of coal in the cellar. Mrs. Miller was fully clad. Her daughter was wearing a slip.

Coroner W. Ralston McGee said both women had suffered multiple skull fractures, apparently inflicted with an ax. He said Mrs. Miller probably had been killed early Wednesday and her daughter some 12 hours later.

Police went to the Miller home, in a drab mineside community eight miles from here, after Anthony Rivak, 34, a former coal miner, staggered into a tavern and said he had been shot by Miller.

The bodies of Miller and Steve Demko, 27, an auto mechanic who lived nearby, were found in a bed together in a downstairs room. In an upstairs bedroom was the body of an unidentified man about 25. Then the search for the wife and daughter began.

Police said Demko and the other man had been beaten in the head, apparently with a machinists hammer found nearby. Demko also had been shot with a .25-caliber pistol. Miller was shot in the chest and his wrists had been slashed.

There was no evidence of a struggle. All window blinds were drawn when police arrived, doors were locked from the inside and fuses had been taken from the main switch box.

Coroner McGee said: "It's definitely a case of four murders and a suicide. It is the worst case of its kind I've ever seen. There were no notes—nothing to indicate the motive."

Rivak was reported on the critical list at Uniontown Hospital from a bullet wound in the abdomen.

## Matusow Faces New Probe About False Testimony

WASHINGTON (AP)—Harvey Matusow, self-described ex-Communist and liar, was called for questioning today by Senate Red hunters checking into his reputation of sworn testimony he gave them.

The public hearing by the Senate Internal Security subcommittee was aimed at separating fact from fiction in Matusow's statements.

Matusow, 28, testified as an ex-Communist and former FBI informer in four investigations conducted by the subcommittee in 1952 including a probe in which he now says he gave false testimony against Owen Lattimore.

Lattimore is a Far Eastern affairs specialist who is under indictment on perjury charges growing out of the subcommittee probe but not directly related to Matusow's testimony.

Matusow also gave testimony which he now says was false to the House Un-American Activities Committee and as a paid government witness in the trial of 13 second-string Communist leaders convicted on conspiracy charges in 1953.

Chairman Walter (D-Pa) of the House committee has declared he is convinced that Matusow was a Communist "plant" intended to discredit congressional investigators.

The convicted Communists filed a new trial motion after Matusow said in an affidavit Jan. 31 that he gave faked evidence against them.

Matusow, in previous appearances before the Internal Security subcommittee, has testified that he joined the Communist party in 1947, became disillusioned with it early in February 1950, and contacted the FBI.

He said that, at FBI urging, he stayed in the Communist party and reported on its activities until he was "expelled" by the party in January 1951.

## Bell Earns Over A Half-Billion

NEW YORK (AP)—The Bell Telephone System, world's largest corporate enterprise, earned more than a half-billion dollars in 1954 and its assets rose to nearly 12 1/2 billion dollars, according to its annual report issued today to 1,300,000 shareholders.

Total operating revenues of Bell, consisting of the American Telephone and Telegraph Co. and its principal telephone subsidiaries, amounted to \$4,784,500,427, compared with \$4,416,729,814 in 1953.

Of the \$554,898,564 Bell system net income for the year, \$549,931,223 or 99.1% a share was applicable to AT&T stock and the remainder to minority holdings in subsidiaries not 100 per cent owned by AT&T.

This compared with \$491,893,857 net income for the Bell system in 1953, of which \$478,512,265 or 97.3% a share was applicable to a lesser number of AT&T shares. AT&T had 48,182,000 shares outstanding at the year end compared with 42,282,000 a year earlier.

Squires, the polygraph operator, said the last test convinced him the evangelist withheld no information that might help solve the murder of Mrs. Lucille Quarles. Bolla had been held since Thursday.

Homicide Squad Lt. W. C. Doss

said Bolla phoned the office five or six times after his release, offering possible leads.

Mrs. Quarles, 50, was slain Tuesday night in her home here. She suffered four skull fractures.

She was the widow of the Rev. Louis Quarles, former pastor of the Curry Road Baptist Church.

Bolla, also a Dallas used car dealer, told officers the families were old friends and that Mrs. Quarles had loaned him money for various business enterprises.

