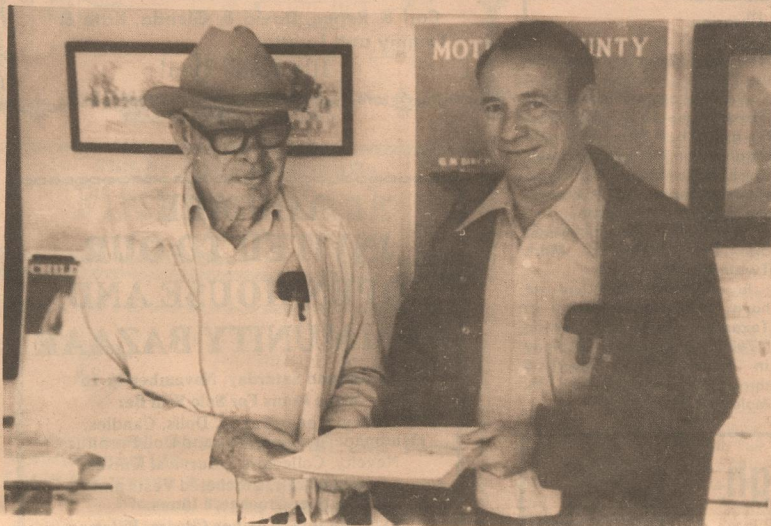

## Funds For M.C.I.S.D. Past Commander Of Legion Honored On Veterans' Day

In 1959, cotton producers in twelve eastern Texas Panhandle counties, including Cottle, King and Motley counties, organized a Government Cotton Classing sub-office in Memphis, Texas.

The producer's organization then formed a non-profit corporation named the Rolling Plains Cotton Producers Association, Inc. (later changed to the Greenbelt Cotton Producers Association, Inc.) of which D. E. Brunson of Quitaque and Joe Degan of Flomot served as

Directors.

In a recent meeting of the corporation, it was unanimously decided that the corporation had served its purpose and should be dissolved. According to the by-laws, the remaining proceeds were to be distributed among the school districts within its legal boundaries.

The assets of the corporation have been liquidated and the Motley County Independent School District received its proportionate share which amounted to \$1,895.93.

## Commissioners' Court This Week

The Motley County Commissioners Court met in regular session Monday morning, Nov. 11 at the Motley County courthouse with Judge Billy Joe Whitaker presiding. Commissioners present were John M. Russell, Bill D. Washington, Joseph Simpson and Frazier Watson and County Clerk, Mrs. R.E. (Lucretia) Campbell, Jr.

Invocation was given by Mr. Russell followed by the reading and approval of the minute of Commissioners meeting, Oct. 14.

Simpson seconded the motion. When Howard Traweek, county attorney completes the legal transaction, Mrs. Campbell will transfer the monthly utility costs to the Homecoming Assn.

### Library Funds

Mrs. Frank Potts requested a compensation pay for the library trainee and part time wages for trainer until trainee can assume the full responsibilities of the library. Mr. Russell made a motion to pay these wages until a Dec. 1, 1985 deadline and it was seconded by Mr. Washington.

### Delinquent Taxes

Forrest Campbell, Motley County Tax Appraiser, informed the Commissioners Court that by Nov. 13 he would complete the complicity of delinquent taxes for county, school and hospital district for the last 20 years. He said that this was only as accurate as the records made available to him. He respectfully requested that he be relieved of any involvement of controversies and if any, they be referred to the Sheriff's office.

Judge Whitaker commended Campbell for the approximately

100 hours of required work in the neighborhood of \$1000 he did as a civic duty. It was also brought to the attention of those present that Campbell has saved the county approximately \$50,000 annually serving as M.C. Tax Appraiser.

### Bills and More

The monthly bills were read by Mr. Watson. They were discussed and motion made by Mr. Washington and seconded to approve payments. These were General Fund: \$5,584.84 which included expenses for courthouse, Matador Fire Department, Senior Citizens, Community Action Center, room and board of prisoners in Dickens and other. Expenses of the Precincts were: I: \$1,145.95; II: \$2,337.00; III: \$1,344.40 and IV: \$458.27.

The Justice of the Peace report showed fines collected for the month of October were \$6,738.50 with \$5,120.50 of this remaining in Motley County. The remainder goes to State of Texas.

### Other Business

In other business, John M. Russell will serve on the Caprock Development Board as Motley County representative. Gid Simpson is the Motley County South Plains Association of Governments representative. He replaced Mayor Gary Lancaster who resigned from that board.

Frank and Marisue couldn't have chosen a more appropriate inscription for the plaque. Mr.



