Funds For M.C.I.S.D.

In 1959, cotton producers in twelve eastern Texas Panhandle counties, including Cottle, King and Motley counties, organized a Government Cotton Classing sub-office in emphis, Texas.

The producer's organization then formed a

non-profit corporation named the Rolling Plains
Cotton Producers Association, Inc. (later
changed to the Greenbelt Cotton Producers
Assocation, Inc.) of which D. E. Bruson of
Quitaque and Joe Degan of Flomot served as

Directors.

In a recent meeting of the corporation, it was unanimously decided that the corporation had served its purpose and should be dissolved. According to the by-laws, the remaining proceeds were to be distributed among the school districts within its legal boundaries.

The assets of the corporation have been liquidated and the Motley County Independent School District received its proportionate share which amounted to \$1,895.93.

The Motley County Commissioners Court met in regular session Monday morning, Nov.
11 at the Motley County courthouse with Judge Billy Joe Whitaker presiding. Commissioners present were John M. Russell, Bill D. Washington, Joseph Simpson and Frazier Watson and County Clerk, Mrs. R.E. (Lucretia) Campbell, Jr. Invocation was given by Mr.

Russell followed by the reading
and approval of the minute of Commissioners meeting, Oct. 14.

Northfield Community
Planning Committee
Mrs. Clem Timmons, secretary
and treasurer of the Northfield
Community Planning Committee,
gave a report on the meeting
held Oct. 22. Twenty five of the thirty-nine members attended and with a show of unity voted 21-0 to present a request to the Commissioners' Court for the deed to the vacant Northfield School for the Northfield Homecoming Association. Mr. Russell made the motion that the county property be deeded to the Homecoming Assn. and Mr.

Simpson seconded the motion. When Howard Traweek, county attorney completes the legal transaction, Mrs. Campbell will transfer the monthly utility costs to the Homecoming Assn.

Delinquent Taxes

He said that this was only as accurate as the records made available to him. 



Over-65 Homeowners May Postpone Payment of Property Taxes By simply filing a sworn affidavit with the Motley County

deferral only postpones tax payments, it does not dismiss them. "Elderly homeowners should understand that the taxes, penalties and interest will continue to add up," he explained. "Once the homeowner no longer qualifies for the deferral--that is, if he no longer owns or resides at the homestead--all those deferred amounts must be paid. At that

nomesteads.

If an elderly taxpayer has already been sued to collect delinquent taxes on his homestead, he can still take advantage of the "over-65 tax deferral" by filing an affidavit with the court in which the suit is reparding.

with the court in which the suit is pending.
Forrest Campbell, chief appraiser of the Motley County Appraisal District, explained that once an over-65 taxpayer properly files the tax deferral affidavit, state law prevents taxing units from initiating or pursuing delinquent tax suits on the homestead for as long as the applicant owns and lives at that

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

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

When other businesses were closing during the depression in 1932, he opened Bob's Oil Well. This construction representing an oil derrick, could be seen from many miles in any direction. By night the tower was brilliantly lighted and during the Christmas holidays, a colorful array of lights replaced the usual lights. It became a chief tourist attraction and a Matadar landmark. Bob's
Oil Well road signs were nation
wide and in World War II, local
boys who were stationed
overseas saw the sign in Europe
and the Pacific Islands.

Travelers from over the entire nation stopped to visit his free zoo which at one time had lions, buffalos, coyotes, monkeys native rattlesnakes and animals

The Irishman rose from a service station operater to one of this South Plains town leading business men. After opening business men. After opening Bob's Oil Well, he later open Bob's Cook Shack. Following these two enterprises, he opened


Bob's Foodway grocery in what is now the Stanley Pharmacy. About this time, he constructed a new building and opened Bob's Garage. When he closed the garage, it was used for repair of his fleet of Conoco trucks plying the highways to wholesale and retail distribution.

A year before his death, he had a grand opening of a new had a grand opening of a new Bob's Cook Shack, one of West Texas finest eating places. When you entered this business establishment, you stepped into a pioneer era with historical western furniture, mirrors, a bar and Motley County countryside wood and rock decor. His civic accomplishments

His civic accomplishments were numerous. He backed anything he felt would benefit Matador and surrounding communities. As an active member of the Matador Lions Club, he was one of the main promotoers for one of Motley County's best known cele-brations, Shannon Davidson Day. He was also a benefiting factor when the streets were paved in the Matador business district. The ornate rock gateway at East Mound Cemetery was one of his many visions which became a reality. It was his leadership and work which made this cemetery one of the most beautiful burial plots in the area.
