Burial was in East Mound Cemetery under the direction of Eudy-Seale Funeral Home.

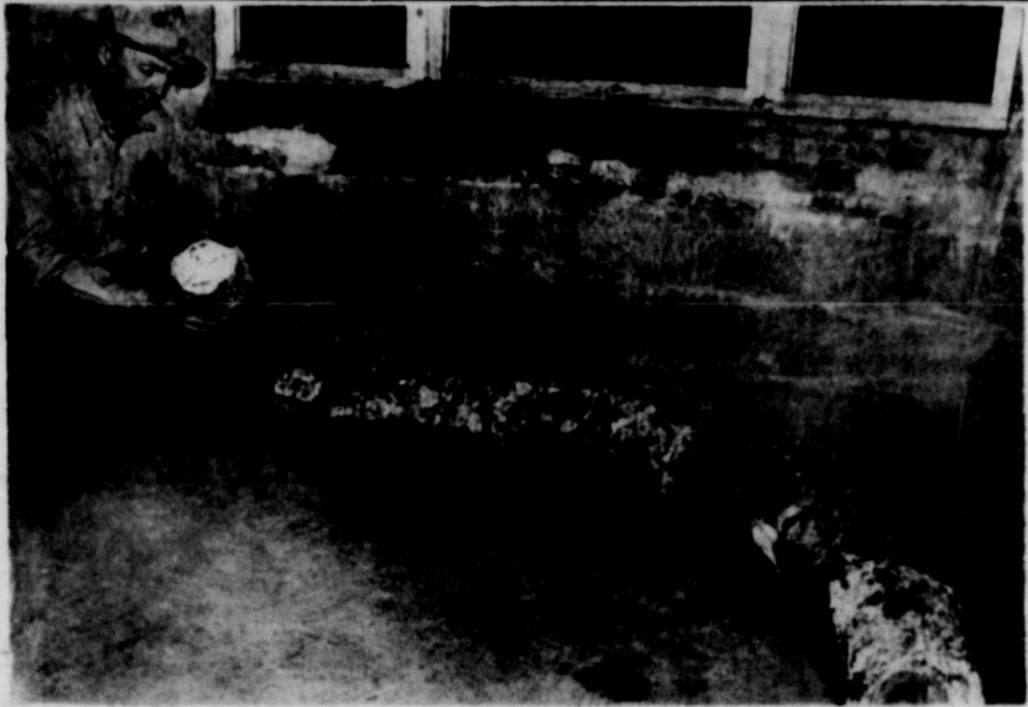

BIG DENTAL PROBLEM—This massive piece of prehistoric ivory was found by Elvin Markham, Motley County road maintenance employee (Precinct No. 1) a few days after Christmas. The big tusk (broken in six pieces) was found in a gravel pit on the Adams Ranch (formerly old Matador Ranch) ten miles east of Matador on the old Teepee City road. Working with Buford Hobbs, Markham (left) saw the tusk when his grader blade cut off the base end. It was

only about three feet under the surface of the ground and on a high hill. The tusk measures at present 7 feet and 8 inches and is about 8 inches in circumference. It is estimated that approximately two feet of the tusk are missing. Markham brought the tusk to his home in Matador. No other evidence of a prehistoric monster's skeleton was evident, but the area has not been disturbed since the find.

Summer Is Short

Summer temperatures over most of Texas Sunday came to an abrupt end Tuesday morning. A blizzard that had apparently gone to the northeast, turned suddenly and spread across the state, intensified by moist air brought in from the Gulf of Mexico.

In many parts of West Texas the mercury dropped 50 degrees in less than 24 hours. Following high north wind Tuesday morning sleet and snow fell intermittently most of the day.

Highways became hazardous over most of the area as sleet and snow froze on paving. Floydada, Muleshoe and Levelland experienced ice storms with the snow and sleet. Many schools were dismissed and highway traffic dwindled to a mere trickle. Livestock warnings were issued for West Texas.

The cold wave swept across the state quickly as the coldest spell of the season pressed southward. The mercury here yesterday morning, according to Bob Stanley's thermometer reached 11 degrees. The low reported at Amarillo was 9 degrees. The city well's thermometer registered 9 degrees here. The high here Tuesday was 26.

He was on an old "wind charger" tower at the Claude Matney home when the concrete base in which the tower was secured, came out of the ground and caused the tower to fall. Palmer rode the tower down about 20 feet and fell.

He was brought to Stanley Hospital in a Eudy-Seale ambulance where X-ray examination disclosed a bone broken in his left heel. He was then taken to St. Mary's Hospital in Lubbock (room 204). His condition is reported satisfactory, also he will probably remain in the hospital two or three weeks while the fractured bone heals.

