Four lines of "Trail Dust," Douglas Meador's column in the Matador Tribune, have been purchased by the 12-million circulation Reader's Digest.

## Pioneer Publisher Sells Floyd Paper

KEYS to one of the oldest business institutions in Floydada changed hands Monday, and Homer Steen, veteran editor and publisher of the Floyd County Hesperian, began retirement.

He had been editor of the outstanding weekly newspaper for 40 years and had been in the newspaper business in Floyd County for 60 years. Steen, who had never learned to play, will devote his time to raising livestock on a modest acreage west of the city limits.

Saturday night he was honored in Lubbock with an engraved plaque as a salute to his work in the field of journalism, during a banquet at a regional meeting of Sigma Delta Chi, professional journalistic society, of which he was a professional member. The meeting was held at the Pioneer Hotel.

The newspaper, organized in 1896, was sold to S. J. McBeath of Sweetwater, who comes from three generations of newspaper-

## OFFER OF POLITICAL ASYLUM... AN EDITORIAL

The Tribune is not a political journal. It has never told its readers how to vote. Last week the Tribune was one of six newspapers which refused to publish advertising of Alex Saied of Childress on the grounds that the contents were libelous. This week the advertising was returned under a different slant and the advertisement which the newspapers refused was sent through the mails, with the added implication of unfairness in a "shackled press." The Vernon Daily Record was named but at least five weeklies were also involved in the refusal but were not named in the direct mail advertising. Unbiased legal advice caused the newspapers to refuse the advertising on the grounds that it was slanderous.

Newspapers do not want "character assassination" advertising. It is one of the oldest tricks in the political offal bucket; to start a fight and confuse the voter.

The Tribune welcomes the political asylum offered in Representative Bill Healy's district. His people believed in him enough to re-elect him to office for a third term. This newspaper has resented the Childress political dynasty which has held this county prisoner over a period of years. It is well to look this Childress political wooden horse in the mouth. Regardless of the men in office, or seeking office, good government is served better if the State Senator and the State Representative do not come from the same community.

As a reminder, the Tribune is still supporting Marshall Formby for Governor of Texas, who is far out in front in qualifications. His special interests are the people.

## Plan Is Outlined For City Cleanup

No community ever reaches a point where a cleanup program is not effective to its general appearance. Clyde Gilbert, chairman of the Lions cleanup committee, believes in a planned strategy in a frontal attack against unsightly areas.

He has made a comprehensive survey of Matador, and while the situation is not ideal, neither is it alarming. He wants to make a cleanup drive but he also wants to plan the drive in advance.

First he is asking the cooperation of business firms and home owners to conduct a special drive about their premises in an effort to reduce unsightliness as much as possible.

Second, he is asking that rocks, wire, wood and metal objects be removed from vacant lots, alleys and other areas. His plan is to allow weeds and grass to develop a little longer and then apply the services of a power shredder. He is convinced that one machine can accomplish more in two or three hours than 50 men can accomplish in an entire day.

Lion Gilbert feels that in advent of heavier rainfall, weeds and grass will grow rapidly and that a complete city cleanup will be more effective at this stage.

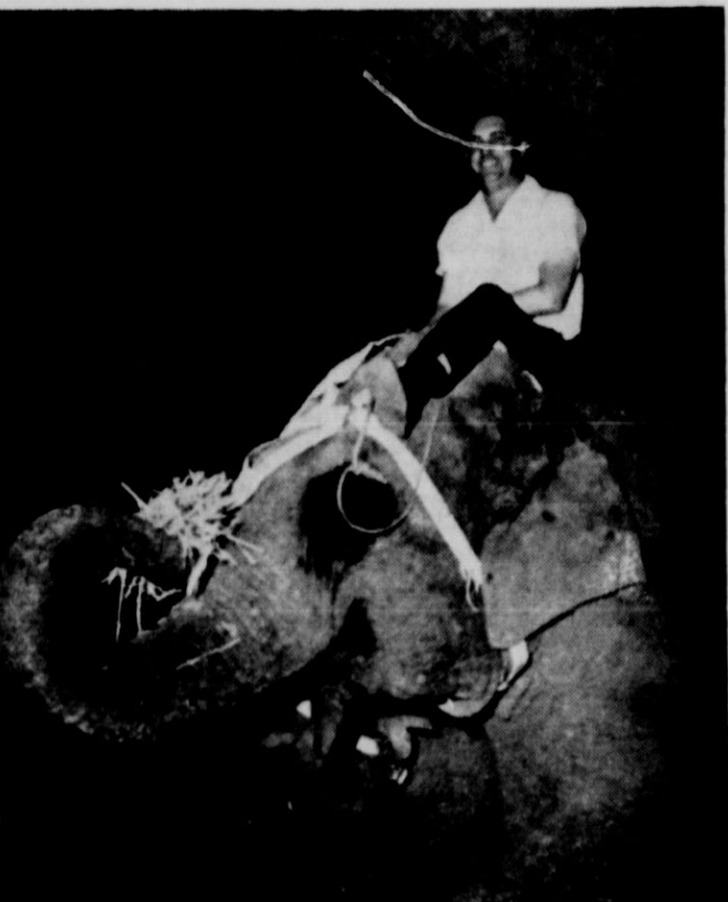
In the meantime he is asking the cooperation of fellow residents in cleaning up around their premises as much as possible in advance of the drive to be announced later.

