Club has Program On Rose Culture

Matador Garden Club heard a program on Rose Culture in regular meeting Monday, May 20 at the home of Mrs. Pat Sheridan. Mrs. Vance Gilbreath served as leader in the absence of Mrs. W. F. Jacobs.

Mrs. Forrest Campbell gave Mrs. W. N. Ppkin's paper on "All-America Roses of 1962 — the Best for '63" and showed pictures of the roses and discussed their outstanding qualities.

The best rose for 1963 is Royal Highness, which was developed from a seedling of Peace rose. The Peace rose has the highest score of any rose to the present date. With ten as perfect, Peace rates 9.6.

Mrs. Bob Martin gave a talk on "Feeding and Care of Roses." She stated that late September or October is the best time to set roses out, here. "Roses need frequent spraying for insects. . . never sprinkle roses . . . water deep, mulch or work up top soil," she advised. "Roses do best in an acid soil."

Mrs. Sheridan discussed "Preparing Roses for Exhibition," pointing out that they must be disbudded early so no scar will show. Stems need to be long, but not over eighteen inches, and a plastic bag over the buds will help protect them. A brown paper bag over that helps retain color, she said.

Jane Hamilton was a special guest of the club and gave a very interesting report on her trip to Girl's State which the Garden Club helped sponsor.
