Cotton Insects Meetings Slated

A series of field meetings is scheduled for Wednesday (June 13) to show Motley County farmers how to prevent cotton insect damage that may amount to as much as \$25 per acre. John Thomas, A&M Extension entomologist of Lubbock, will conduct the meeting, according to County Agent Bill Pallmeyer. First meeting will be held at 8 a. m. in the Polk Cooper field on the Dean Melroe place about two miles east of Roaring Springs. Second meeting will be held in the Charles Keith field just south of the Matador Drive-in Theatre. Afternoon meetings will be held at 1:30 in Boone Simpson's field at Northfield, and the final meeting will be held at Flomot at 4:30 in the Wendell Morris field just north of town. Thomas suggested field meetings so he could show damage and how to make counts. All cotton farmers are urged to attend one of the meetings and help pass the information on to others.

Series of Showers Brightens Outlook

JUNE showers, accompanied by some hail, electrical displays and a series of tornado alerts, have brightened the West Texas dry farming outlook since last week. Here in Matador the total rainfall for June was 1.23 inches, but some sections of the county have received heavy rainfall, according to reports. One report said about three inches of rain had been recorded on Turner Brothers Ranch about ten miles southeast of Matador. Some parts of Flomot are reported to have received good rains, and good amounts are reported from some of the Whiteflat area. The heaviest amount received here was 70-inch Monday late afternoon and evening. It was accompanied by some hail and several power disruptions as the result of lightning. The showers have also been of great benefit to the ranges, in some instances putting water in tanks and water holes. Although the rains have not been general, they have made it possible to plant in most sectors of the county.

Doctor Says Siesta Good for the Heart

"STRAIN AND STRESS of modern life overloads the heart and places heart disease as the No. 1 killer in this nation today, especially among men," a local physician told Matador Lions Club members Tuesday. Speaker was Lion Dr. J. S. Stanley, who made the principal address at the regular semi-monthly meeting of the club, held in the Methodist Church basement.

The Spanish and Mexican people are wise in taking a siesta following the noon meal, and the relaxation would certainly be good for the heart. It might help if we turned the television off a little early and went to bed to get more rest," Dr. Stanley said. He explained that the coronary arteries that feed the muscles of the heart are impaired through blood clots and prevent the heart from receiving proper energy. He said more people in their 50's are affected but that coronary trouble may be at any age from 20 to 80. He said the first symptom is extreme pain in the chest or arms. He advised immediate rest and nitro glycerine until a physician arrives. He said also that a hot toddy would be beneficial in relaxing until medication could be administered.

Connally Nominated For Texas Governor

TEXAS DEMOCRATS nominated John Connally of Tarrant County as the next governor in Saturday's second primary election. It was not a landslide. Liberal Don Yarborough of Harris County ran a close race with about 26,000 votes separating the two contenders. Motley County, voting less than half its potential strength (no county race), mirrored the state voting with the exception of the Congressman-at-large race. W. W. Bean of El Paso County received 225 votes while Jim Pool of Dallas County received 202, but Pool was state nominee by a decisive margin.