## Former Resident State Candidate

A former resident of Motley County and a former employee of the Matador Tribune, B. M. Nelson of Dimmitt, is a candidate for State Representative of the 91st District. Observers say he has an excellent chance of being nominated.

Nelson first moved to Roaring Springs from Paducah in January, 1933, as printer on the hand-set Roaring Springs News, published by Douglas Meador. His salary was \$2 per day on the 200-circulation weekly.

When the News was moved to Matador and merged with the Tribune he commuted here for two months, helping set the type on the first Tribune's printed here. He opened another newspaper, the Roaring Springs Reporter, which he operated for four years, and which was later purchased by the Tribune. He went to Olton where he operated a newspaper and later purchased the Castro County News at Dimmitt, where he has achieved outstanding success.

## Hot Race Develops For Demo Chairman

ALWAYS UNPREDICTABLE Motley County politics struck a bizarre note this week when a smoldering contest for an unpaid office in the county Democratic organization developed into a full-fledged campaign. In previous years the office of County Democratic Chairman has usually been filled by a draftee who allowed his name to be placed on the ticket, through the exercise of influence slightly less than coercion. On the ballot which voters will receive Saturday two names are listed as candidates for the office.

For the first time in the Tribune's 28 years of publication, it is carrying a paid political advertisement soliciting the support of a candidate for the office of County Democratic Chairman. Roaring Springs implement dealer S. J. Braselton Jr. is campaigning against incumbent Democratic Chairman Furman Vinson.

Braselton, in his advertisement says the county has voted Republican three times in succession (Presidential), yet operates under the Democratic banner, and if elected, he will correct the distortion or attempt to correct it, under loyal Democratic leadership.

The situation that may bring more voters than expected to the polls Saturday, becomes complicated with the position of the Republican party in the county.

County Republican Chairman Fred Simpson said yesterday that his party would hold a primary Saturday in cabin one at Fred's Motel. He said only one election would be held in the county and that he did not expect more than eight or ten votes.

Apparently the Republicans have gone underground—in Democratic territory. Vinson says he is a conservative Democrat. Braselton admitted that his home community of Roaring Springs in past years was considered the Republican stronghold in the county. He believes, however, that he can carry it in the race for county Democratic leadership.

Candidates for county offices in the primary have no worries. For the first time in recent history, not a single incumbent has an opponent. Names on the ballot will be County Judge, Elbert Reeves; County Clerk, Pat Sheridan; County Treasurer, Velma Fulfer; Commissioner precinct 4, Charles Long and Commissioner precinct 2, Malcolm Turner.

In the race for State Representative, Alex Saied of Childress is hurling about everything in the political catalog at incumbent W. S. (Bill) Healy of Paducah.

County and District Clerk Pat Sheridan said yesterday 27 absentee votes had been cast in the primary.

