Matador Lions attending were President Mike Hoyle, Secretary Elbert Reeves, Freddie Wiling and J. R. Whitworth.

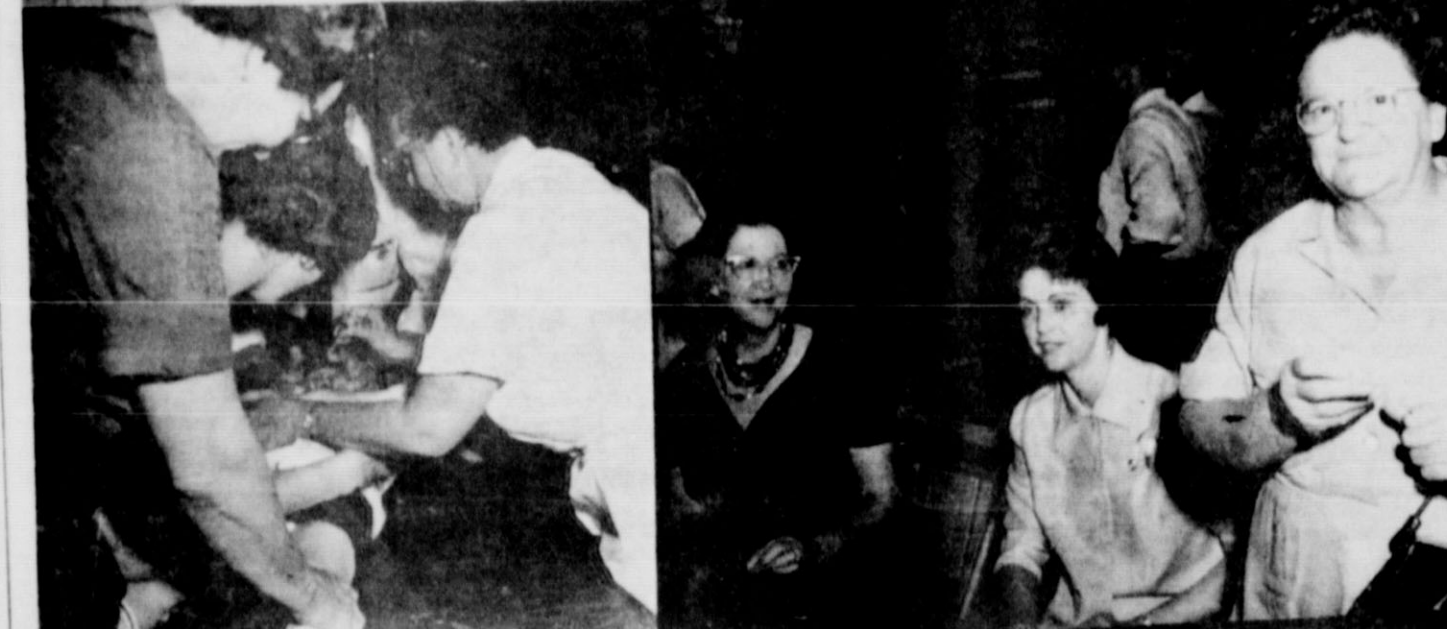
**HAS SURGERY FRIDAY**

## Foundation Poured For 'Trail Dust' Inn

Seldom if ever in the history of literature (the term is used loosely) has a weekly newspaper column had a motel named in its honor. On this assumption the Tribune is claiming a "first" because its page one column has been accorded this honor.

The foundation has been poured on "Trail Dust Inn" a small but completely modern motel (it hopes to grow) on US Highway 70 just west of the Texaco service station and a part of the former Modern Courts.

Owners are Mr. and Mrs. Hal Courtney. Construction is by Earl Alexander of Childress. The motel, six units and living quarters and office will be of masonry construction. The living quarters and office will be constructed of brick. It is expected that from two to three months may be required to complete construction. Amount of the investment was not disclosed.

Several weeks ago Mr. Courtney, who is the son of native-born ex-sheriff H. H. (Si) Courtney, asked permission Tribune editor Douglas Meador to use the name of his column "Trail Dust" as the name for his motel, in event financing was made possible. Permission was readily granted. During the past week concrete was poured for the foundation.

The title of Meador's column first appeared in a Matador newspaper, the first Matador Tribune, printed in Floydada in 1931. The paper flourished during the depression after seven issues. The title "Trail Dust" next appeared in the Roaring Springs News in October 1932, a publication then owned by M. S. Thacker. Later in 1933 the Roaring Springs News was moved to Matador and the name changed to the Matador Tribune type in the Roaring Springs News was set by hand. In 1934 News was purchased by the Motley County News and later became the only publication in the county.

Trail Dust has appeared weekly (almost) for almost 30 years. It has been widely quoted in almost every kind of publication from the Baptist Standard to Reader's Digest. It was published in book form in 1940 but the edition is out of print.

Meador admits that the title was "temporary" until he could think of a better one. He wanted to symbolize the cattle country and perhaps slant the meaning to meditation of a cowboy.

## Speaker Says Local Enterprise Vital To Economic Climate of Communities

"EVERYONE who owns any private property is a capitalist, and there is not anything wrong with being a capitalist." The speaker was Bob Kennedy of Abilene, Vice-president of West Texas Utilities Company who made the principal address Tuesday night at the annual meeting of Matador Lions, their ladies members of the school faculty and school board. He was introduced by Tribune editor Douglas Meador.

