The athiest Titov is typical Russian and typically insincere-He is the product of an insidious movement and form of government that has squeezed men's lives to a strong dry pulp. Titov's eyes are blinded to all but the things he has been told to see.

Titov believes many things he cannot see. He knows that his own ears can hear the whisper of a child on the other side of the world. 