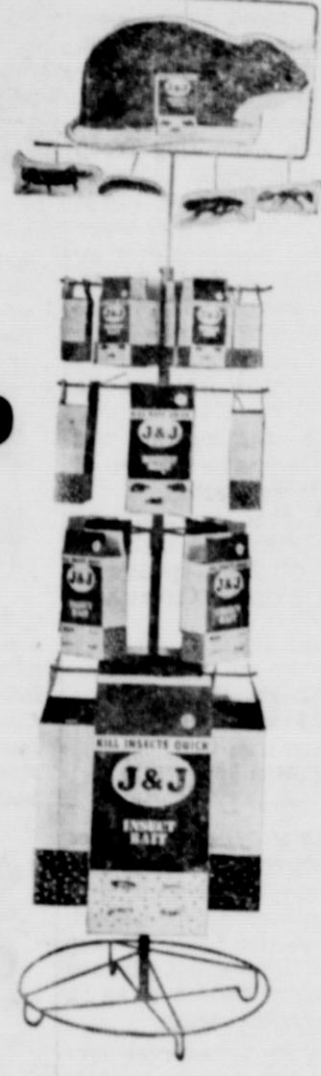

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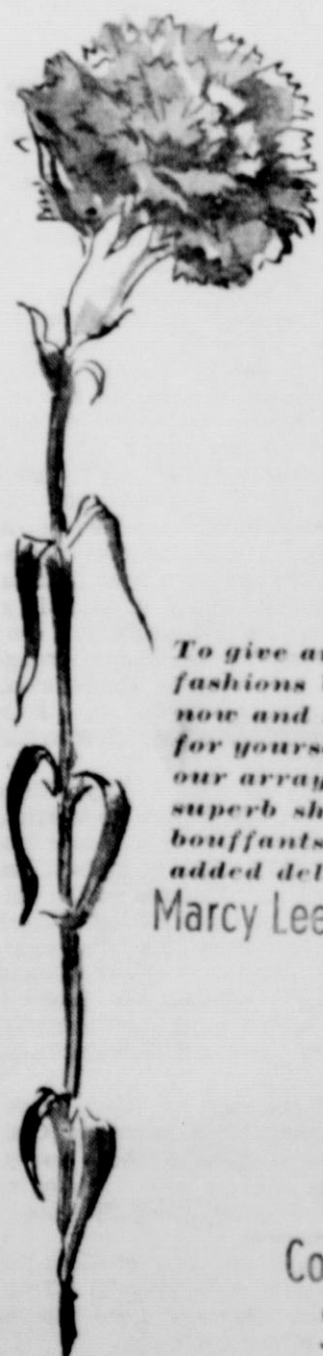

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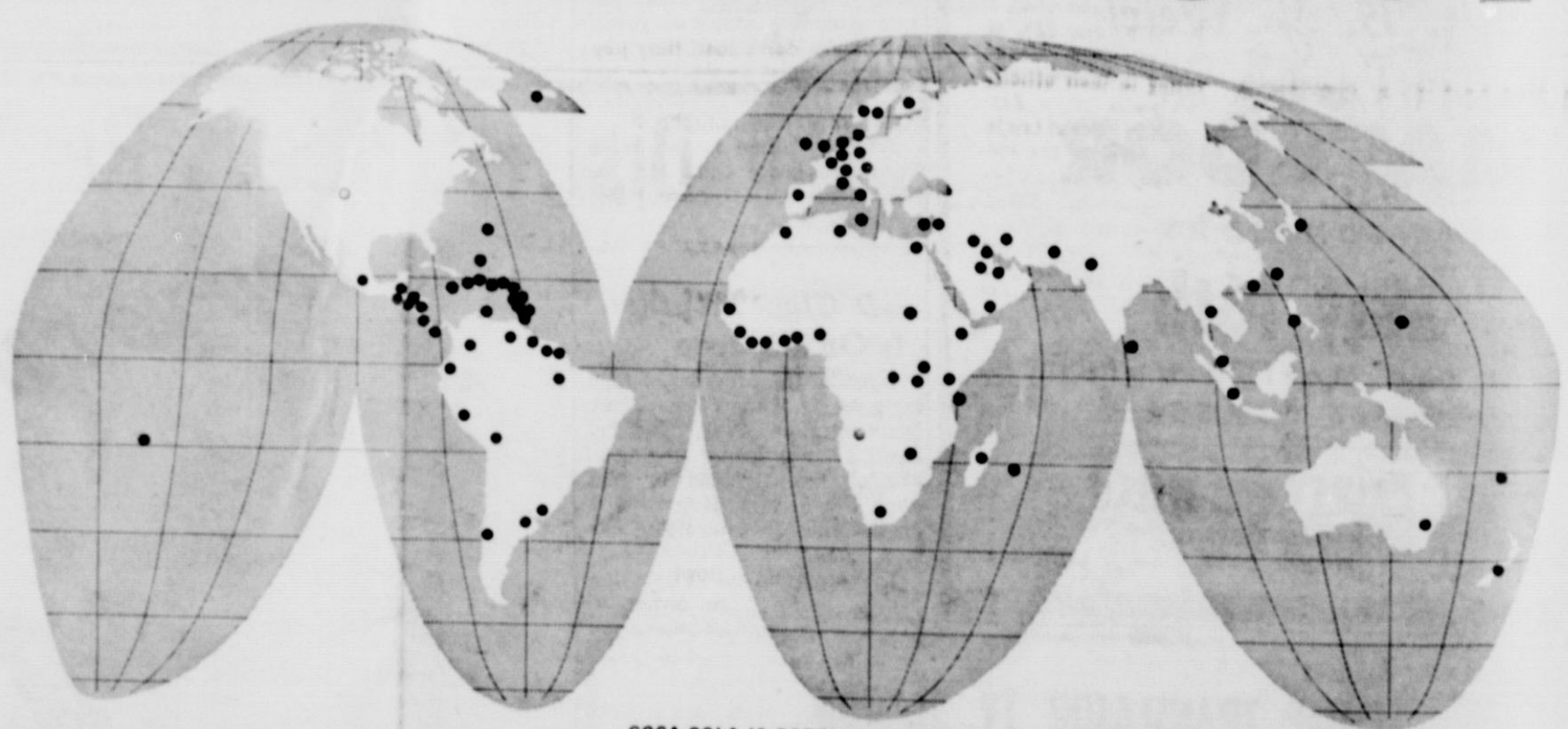

