## County Vote Light In Stormy Primary

ESTIMATED 25% of Motley County's voting strength stayed away from the polls Saturday in the stormy Democratic primary that showed an unofficial total vote of 713. Estimates were that slightly less than 1,000 voters were qualified. The Republicans polled six votes in a primary held here at Fred's Motel.

The State Representative race between W. S. (Bill) Healy of Paducah and Alex Saied of Childress, and the County Democratic Chairman race between incumbent Furman Vinson and S. J. Braselton were calculated to bring the voters out in large numbers.

Healy carried the county by the small margin of 83 votes after losing Flomot (H35, 549) and Northfield (H2, 524). Whiteflat gave Healy 33 to Saied's 22, Roaring Springs voted 94 for Healy and 50 for Saied, while Matador showed Healy 200 to Saied's 138.

Vinson defeated Braselton by 43 votes (345 to 302) for the Democratic chairmanship. In Matador Vinson received 199 to Braselton's 131, while in Roaring Springs Braselton received 93 to Vinson's 44. Flomot voted for Vinson 52 to 33, while Northfield voted for Braselton 10 to 9. In Whiteflat the vote was Vinson 28 to Braselton 24.

Exercising his voting privileges for the first time was Larry Hoyle, son of Mr. and Mrs. Mike Hoyle, who drove from Texas Tech, Lubbock, Saturday and remained just long enough to cast his vote.

In the Precinct Chairman race Judy Graham (unopposed) received 328 in the Matador No. 1 voting precinct. At Roaring Springs J. N. Fletcher (unopposed) received 150 votes for voting precinct 4. A. K. Wilkinson (unopposed) received 61 votes in Whiteflat's voting precinct 5. In Flomot voting precinct 2, Sam Ross received 60 to James Ross's 25. At Northfield's voting precinct 3, W. T. Moore (unopposed) received 26.

There was a sprinkling of write-ins including 17 votes here for ex-county judge Vance Gilbreath against County Judge Elbert Reeves who was unopposed. In one West Texas county two write-in votes were polled for Billy Sol Estes for Commissioner of Agriculture.

Graduation exercises for Matador Grade School have been announced for 10 a. m. Monday, May 14. The program will be held in the high school auditorium.

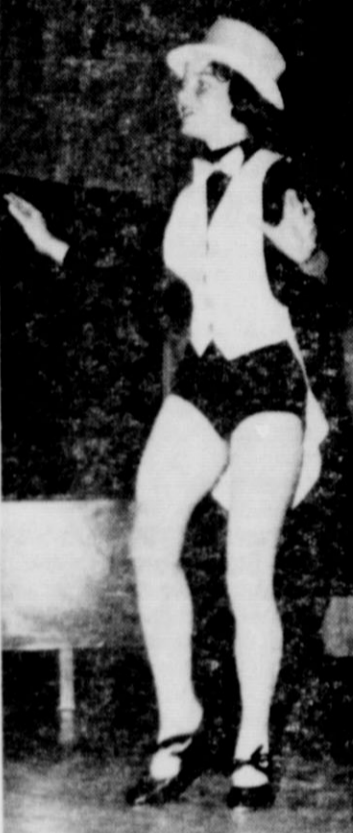
