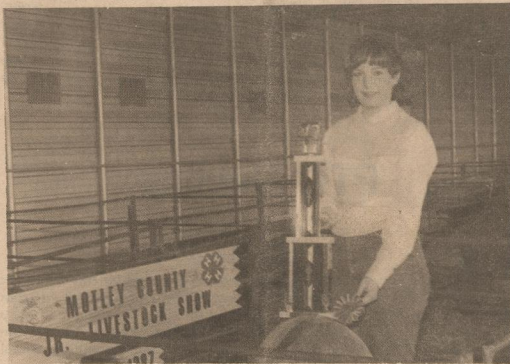

Voters will be selecting two members for the Motley County Board of Trustees at the polls Saturday, April 4. Persons whose board terms expire this year are Roy G. Hobbs and Dan Brandon. These places are for three years each. Brief information about the ten candidates are being printed as follows.

ALVIN ALEXANDER, age 42, of Matador since the fall of 1986, is employed as Riffe Petroleum Company Sales Engineer. He is married to the former Seven Smith and they have two sons, David and Daniel. Alvin graduated from Benjamin High School and a University of Texas of El Paso Engineer graduate. No comment as to why he is running for school board was available.

L.J. BARKLEY, JR., age 62, was born and raised in Matador and graduated from Matador High School. He attended Texas A&M and Texas Tech Universities. He is a Construction Management Consultant. He and his wife Eva have two children Tanya, age 6 and Llan age 4. They returned to Matador in 1985.

Mr. Barkley comments, "I have decided to run for the position to assist in insuring a high quality of education, in a healthy, safe, environment, for the children of Motley County within the framework of funds available."

Roaring Springs City Council Review Secretary Applications

The Roaring Springs City Council met March 3 at City Hall with Mayor Eugene Watson presiding. Present were Councilmen Gene Brannon, Roy Hernandez and Jean Adams with city secretary Odessa Mullins taking minutes.

GTE representatives Joe Vandiver and Jim Boseman expressed their need to find property to relocate the GTE tower. They stated they had found suitable property near the T.V. tower that they will be looking into purchasing. Vandiver also invited comments from the council relating to telephone problems.

Secretary Mullins read the past council minutes which the council made two corrections and then approved them.

Applications for the city secretary position were reviewed by the council. The council decided to call applicants in for an interview.

A lease for the 4-H Club to use the High School building was presented to the council for review.

\$3400.00 worth of bills were reviewed and approved to be paid, leaving a balance of \$4753 in the General account. Secretary Mullins stated that \$7027.77 had been deposited in the water account - of which \$4421.94 were paid out in bills and labor. \$8657.75 had been deposited in the General Act. and the \$7629.86 bank note had been paid off.

Secretary Mullins stated that the city owed \$483.43 to the law firm collecting on delinquent taxes. The council voted to pay this balance.

Mention was made of a business interested in relocating in Roaring Springs and was looking at the grade school building.

The council discussed a loan made to city waterman David Saenz of \$725 to attend an electrical school. This loan is to be repaid at \$30/month and to be withheld from his check. Saenz had asked the council to reimburse him for a \$75 past due plumbing fee he had done on his own time. The council voted to pay this.

Summer Basketball Camp

Social Security Tips

A person who is under 65 and disabled is automatically covered under Medicare hospital insurance after he or she has been entitled to Social Security disability benefits for 24 months.

A widow or widower between 50 and 65 who has been disabled for at least 2 years but who has not applied for Social Security disability benefits because he or she is receiving other Social Security benefits may be eligible for hospital insurance. Additional information about this coverage may be obtained at any Social Security office.

A government employee who is disabled before 65 may be eligible for Medicare on the basis of his or her government employment. In general, a 29-month waiting period is required before hospital insurance protection can start; however, the person should contact a Social Security office as soon as he or she becomes disabled.

A worker, his or her spouse, or dependent child who needs kidney dialysis or a kidney transplant

should also apply for Medicare at any Social Security office. If the person is unable to visit an office, the application process can be started by phone, or a Social Security representative can visit the home.

If the person is eligible for Medicare, protection generally starts with the third month following the month in which maintenance dialysis treatments begin; however, under certain condition, coverage could start earlier. The people in the Social Security office can provide information about the time Medicare protection will actually begin.

