According to Agent Clawson, three

quest for an ARB hearing (called a notice of protest) before the deadline, the ARB will set your case for a hearing. You'll receive written notice of the time, date
and place of the hearing. The hearing will be informal. You and the appraisal district representative will be asked to pres ent evidence about your case. The ARB will make its decision based on the evi
dence presented. You can get a copy of dence presented. You can get a copy of office at P.O. Box 779, Matador, TX 79244.

Note: You shouldn't try to contact ARB members outside of the hearing. The law requires ARB members to sign an affidavit saying that they haven't talked
about your case before the ARB hears