**Accused Doctor Kills Himself**

LOS ALAMOS, N.M. (U)—A 48-year-old pediatrician, the president of the Los Alamos Medical Society, was found shot to death in his apartment yesterday.

Police Chief Ralph Kopansky said Dr. Malcolm M. Cook apparently chose suicide rather than face the morals charges for which he had been indicted.

Kopansky found the body, sprawled in the apartment. He said Cook had been shot once behind the right ear. A .45-caliber automatic was found near the body.

Dr. Cook, free on \$5,000 bond, had been indicted by a federal grand jury in Albuquerque Friday on morals charges involving two girls, one 9 and the other 10. He was charged with transporting them across state lines for immoral purposes.

Kopansky said Dr. Cook, a bachelor, had a dinner engagement last night with some friends. They became alarmed when Cook did not arrive and called police.

Police are still searching for a motive.

BEVERLY HILLS, Calif. (U)—Michael Farrow, 15, son of film actress Maureen O'Sullivan, is in Cedars of Lebanon Hospital today after being hit by a car in front of his house.

Michael, the eldest of the actress' seven children, suffered a broken right leg and minor head injuries. He was returning from a movie early yesterday morning when struck by a car driven by Spencer Wood, 43, Los Angeles, who was not held, police said.

**AFTER THREE-DAY HUNT Elusive Desperado Finally Felled In Long Gun Battle**

NEW YORK (U)—The long crime career of squint-eyed August Robles, sworn enemy of the law, ended in death yesterday after a blazing, 90-minute gun battle with police.

The pint-sized gunman had been the object of an intense, three-day manhunt in the city's Puerto Rican districts.

Police, rankied by the memory of his two escapes Friday, were determined to get their man.

The elusive desperado was at last tracked down in a third-floor tenement hideaway on 112th Street near Park Avenue.

Two hundred policemen surrounded the shabby building and pumped machine-gun, rifle and pistol bullets and tear gas into Robles' lair. He answered their challenges to surrender with gunshots.

At one point tear gas caused a fire in the embattled four-room apartment. Firemen turned streams of water into the building to quench the blaze even before the shooting ended.

Finally there were no more answering shots. Police gingerly entered the charred apartment, still reeking of

acid gunpowder and tear gas. A priest went with them to administer last rites.

On the floor, in a pool of blood and water, lay Robles, who had sworn he would never be taken alive. Blood oozed from a ragged chest wound. A rough tourniquet had been tied around his left arm, pierced by another bullet.

Police were tipped to Robles' hideaway yesterday afternoon by a swarm of officers were deployed on nearby rooftops, in neighboring buildings, doorways, cellars and fire escapes.

When all was ready, three policemen went to Robles' door and shoved it open. There was a blast of shots from inside and two policemen were wounded. The battle was on.

Found beside Robles' body were four revolvers, three of which he had taken from policemen who first tried to arrest him early Friday. His escape touched off the manhunt.

Princess Margaret Guest In Kingston

KINGSTON, Jamaica (U)—Princess Margaret, wearing a white ermine stole, dined by candlelight with British army officers last night at romantic Blue Mountain Inn on this Caribbean isle.

The princess, dressed in a gold organza evening dress with gold sequins, sipped a cocktail, dined on roast turkey and listened to native Jamaican music on a terrace overlooking a lighted waterfall.

Jamaica is the eighth of the West Indies islands the princess has touched in her tour of the Caribbean over the past three weeks.

Any graduating high school senior in public, private or parochial school may enter the contest by writing an essay on one of eight subjects: "Contributions of Organized Labor to America"; "Importance of Organized Labor in Texas"; "Why Unions Should Take Part in Politics"; "Union Wages and the Nation's Prosperity"; "Why You Should Join a Union"; "Organized Labor and Public Service."

Writers of the best essays will take a written examination to determine the winners of the various awards. Winners will be announced in June at the annual convention of the Texas State Federation of Labor in Dallas. Rules governing the contest can be obtained from the Texas State Federation of Labor, 412 Littlefield Bldg., Austin, or from local AFL organizations.

**Truman Speaks Up For U.N. As Agency For World Peace**

MARYVILLE, Mo. (U)—Harry S. Truman says the only hope for world peace is in the United Nations.