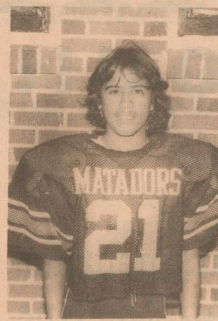
Bruce Marrs displaying portrait of L.B. (Bob) Robertson.

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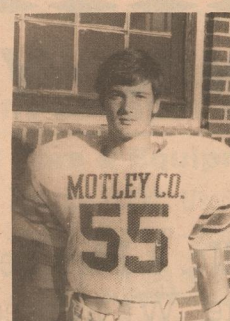

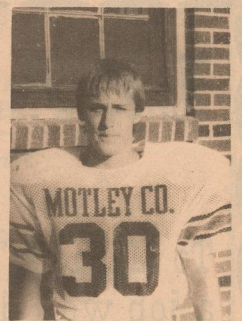

## Cummings To Direct Spelling Bee

Ronald Cummings, principal of Motley County School has been named by the Amarillo Globe-News and West Texas State University, Canyon, to direct the Motley County Spelling Bee.

The Amarillo newspaper and WTSU are sponsoring the National Spelling Bee for the 38th year for students in all public and parochial schools.

Rules state that no student who will be older than 16 by the end of the current school term or in a grade higher than the 8th may participate, beginning at the school level.

Directors choose dates for their respective county eliminations and are requested to report the best speller(s) in the county to the Amarillo Globe-News by March 29. Winners from 46 counties will meet on the WTSU campus on April 26 and name the 1986 district champion. This student will represent the area in the National Spelling Bee, sponsored by the Scripps Howard Newspapers, in Washington, D.C., during the last week of May.

All expenses for the 1986 area champ and one parent will be provided by the Amarillo Globe-News.

Gene Parker, director of placement, WTSU, serves as bee coordinator.

"We've worked with this program for 10 years and believe it serves to further our efforts in education. The young people who come to our campus as county finalists are outstanding and we encourage all schools in our four-state area to participate," Parker said. "The benefits are great."

The booklet, "Words of the Champions", containing more than 3,000 total words--an increase of 500 new words from 1985--is used in most schools and county bees. The booklet, priced at 50 cents each, is available from Jeane Bartlett, Spelling Bee Editor, Amarillo Globe-News, Box 2091, Amarillo, Texas 79166.

Interested students and school officials are encouraged to contact either Parker or Mrs. Bartlett for additional information.

A Junior Bee for young students, grades six and under, will also be conducted in each county at the discretion of the directors. All county junior winners will be special guests of the sponsors on April 26 in Canyon. Each will be given a trophy.

### Over-65 Homeowners May Postpone Payment of Property Taxes

By simply filing a sworn affidavit with the Motley County Appraisal District, homeowners age 65 and over in Motley County can defer payment of property taxes on their homesteads.

If an elderly taxpayer has already been sued to collect delinquent taxes on his homestead, he can still take advantage of the "over-65 tax deferral" by filing an affidavit with the court in which the suit is pending.

Forrest Campbell, chief appraiser of the Motley County Appraisal District, explained that once an over-65 taxpayer properly files the tax deferral affidavit, state law prevents taxing units from initiating or pursuing delinquent tax suits on the homestead for as long as the applicant owns and lives at that property.

Campbell said that elderly homeowners can obtain forms for the deferral affidavit at the Motley County Appraisal District office. The home owner should fill out the form and have his signature witnessed by a notary

public or other official authorized to take oaths, he added.

Campbell stressed that the tax deferral only postpones tax payments, it does not dismiss them. "Elderly homeowners should understand that the taxes, penalties and interest will continue to add up," he explained. "Once the homeowner no longer qualifies for the deferral--that is, if he no longer owns or resides at the homestead--all those deferred amounts must be paid. At that

time taxing units may sue to collect the delinquent taxes, penalties and interest, and forfeit on the property."

More information is available by contacting the Motley County Appraisal District at the courthouse.

# Rich Heritage Shared

Seventy-eight enthusiastic volunteers from a wide area shared their Motley County pioneering heritage with over 700 history buffs at the 1985 version of History Day at the Ranch on October 19 and 26. Included among the visitors from as far away as Odessa, Denver City and Lovington, N.M., were 336 students and teachers from Muleshoe, Levelland, Lamesa, Lubbock, Floydada, and Motley County who came to see history come alive in the foothills of the Caprock on a "real" ranch.

