## Politics Mushroom At Time Countdown

REPUBLICAN FALLOUT was setting over Texas Tuesday morning after time countdown of midnight Monday Republican candidates were scattered the length and breadth of Texas, but all the mushroom clouds were not confined to the GOP. Democrats let loose bazooka charges at each other from some of the strongest strongholds. The lagging campaign suddenly burst into a free-for-all "hoss race".

The air is clear in Motley County. For the first time in more than 27 years since the Tribune started publishing under the present management, no county office is opposed. It is believed that the race may set a record since the county was organized more than 70 years ago.

Change in elective terms of office to four years, would affect the situation. Sheriff, two commissioners and county attorney are not candidates this year.

Candidates in two district offices have drawn opponents in last-minute announcements. Bill Healy of Paducah, who is a candidate for his fourth term as representative of the newly enlarged 82nd Legislative District, has an opponent from Childress after Will Ehrl's announcement that he would not run.

The candidate is Alex Saied, Childress businessman. Senator Andy Rogers of Childress has an opponent on the Democratic ticket, Robert Kirk, a Littlefield attorney and former Lamb County judge, and another on the Republican ticket. The Republican is John D. Zahn, a Farwell real estate dealer.

Motley County is now included in the enlarged 82nd Legislative District.

## Station Granted Building Permit For Translator

A building permit to construct a 200-foot tower and building to house equipment has been granted the Setliff Translator T-V Station by the Federal Communication Commission. Arville Setliff of Turkey, Tuesday received the following telegram from the FCC in Washington:

"UHF translator application Matador and Roaring Springs BPTT-644-646-647 granted by commission February 6, 1962. Construction may commence." The message was signed by Ben F. Wagle, acting secretary of the FCC.

The tower and building will be on a site leased from Harry Carter in the foothills about five miles west of Matador and near the location of a former gravel pit.

Setliff said construction would start just as soon as power lines could be brought to the site. He said the location would be surveyed and concrete run for foundation and concrete run for foundation.

He said with good weather he hopes to be in operation within 30 days. License for the station cannot be granted until after it has been on the air.

Setliff said approximately 170 applications for the service have been signed. A deposit has been paid on the equipment which will arrive as soon as the building and foundation are ready.

The station will be a 20-watt translator, of the most modern equipment and twice as powerful as the 10-watt station originally planned.

**Ranchers See Hope Of Eradication In Screwworm Plan**

Screwworms, bane of the cattle raiser since pioneer days, may soon be eliminated. That is the hope of stockmen and sportsmen of Texas and the Southwest supporting a plan by the Southwest Animal Health Research Foundation. Texas is attempting to raise \$3 million through voluntary contributions.

Johnny Stevens, chairman of the Motley County Screwworm Control program, said it is estimated that savings will amount to \$200 million from screwworm damage and treatment costs within the next two years, if the plan is placed in operation.

The fund drive is being intensified to take advantage of the hard freeze recently which dealt the flesh-eating parasite a crippling blow. Trustees of the foundation are moving forward with their plans to get the male sterile fly release program underway within the next few days.

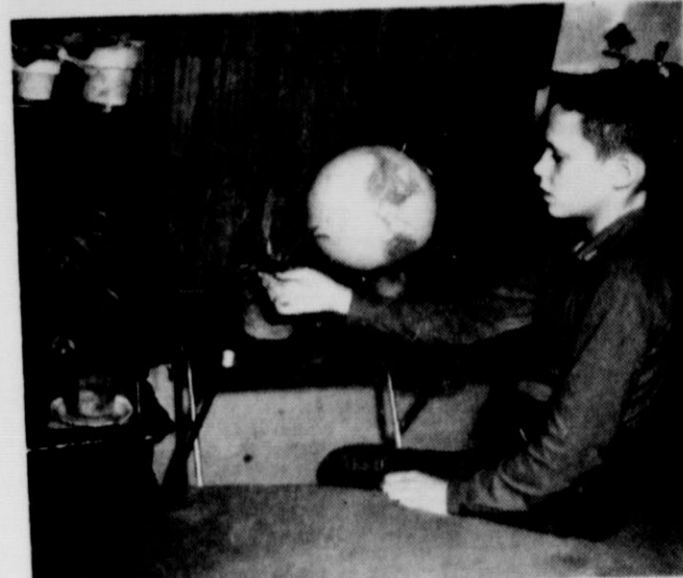
**Meeting Announced By Young Farmers**

## Inconsistent Mercury Presents Problem To Young Horticulturist 'Sparky' Meason

GROWING ORCHIDS in West Texas can develop some problems when the mercury drops to around zero, or when the humidity all but vanishes during a dry spell. Some of them have been solved by Harold "Sparky" Meason, 13, son of Mr. and Mrs. Melvin Meason of Matador.

He is growing an orchid which is "expecting" to bloom in June or July. The heat and humidity problems are solved by changing the size of light bulbs, plastic covering to retain the humidity, and a great amount of attention.

In addition to the orchid, Sparky is growing some strange plants, including a joint of sugar cane, which has taken root. He has a spider plant, orange tree, pineapple, five species of African violets, a snake plant, palm of paradise, an Old Man of the Mountains cactus, a woodoo plant (almost ready to bloom) and he has on order an anthurium which will bloom within a few weeks.