Stock Show Plan Is Supported By Lions

THREE LIONS CLUBS in Motley County were represented here Monday night in organizing a stock show association in support of the annual Junior Livestock Show held each spring. Roaring Springs and Flomot Lions delegates were guests of the Matador club at a chili supper held in the Matador Cafe. Lion Bill Moss, Matador vocational ag teacher, served as chairman.

The plan to be ratified by the membership of the three clubs, will have a nine-member board of directors. The three Lions clubs will each have two members on the board, County Agent Bill Pallmeyer, Bill Peacock, Roaring Springs vocational teacher and Bill Moss of Matador will serve as members.

It was suggested that they select officers out of the board. They would be given full authority for details of the plan, which would have as its principal objective, the raising of funds throughout the county to provide prizes and other incentives to boys and girls to enter projects in the annual exhibition.

Funds will be raised through annual membership in the association. The amount of individual and business memberships will be left to a decision of the board. The three Lions clubs will merely sponsor the association and have no part in the direction except the influence of each club's two members. Approximately 15 men from the three communities attended the meeting.

It was pointed out that the show is of great economic value to the county in encouraging boys and girls to raise livestock to the best advantage since this is primarily a livestock and agriculture county.

Another advantage of the association is the wider participation through membership of families throughout the county, and thus an increased interest in the show. Another meeting will be held early in February.

Fred Koch Speaker For Quannah C of C

Fred C. Koch, Wichita, Kansas industrialist and a member of one of Quannah's pioneer families, will return to his home town Monday, January 30 to be the principal speaker at the annual banquet of the Quannah Chamber of Commerce.

Mr. Koch is the son of the late Mr. and Mrs. Harry Koch. His father served as publisher of the Quannah Tribune-Chief from 1889 until his death in 1942.

Mr. Koch is Motley County's largest tax payer. He bought the Matador Ranch brand and name with approximately 100,000 acres of land including the ranch headquarters. It is operated as the Rock Island Oil Company.

The speaker will be introduced by Ed Eakin, editor of the Quannah Tribune-Chief. Mr. Koch will speak on the subject of "Communism."

Fred C. Koch graduated from the Massachusetts Institute of Technology in 1922 as a chemical engineer. In 1924-25 he was chief engineer of the Medway Oil & Storage Co., Ltd. at the Isle of Grain, Kent, England.

In 1925 he helped organize the Winker-Koch Engineering Co. of Wichita, Kansas. This company specialized in the design and erection of petroleum refineries. Refinery equipment and refineries were built in England, France, Germany, Rumania, Russia, Italy, Portugal the Middle East, Burma, South Africa, Canada and other places.

In 1929, 1930 and 1931 this company built 15 oil-cracking plants in the Soviet Union. It was during his visit to the USSR that Koch became acquainted with and traveled with the old Bolshevik, Jerome Livschitz, who outlined the Kremlin's plan to subvert the USA, a plan which has been largely carried out.

In connection with business and pleasure, Koch has traveled on every continent. At present, Koch makes his home with his family in Wichita, Kansas where he is president of the Rock Island Oil & Refining Co., Inc., chairman of the board of Koch Engineer Co., Inc., president of the Koch Oil Corporation, Inc., all of Wichita, Kansas.

In addition he serves as a director of six oil companies, including two in Canada. He returned to the Soviet Union in 1956 and was in Iraq in 1958 shortly before the revolution.

A militant Anti-Communist Koch has become an authority on the methods and tactics of International Communism. In recent years he has made a number of major addresses on the subject of "Communism" in various states.

Pioneer President Of "Q" Railroad Is Claimed By Death

Charles H. Sommer, Sr. former president and board chairman of the Quannah, Acme & Pacific Railway, a subsidiary of the St. Louis-San Francisco Railway, died of a heart attack Friday, January 13, at Ghost Ranch Lodge, Tucson, Arizona.

Mr. Sommer was president of the Quannah Line from 1926 until his retirement in 1951. Since that time he had continued as a member of the board of directors of the Railway and maintained an office at 906 Olive Street in St. Louis.

A native of Texas, Mr. Sommer was born at Galveston. He was first employed in the accounting department of the Gulf, Colorado and Santa Fe Railroad at Galveston. He later joined the Houston Belt Terminal Railway at Houston, as Assistant to the President and Construction Auditor.

He was elected Vice President of Q A & P Railway when he joined the company October 1, 1906 and was in charge of construction of the entire Q A & P line from Quannah to Floydada.

A former board member of the American Short Line Railroad Association, Mr. Sommer was a member of the University Club and a life member of the Missouri Athletic Club in St. Louis.

