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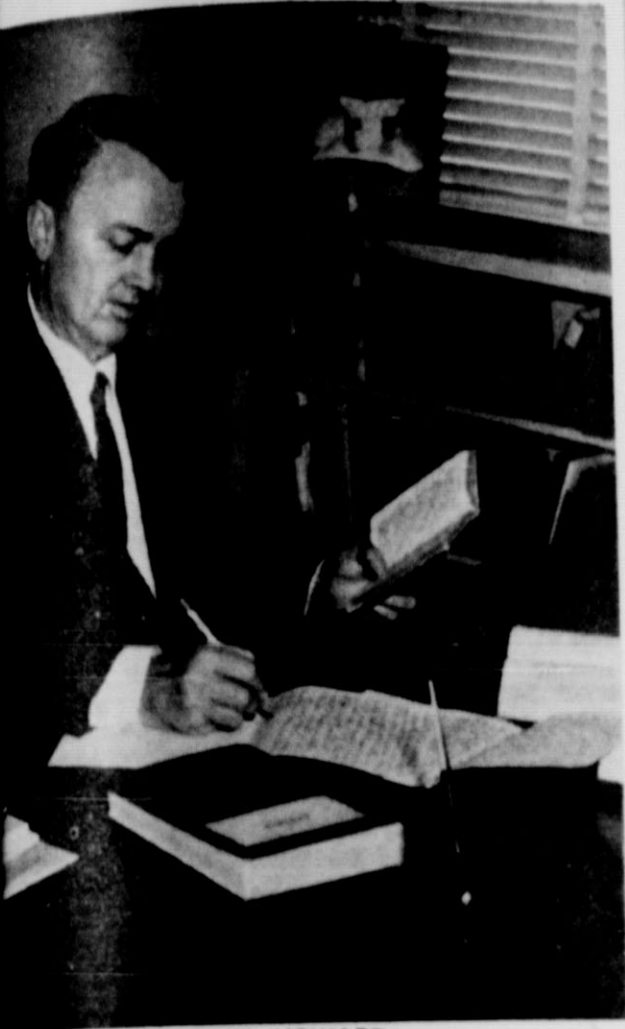

### COUNTY AGENT PALLMEYER SAYS:

#### TIME FOR FEDERAL GAS TAX REFUND

Time for farmers to file for  
the 4c federal gasoline tax used  
on the farm or ranch is here.  
Those who have filed a claim be-  
fore have received Form 2240,  
along with instructions and an  
envelope for claiming their re-  
fund for federal tax. These  
forms are to be filled out, and  
returned to the District Direc-  
tor of Internal Revenue, Dallas,  
Texas, prior to October 2, 1961.

Gasoline covered is that pur-  
chased from July 1, 1960 to June  
30, 1961. Do not mistake this  
claim with that for the refund  
of state gasoline tax, which is  
filed on a different form, and at  
a different place.

For those who have not filed  
a claim, or have lost their card,  
these forms may be secured  
from County Agent Bill Pallme-  
yer. All eligible for a refund  
are urged to claim it, as the rate  
is about \$2.00 for each 50 gal-  
drum used. Be sure to keep a  
record to prove what gasoline  
you have used.

#### RESULTS OF COTTON SEEDLING DISEASE

As seedling disease of young  
cotton plants is becoming an  
important factor in cotton pro-  
duction, the two test plots in  
Motley County planted by Char-  
les Long, Roaring Springs and  
Sam Ross, Flomot, were checked  
for disease resistance, with both  
plots showing some varieties  
more resistant to disease than  
others.

Percentage of infected plants  
ran higher on the Ross plot than  
the Long plot, but the same va-  
rieties were high in both tests,  
and the same varieties were low  
in both plots.

Varieties showing a high per-  
centage of diseased plants were  
Northern Star, 5; Gregg; Lock-  
ett, 88A; Lankart, Western  
Stormproof and Paymaster 88-  
90 were grouped in the mid-  
dle of the resistance tolerance,  
and Rex and Blightmaster showed  
the least disease.

Long also has Qualla 10; Lock-  
ett 4789; Half and Half; Antone

and Perfection Stormproof  
planted. Qualla 10 and Perfec-  
tion Stormproof showed the  
highest percent of infection with  
Lockett 4789 and Half and Half  
grouped in the middle range.  
Antone showed the greatest re-  
sistance to seedling disease in  
this group of varieties.

The plots will be checked for  
other diseases at a later date,  
as well as production, insect  
damage and grade.

#### WATCH COTTON FOR INSECTS

If cotton insects build up to  
where controls are warranted,  
time of application will deter-  
mine whether the farmer gets  
his money back from the appli-  
cation or not. If controls are ap-  
plied too late, the cotton is  
lost, and it is doubtful if the  
poison will remain on the plant  
long enough to protect the next  
crop the plant produces.

Fields should be checked  
every 3 or 4 days, with at least  
100 plants checked. Look in the  
terminal of the plant, as this is  
where most insects hatch out,  
and feed on the young tender  
part of the plant.

Controls are warranted when  
15% of the plants have flea-  
hoppers present. When 5% of  
the plants are infested with  
bollworms, controls will pay.  
Thrips and aphids damage  
young plants, and controls may  
be justified when counts are  
heavy. It is doubtful if thrips  
will build up enough for con-  
trols at this stage, but when  
the bottom of leaves become sil-  
very, and plants are not grow-  
ing, controls will help. Aphid  
damage results in leaves crum-  
pling up and resembling a spin-  
ach leaf. Other insects may  
build up to damaging numbers  
also. Control levels are listed in  
leaflet L-218, which may be se-  
cured at County Agent Pall-  
meyer's office. This leaflet also  
gives recommended treatments,  
which should be followed as to  
the amount, for a plants are not  
covered, controls will not result.

Insect control is economical  
if applied correctly. Your  
County Agent is presently at  
Ft. Sil, but bulletins in the of-  
fice may help you with your  
problems.