Sparky suffered some disappointment when his African violets failed to bloom, since they are of extremely lush growth and in reading up on the plants he learned that the use of artificial gas would cause them to fail to bloom.

He has been interested in plants since he was about six

years of age when flower shop manager Bill Seale gave him an ivy plant that seemed determined to curl up and die. Sparky nursed the ivy back to robust health and became interested in plants from the experience. He reads everything he can find that deals with unusual plants and is now starting a snake orchid or Cobra Lily, which catches and digests insects.

Interested in Science  
Sparky has his school work. He is in the eighth grade, but he has other interests besides his plants. He has a tank of tropical fish, which also must have proper temperature when the mercury is skidding up and down in thermometers.

His greatest interest, however, is chemistry. He has two chemistry sets, a high-powered microscope and a micro-projector by which he can study small things projected on a screen.

To further occupy his time Sparky has two dogs. When the weather is cold the Measons' light bill is in a high bracket.

He keeps lights burning in the garage for the dogs, in the house for the plants and also for the tropical fish. He did keep a light burning in a box for his Mexican jumping beans but he must have failed to turn it on during a recent cold night. He has just charged the beans off as a total loss.

## Address Points To Gifts Of Freedom

FREEDOM in a democracy is one of the greatest gifts that a mortal man may possess, yet it is frequently taken for granted. Often the people of this nation fail to take advantage of the privileges bestowed on them, County Agent Bill Palmeyer told his audience here Monday night. He was principal speaker at the regular joint meeting of Fleming Post American Legion and Ladies Auxiliary, following a covered dish buffet supper.

Mr. Palmeyer was introduced by Legionaire Randall Whitworth. Pointing to the contrast of privileges in a democracy and a dictatorship, he said:

"There is no choice in a country which has absolute rule of a dictator. Sham elections are held but there is only one candidate. The people are puppets of a few in authority."

He compared the liberties of people under the contrasting forms of government. He said he was impressed by the people he had met in the East during his trip to New York last year, because many of them had been born in foreign countries. "They know what freedom means," he declared, "because they have lived under dictators. I am proud I am an American," Mr. Palmeyer concluded.

**Dedication Ceremony**  
Feature of the program was a ceremony dedicating a piano to the Legion, a gift from Mrs. U. L. Willie. Addresses were made by Douglas Meador and County Judge Elbert Reeves, followed by a prayer by Judge Reeves. The program was sponsored by Legionaire Whitworth with announcements by Commander J. L. Woodruff.

**Pampa Livestock Recovered Here**  
Four head of livestock stolen from John Todd of Pampa on January 8, had been recovered here. The cattle were turned loose on State Highway 70 and ranged east to the Ben Edwards place.

Mr. Edwards saw the cattle for a day or two and supposed they belonged to a neighbor. Later he noticed they were suffering for water and turned them in on his place, then notified Sheriff Jinks Wilson.

It was supposed that someone in the area would report the livestock missing. There was no report, and last week Mr. Edwards requested the sheriff to bring the cattle here and see if he could find the owners.

Sheriff Wilson notified Texas Cattle Raisers Association inspector Boots O'Neil of Paducah who immediately informed him that he had a complete description of the cattle and that they had been stolen from Pampa.

Sheriff R. H. Jordan of Pampa and Mr. Todd came here this week and took the livestock back. The four head comprised the entire livestock possession of Mr. Todd, a tractor operator. He expressed his appreciation to Mr. Edwards and Sheriff Wilson, saying he never expected to see the cattle again.

There is no clue as to why the cattle were unloaded in the north part of this county, but it is presumed that the trailer hauling them might have broken down.

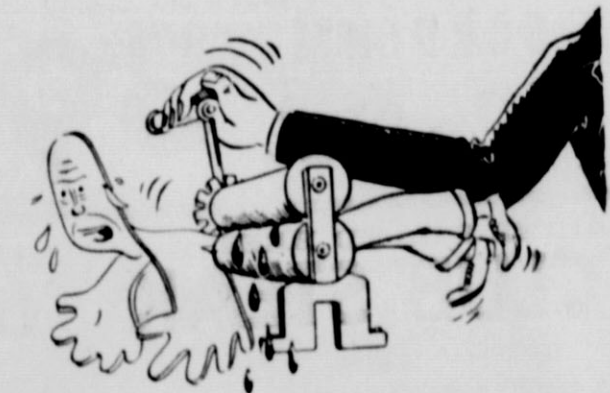

1900 lbs. per acre, PAG-515-S produced 1900 lbs. per acre, C-45 produced 1900 lbs. per acre, TE-66 produced 1100 lbs. per acre, and TE-55 produced 1000 lbs. per acre.

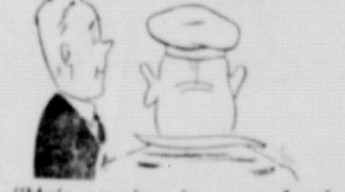
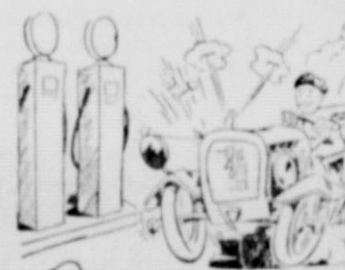