Plainview Police Officer Switches Careers

The Plainview Police department lost a 10-year veteran Friday when Sgt. Larry Keltz left to take a job in the private sector.

The 39-year Matador native had been with the force since 1977 and served as its juvenile officer for most of his tenure.

In fact, he was hired to set up the department's juvenile division after working for more than a year as a probation officer for the Hale County Juvenile Probation Department.

Married and the father of two young children, Keltz holds a master's degree in counseling from West Texas State University and is also a licensed mortician. Prior to getting into the juvenile field, he worked for 12 years as a mortician in Dallas, Lubbock and Plainview.

His wife Sandy operates a licensed child-care center in Plainview.

Starting Monday, he goes to work as a "rehabilitation specialist" for Intracorp of Lubbock - which is owned by the Signa Insurance Co. of Philadelphia.

His new job will consist of monitoring and working with insurance claimants who have been injured on the job, in car wrecks or other types of accidents.

He's leaving police work because he wants "to get into more of a counseling field than law enforcement. Besides, it means a good raise in pay and better benefits. But I'm sure I'll miss police work. I've made a lot of good friends there."

In addition to his duties as the department's only juvenile officer, he did background investigation on prospective police officers and municipal judges.

On the issue of juvenile delinquency, Keltz said: "The problems you see with juveniles are a symptom of the problems of the whole family."

If given a free hand to help reduce the problem, Keltz noted

that he would like to see "the whole family required by law to seek counseling and have ongoing monitoring of their progress."

"Except for extreme cases, juveniles don't receive professional counseling. The juvenile probation department does a good job, but they're not professional counselors; they're officers of the court."

The root cause of the juvenile problem, according to Keltz, is that "a lot of parents are out doing their own thing. They aren't willing to provide responsible leadership for their children."

"I don't mean to sound like all kids in Plainview are bad. On average, we handle only about 300 a year - a small percentage of the school-age population here. We've also got a lot of parents who give their children a good, positive role model and who also provide a good moral and spiritual foundation."

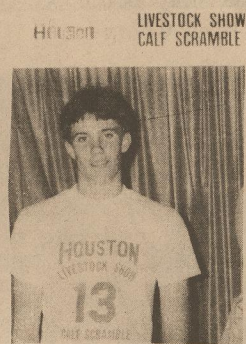
As with most police work, there's no way to tell if you've been successful in helping someone.

"We don't get much feedback," said Keltz. "So we don't really know if we've helped straighten a kid out."

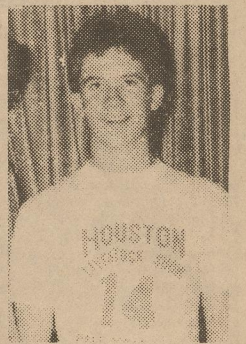
Chief of Police Roy Osborne said Friday that Det. Sgt. Carol DeBerry will assume Keltz's job in the juvenile division.

Patrol officers seeking a transfer to the detective position left vacant by Mrs. DeBerry will take written and oral exams Monday and Tuesday.

The resulting patrol vacancy will be filled from a list of applicants already on file, Osborne added.

I agree with the UFCW. They're working to get Congress to pass strong regulations so the government has to consider the impact on employees and consumers before any buyouts can take place.

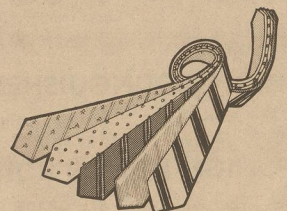

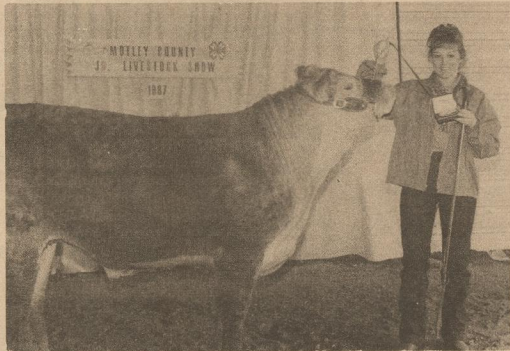