DATE SET FOR CITY CLEANUP

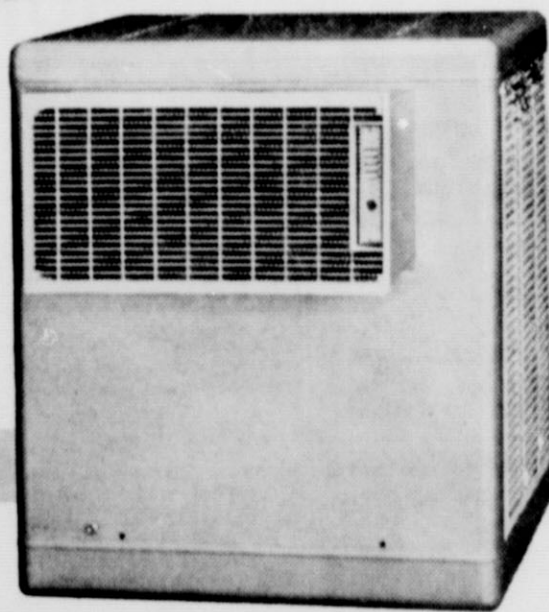

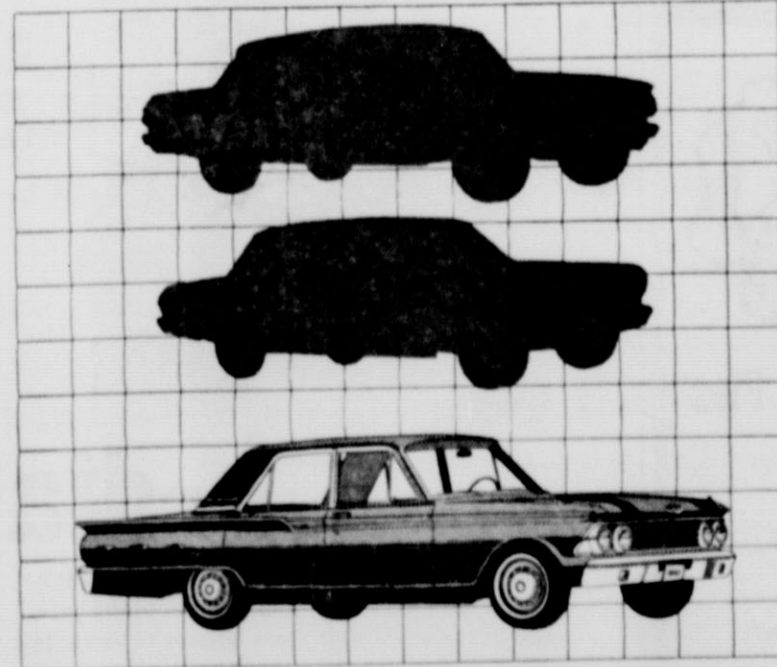
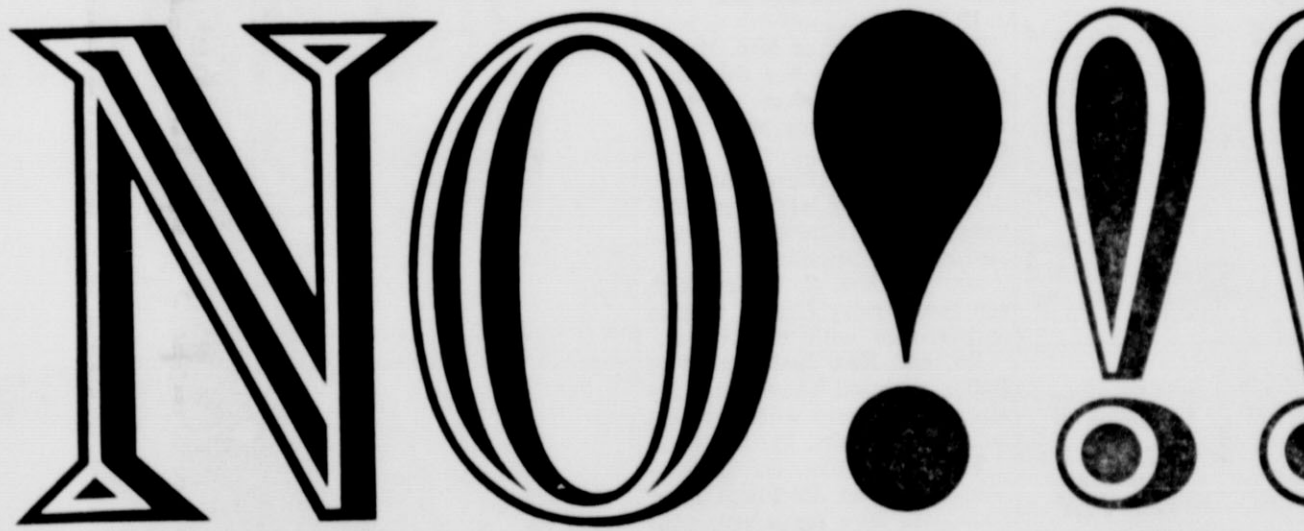
