## Highway Work Is Progressing

Highway work on US 70 west of Matador is progressing satisfactorily according to Algie Groves, Resident Engineer of the Texas Highway Department and in charge of supervision.

Dirt work is expected to get under way this week by Bryan Hoffman of Plainview, general contractor. Currently culverts are being widened by Pat Shaver, Inc. of Lubbock, who has located a modern concrete mixing plant immediately north of Job's Oil Well service station.

Major operation at present is the crushing and stock piling of 180,000 cu. yards of conglomerate on the Bundy Campbell Ranch near Highway 70, which will be used as base material.

The 13 plus miles of construction will include a wide two lane road with a third or climbing lane on hills. It is estimated the construction will require 200 working days.

## Scouts Near Eclipse Area During Canoe Trip; See Northern Lights

Six members of Matador Boy Scout Troop No. 60, and their Advisor, Douglas Pitts Jr., arrived home Saturday about 6 p.m. from a 3000-mile trip to the Canadian border, where they spent eight days in canoes on the lakes of National Superior or National Forest in Minnesota and the Quetico National Wilderness area on the Canadian side.

They were close to the eclipse of the sun. Nights were almost as light as day until about 10:30 p.m. and one memorable experience they will remember was the spectacular appearance one night, of the aurora borealis, or northern lights.

The boys made fifteen or twenty portages over rocky terrain to about fifteen lakes, carrying canoes and equipment. The crew was divided, with three boys and about 200 pounds of equipment to a canoe. Approximately 400 pounds of food

## Impressed By Lakes

There are between ten and fifteen thousand lakes in the area and the vast amount of water seemed to impress the boys from West Texas more than anything else, although they admired the beautiful scenery. The absence of high mountains was a surprise to them, and they were disappointed in the lack of wildlife and fish in this particular area.

One aspect of the water was the presence of iron ore. "When we emerged from the water after a swim," one reported, "our bodies had a copper colored hue. However, the water was very soft, and soap lathered profusely in it."

After leaving the canoe base Thursday, to return home they visited one of the Minnesota pit iron ore mines, claimed to be the largest in the world. Adding a dash of romance to the trip was a visit made by the boys, to a Girls Scout Camp in the vicinity.

"The girls were very nice," said one of the boys. "They sang 'The Eyes of Texas' when they found out we were from Texas. But it disgruntled our guide, who was a native of Minnesota."

## Flower of Romance Blooms in Matador

A ROSE bush that provided the atmosphere for the beginning of a romance 45 years ago, is blooming this summer in Matador. It was moved here from Pecos and has been transplanted ten times.

A single bud burst on the large rose bush at a farm home near Winters, Texas that Friday night, May 12, 1915. A boy, W. R. Puckett, and a girl, Ida B. Enos, met that night and the single rose bud was a symbol of the meeting.

Five years later the boy and girl were married at Belton while she was a student at Mary Hardin Baylor. The aunt who owned the rose bush built a new home four miles away and the young couple asked if they might have the bush. Permission was given and they moved the plant to a rented house in the same county (Runnels). Later they moved it to another house and finally, to a home of their own. Thus, the rose bush was moved three times in the same county.

In 1952 Mr. and Mrs. Puckett moved to Floydada and took the rose bush there, where they lived until 1960, when they moved to Pecos — with the rose.

This year Mr. and Mrs. Puckett moved to Matador, where he is manager of the insurance department of the Farm Bureau. They now live in the McElroy home in Russell addition, where the bush is again blooming. Mr. and Mrs. Puckett returned to Pecos to bring the rose here.

Mr. and Mrs. Puckett have three children, two sons and a daughter. They are Dale Puckett of Seminole, Sam Puckett of Floydada and Mrs. N. L. Haynie of Plainview.

The rose bush which was once shoulder high, has been pruned many times and Mr. Puckett said the blooms have always been small. But to a couple who have watched it bloom for 45 summers, it is a very special rose.