He is survived by his wife; one son, Charles H. Sommer Jr., president of Monsanto Chemical Company of St. Louis, and a daughter, Mrs. Josephine Sommer Baker of St. Louis.

IDA FAIR WINS HOMEMAKER PIN

The 1961 Betty Crocker Homemaker of Tomorrow for Matador High School is Ida Fair, daughter of Mr. and Mrs. A. L. Fair.

Having received the highest score in a written examination on homemaking knowledge and attitudes taken by graduating seniors in her school, she becomes a candidate for the state Homemaker of Tomorrow award which will be announced in March.

In connection with the honor, Miss Fair received an award pin, manufactured by Jostens and representing the slogan, "Home is Where the Heart Is."

The \$110,000 homemaking education program sponsored by General Mills offers a \$1,500 scholarship to the first ranking girl in each state and \$500 scholarship to the state's second ranking participant.

State Homemakers of Tomorrow and their faculty advisors receive an expense-paid educational tour to New York City, Colonial Williamsburg, Va., and Washington, D. C., April 8-13.

Social Security Now Offers More; Easy to Quality

Your Social Security is now better than ever. Because of the 1960 amendments, coverage has been extended, less work under social security is needed to qualify for benefits, and a person no longer need to be at least 50 years old to receive disability insurance benefits.

John G. Hutton, District Manager of the Lubbock Social Security Office says that there have been large crowds in his office ever since the law was changed, and it shows no sign of letting up. "We welcome everyone who thinks he might qualify under the new law," Mr. Hutton emphasized. "In fact, we're glad to see such crowds because it means word of the change is getting around." He went on to say that people who are unable to wait

to see a representative of the office should try again as soon as possible.

Mr. Hutton suggests that anyone who answers one of the following questions "yes" get in touch with the nearest social security office as soon as possible.

1. Have you ever had your application for social security benefits denied because you, or the breadwinner in your family hadn't worked long enough under social security?
2. Have you ever delayed filing for disability insurance benefits because you are not yet 50 years old?
3. If you are a widow, were you ever told that you couldn't qualify for benefits on your husband's social security account because he died before 1940, or had not worked long enough under social security?
4. Have you been told you can't receive benefits on your husband's account because you haven't yet been married to him for 3 years?

Read the questions carefully, and if your answer to any one of them is "YES", get in touch with your local social security

office right away. There may be good news for you.

A representative of the Lubbock Social Security Office will be in Matador on Tues., Feb. 7 at 9:30 a.m. in the First State Bank and will be glad to assist in all matters pertaining to social security.

AUSTIN, Tex.—When the Legislature faces a difficult problem on which there are sharp differences of opinion, the final legislation is usually a sort of Irish stew of compromises.

Ingredients for this session's main dish, state financing, are fast pouring into the pot. Simultaneously, Gov. Price Daniel and the Legislative Budget Board presented plans for state spending in 1962-63.

Governor Daniel recommended general revenue spending of \$479,964,734. Budget Board recommended \$356,183,172 — a difference of \$123,781,562.

As a primary source of new money, the governor endorsed the payroll tax proposal recommended last fall by the State Finance Advisory Committee. He also approved raising state college tuition by \$50 a semester.

Daniel urged lawmakers to handle separately the deficit that's expected to be about \$65,000,000 by the end of the fiscal year. For this he tabbed a temporary 3 per cent natural gas tax, a franchise tax, escheat bill and transfer of the farm to market road program from the general revenue to the highway fund.

Auto Insurance Change
Sen. Grady Hazlewood of Amarillo, long time critic of present auto insurance regulations, has outlined a liberalized plan he will ask the Legislature to approve.

Changes recommended by the senator:

1. Use of only that part of a driver's record which was made since January, 1960, date the new merit system went into effect. As set up, insurance rates are based on driver's record for the past three years.
2. Eliminate from the list of violations causing insurance rate penalties (a) speeding less than 15 miles per hour over the limit (b) stop light violations involving amber, rather than red lights and (c) "creeping" at stop signs.
3. Eliminate from accidents that result in a penalty those where less than \$100 damage is caused. Present limit is \$25.

Schools' Portion Down
Texas' public schools' share of state spending has dropped from 35.5 per cent in 1950 to 30.6 per cent in 1960.

In a report to Governor Daniel, Texas Education noted that while state spending on public schools has doubled in the decade, other states have upped school financing even more.

In the 1950-60 period, the scholastic population increased 34 per cent, enrollment 46 per cent and average daily attendance 50 per cent. State spending on schools rose from \$187,000,000 to \$356,000,000.

Annexation Limit Proposed
A brake on headlong expansion of city limits would be provided in a bill introduced by Rep. W. T. Oliver of Port Neches.