### Illegal Voting on Pay Bill Admitted by 4 Legislators

AUSTIN, Texas—Illegal voting on the teacher pay raise bill passed Friday was admitted Saturday by four state representatives.

Additional irregularities were obvious Saturday during voting on the controversial, pressure-pushed bill to require runoffs in special congressional elections.

The four House members frankly told The Dallas News they instructed their secretaries or deskmates to push their voting machine buttons for them while they were absent for short periods of time.

House Rule 11, Section 3, states: "A member must be on the floor of the House to vote."

Section 8 of the same rules declares:

"Any member found guilty by the House of knowingly voting for another member on the voting machine shall be subject to expulsion from the House. Any officer or employe found guilty of such offense shall be subject to discharge by the House, in case of officers, or by the Speaker, in case of employes."

The four who admitted having others cast their votes for them were: E. (Red) Berry, E. (Ronald) Christ, Charles E. (E. J.) Sheran and C. W. (Norm) Normangee.

Votes of all four were cast against an amendment to the

teacher pay raise bill offered by Rep. J. Charles Whitfield Jr. of Houston.

It would have deleted an extra pay raise granted principals and superintendents in addition to the \$90-a-month increase given teachers. Mr. Whitfield had not been present. The amendment was defeated, 73-66; and Whitfield immediately charged that at least seven members were absent without permission during the vote.

Rep. William S. Healty of Paducah, although absent at least most of the day Friday, was recorded as voting on 11 of the day's 15 record votes. A House officer said a secretary had been told finally to stop pushing Healty's voting button.

Worth was absent Saturday morning but cast five record votes. His secretary said she had instructions to do his voting while he was gone.

Keys which lock the voting machines were taken up from the desks of some absentee members Saturday to prevent their votes from being cast on the election runoff bill. Speaker James A. Turman said he ordered the keys removed when the absence of members was called to his attention.

But Kennard's key was returned to his desk on Turman's orders. "I just said he 'thought' he was in the House at the time of the Whitfield amendment vote but admitted he left several times during consideration of the pay bill."

During the last regular and special sessions, 950 record votes were cast in our House of Representatives in Austin. Bill Healty was absent during 227 of these votes—not counting the times his secretary or others voted his machine for him.

During his absences, Mr. Healty continued to draw his \$12.00 per day expenses allowed a legislator when he is in session.

Mr. Healty has the distinction of having the HIGHEST EXPENSES IN THE HOUSE for the last session. He over spent his official allowed expense by some \$500.00. This amount was still owed to the state by Healty when he entered this race. (Taken from the official House Journal and other records.)