"What Makes A Good Town" was the title of Mr. Kennedy's address. "Communities do not stand still," he declared, "they stand either forward or backward either go forward or backward but people make a town."

He cited the strength of women in any community in uniting to make progressive change in a community. "Give me woman power every time," he said.

He passed a questionnaire with 40 questions on "How to rate your town." The papers were not taken up, nor were they graded.

Mr. Kennedy cited the need for interest in politics at all levels, for equitable taxes and wise expenditure of tax money as needed to make a good town. He said a good town should have good water, good fire protection, good homes and well maintained streets.

#### COUNTY AGENT PALLMEYER SAYS:

Eleven Motley County 4-H members submitted records for judging in the senior contests, and six were district winners. A. J. Dye, Roaring Springs, was first in the Agricultural Contest; Gary Grizzle, Roaring Springs,

was first in the Sheep and Wool, Goat and Mohair Contest; and Jan Barton, Matador was first in the Home Economics Scholarship contest. Records of these members have been submitted for state honors.

Pat Cooper, Matador, placed second in the Leadership Contest; Mar Rainbolt, Roaring Springs, placed second in the Garden Contest; and Tommie Green, Matador, placed third in the Safety Contest.

Other records were submitted by Shirley Stafford, Roaring Springs in Achievement; Jane Hamilton, Matador in the Santa Fe Program; Joan Barton, Matador in Clothing; Cheri Barton, Matador in Dress Revue; and Barbara Bird, Matador in Beef Production.

Today I received application blanks for trees and shrubs available for planting by Texas people in 1963. Delivered cost is \$1.50 per 100, with orders of plants in multiples of 50, with no order for less than 100 plants. Plants may be used for any purpose except for resale or ornamental purposes. Orders must be received by Feb. 10, with a check or money order accompanying the order. Plants available are: Austrian pine, black locust, black walnut (stratified seed), catalpa, Chinese elm, cottonwood, loblolly pine, mulberry, osage orange, ponderosa pine, red cedar, multiflora rose, slash pine, shortleaf pine, sycamore, Russian olive, euonymus and buffaloberry.

Practice D-1 of the ACP Program will help farmers build up their soil for increased returns. This practice, "Establishing annual winter legumes for protection from erosion," is a cost share program, where 50 per cent of the cost is allowed. Austrian Winter Peas, Dixie Wonder Peas, Hairy Vetch, Vetch and Rye, Vetch and Oats, will qualify. Early fall plantings are advisable, and legume seed should be inoculated.

Pasturing consistent with good management is permitted, but none of the growth may be harvested for seed, hay, silage or cut for use as "green grass forage." Volunteer stands will not qualify. Cost sharing of fertilizer will be based on recommenda-

tions of a recent soil test, with rates not to exceed the equivalent of 200 lbs. of 10-30-10 or less than 100 lbs. of 0-20-0.

The crop must be left on the land until March 15, then may be used as the farmer wishes. Farmers should keep in mind that most of the fertilizer will still be in the soil, and that the crops that follow will benefit greatly from the fertilizer left over, as well as the organic matter and nitrogen resulting from the planting of a legume.

On irrigated land, moisture is no problem, but on dryland, this acreage may be used as diverted acreage required for compliance with other programs, thereby allowing the farmer to utilize the results of the legume and fertilizer the following year, if moisture is the limiting factor. For seeding rates, fertilizer rates, and soil testing, contact Tommy Moore, ASC Office manager, or myself.

Grain Sorghum producers who have grain crops that look like they will produce good yields may be interested in entering the Texas Hybrid Grain sorghum Contest. There are separate contests for irrigated and dryland grain sorghum, with prizes of \$50, \$35, \$25, \$10 and \$5 given. Varieties eligible are RS 608, 609, 610, 620, 650, 661, 681, Texas 601, 620 and 660. The acreage must be staked, and a moisture test taken (over 20 per cent disqualifies the contestant). The weight ticket must be attached to the entry report form. Entries must be received by Sept. 15, so if you are interested, please let me know by this date.

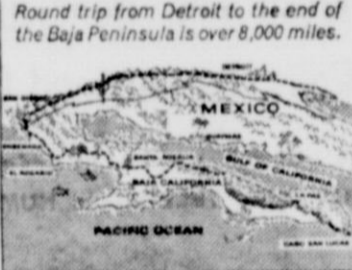

### USDA Opens Cotton Office At Memphis

To give cotton farmers in this area more convenient and faster classing service, the U. S. Department of Agriculture opens its Memphis cotton classing office Wednesday, Sept. 19.

Operating now for the fourth season, the Memphis cotton classing office serves 56 gins in Armstrong, Briscoe, Carson, Childress, Collingsworth, Cottle, Donley, Gray, Hall, King, Motley and Wheeler counties.

Kermit E. Voelkel, who has been with the cotton division of USDA's Agricultural Marketing Service for 31 years, is in charge of the Memphis office this season.

During the peak ginning season, the Memphis office has facilities for classing about 5,000 samples per day.

Last year, the Memphis office classed 217,432 bales of cotton, according to Mr. Voelkel.

### Warning Made On Child Employment

Local officers have been asked to remind all citizens of the federal law regarding the employment of school age children during school hours.

It is a federal offense to employ anyone between the ages of 6 and 16 on the days and during the hours the public schools are in session. The penalty is on the employer (farmer or landowner) and can be as much as \$10,000 fine and jail sentence.

State officers declare that any farmer who may be in doubt regarding the age of an employee should require a birth certificate, which the employee can obtain through the T.E.C. (Texas Employment Commission) without charge.