A sesquicentennial project for local members of the General James Smith Chapter of the Daughters of the Republic of Texas, the on-site history program provided vignettes of pioneer life to those too young to remember and those who

remembered all too well: the hard wooden seat of the mule-powered school wagon, the acrid smoke and sharp kick from a black powder gun, the wisp of smoke rising from a dugout chimney, the smell of boiling black coffee, the melancholy sound of a lone fiddle and guitar, the taste of sourdough biscuits soaked in bean juice, the whir of the lariat overhead, and

many tales of yesteryear to stir the imagination of what once might have been.

Among the new features to the second annual program were Mrs. Harold Campbell demonstrating the art of cooking over a dugout fireplace with utensils actually used in an early Motley County dugout. Judge Jay Johnson of Tulia, an ancestor

of the Drace family who once lived at the Mott, recounted the history of the line camp. Turkey, Texas, artist Otho Stubbs who specializes in Comancheria joined the Indian segment, using his well-researched paintings to illustrate his talk. Ben Loe, Spur cowboy who worked for the Matadors at Red Lake Camp, demonstrated his skill with the lasso, teaching interested youngsters how to rope. Shorty Klebold, Joe Gordon, and Fish Wilson joined the former Matador cowboys around the chuckwagon.

Many thank-you letters have been received. A former Texas History teacher wrote, "We were so impressed at all the folks of your county who were 'front and center' helping - each with an abundance of pride and

knowledge of the history there."

One quilting volunteer, a young Lubbock mother, stated, "To be in such beautiful country surrounded by people shaped so beautifully by that country was a rich experience. Listening to a rustling pecan tree and sharing life experiences over a pieced quilt made the generations somehow closer. Thank you for letting me be a part of that closeness, and a special thanks to you and your 'neighbors' for the many hours of planning and work that obviously made History Day a reality and a success."

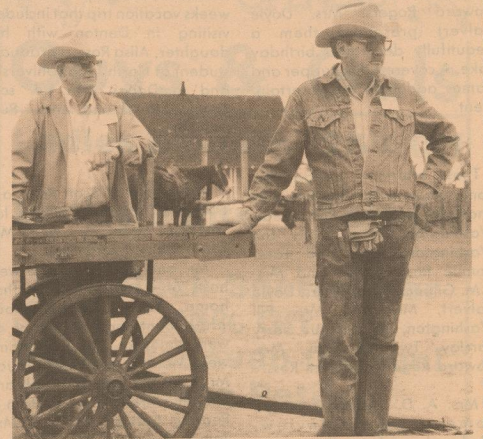




When other businesses were closing during the depression in 1932, he opened Bob's Oil Well. This construction representing an oil derrick, could be seen from many miles in any direction. By night the tower was brilliantly lighted and during the Christmas holidays, a colorful array of lights replaced the usual lights. It became a chief tourist attraction and a Matador landmark. Bob's Oil Well road signs were nationwide and in World War II, local boys who were stationed overseas saw the sign in Europe and the Pacific Islands. Travelers from over the entire nation stopped to visit his free zoo which at one time had lions, buffalos, coyotes, monkeys, native rattlesnakes and animals.

The Irishman rose from a service station operator to one of this South Plains town leading business men. After opening Bob's Oil Well, he later open Bob's Cook Shack. Following these two enterprises, he opened

Bob's Foodway grocery in what is now the Stanley Pharmacy. About this time, he constructed a new building and opened Bob's Garage. When he closed the garage, it was used for repair of his fleet of Conoco trucks plying the highways to wholesale and retail distribution.

A year before his death, he had a grand opening of a new Bob's Cook Shack, one of West Texas finest eating places. When you entered this business establishment, you stepped into a pioneer era with historical western furniture, mirrors, a bar and Motley County countryside wood and rock decor.

His civic accomplishments were numerous. He backed anything he felt would benefit Matador and surrounding communities. As an active member of the Matador Lions Club, he was one of the main promoters for one of Motley County's best known celebrations, Shannon Davidson Day. He was also a benefiting

factor when the streets were paved in the Matador business district. The ornate rock gateway at East Mound Cemetery was one of his many visions which became a reality. It was his leadership and work which made this cemetery one of the most beautiful burial plots in the area.

Mr. Robertson would have been one of the first to sanction the courtesy of the members of the local American Legion Post who let the M.C. Library use the conveniently located Legion building. As people of all ages walk past his picture to check out one of the many books available on education, geneology and reading pleasure, you can imagine his smile of satisfaction.

Luther Bedford Robertson was born in Greenville, Texas, Aug. 28, 1894 and died on January 15, 1947.

Yes, Bob Robertson was a promoter of Matador as well as members of the Fleming Post American Legion.
