In Flomot Independent District Herb Martin received 41 votes, Everett Shorter 35, Alfred Martin 24 and Lejuene Turner 27. A total of 17 write-in votes was counted.

At Roaring Springs J.M. Thacker received 40 votes, Alvin Durham 33, with 23 write-in votes being recorded.

Here in Matador Billy Wason received 66 votes, Stuart Dixon 44 and Hal Courtney 59, with 25 write-in votes among six names.

Two members were re-elected to the county board of trustees. Delmont Hays received 10 votes in precinct 3 at Northfield and H. C. Smith received 44 votes in precinct 4, Roaring Springs.

TWO ANGUS STEERS Saturday were awarded Grand Champion and Reserve Champion honors at the 24th Annual Motley County Junior Livestock Show. It was not the first time that Angus cattle had won top places in this predominately Hereford ranching county but it is unusual. Few could disagree with judge Robert Ledbetter of Silverton when he selected the superb animals for the top honors. Grand Champion Steer (1045 lbs.) was exhibited by Kate Thompson, daughter of Mr. and Mrs. Manly Thompson of Matador. The reserve Champion steer (820 lbs.) was exhibited by Frank Watson, son of Mr. and Mrs. Son Watson of Roaring Springs. Prizes awarded in the show totalled \$554.50.

Banker John L. Barnhill Tuesday was elected mayor of Matador for a two year term with 41 votes in a "light" municipal election. Howard Edmondson, former city secretary, received 12 votes for councilman and Freddie Welling received 41.

"The Sea of Giving" Topic for Annual Pledge Service by WSCS

"The Sea of Giving" was program topic for the annual pledge service held Monday night, March 30 by members of the Woman's Society of Christian Service in the Youth room of the Methodist educational building.

Mrs. Melvin Meason, leader gave the purposes of the service: to meditate on God's lovingkindness to us; to consider the needs of others; and to seek God's guidance in sharing our abundance.

"The sea has played a large part in the development and spread of Christianity — both literally and symbolically," she stated. "Much of Jesus' own ministry took place along the Sea of Galilee. Visitors to the Holy Land invariably want to visit that lake where the Master walked and talked . . . and went about doing good . . . the sea has added great richness to Christian symbolism. The fish is a sign used by early Christians to reveal their identity to other believers. The shell is an early Christian symbol for a pilgrim, a person who travels on the Lord's business. Today, a ship riding the waves is the symbol of the World Council of Churches," Mrs. Meason continued.

Four members representing a public health nurse, a woman of Africa, a woman of Sarawak, and a church member in a city slum in the United States were also on the program. These were Mesdames J. R. Whitworth, Olive Russell, W. F. Jacobs and A. J. Daffern.

I have been actively engaged in the practice of Law 29 years — 22 in Lamb County and the Plains area and 7 years in Amarillo and the Panhandle. By diligence and loyalty to my clients and my record in the Courts of this District are the best recommendations. I served on the Court of Civil Appeals and as Associate Justice of the Court of Civil Appeals in 176 opinions with only 12 dissents. These opinions reflect the character of my judicial ability.

The Court of Civil Appeals is composed of a Chief Justice, a Justice Associate and a Junior Associate Justice. The Chief Justice and Junior Associate of the Court, no matter how diligent and capable, cannot carry the work required of the Court. The other Associate devotes a

large portion of his time to outside diversions. I served on this Court until December 31, 1956 and the docket was in good condition during that time. The docket of the Court was not only kept up to date but the Court disposed of many cases transferred to the Amarillo Court from the Dallas Court of Civil Appeals. Although the number of cases before the Court have not increased, this condition no longer exists — thirteen cases were transferred from the Amarillo Court to the Waco Court of Civil Appeals on January 11, 1964.

More important than the mere number of cases disposed of by the Court is the type of justice

under the law as reflected by the Court's opinions. In 1956 the majority of the Court, being the Chief Justice and the other Associate Justice, wrote an opinion styled "Stanley V. Stanley, 294 S.W. 2d, Page 132." This case reflects that a 40-year-old career army sergeant married a former school teacher who had been successful in the finance business. The sergeant contributed nothing to the marriage but, the undisputed record discloses, in six years squandered \$84,044.63 of the profits earned by his wife's business. He also squandered \$41,911.13 of the wife's capital investment. On dissolution of the marriage, it was the sergeant's theory the wife had mingled her earnings, as community property, with her separate capital and through such commingling of her earnings with her separate capital, he was entitled to one-half of all remaining property owned by his wife. In the judgment of divorce, the trial court awarded the sergeant an additional sum of \$29,881.89.

The widow appealed from the trial court's judgment and on appeal the Chief Justice and the other Associate Justice of the Court of Civil Appeals, such Associate being now a candidate for election to the Court, agreed with the sergeant's theory and affirmed the judgment of the trial court awarding him the additional sum of \$29,881.89. This opinion of the majority of the Court was directly contrary to the undisputed audit of a Certified Public Accountant who traced all funds and proved that all the wife's earnings had been squandered by the sergeant and a large part of her original capital and that her earnings were not mingled with her capital. As an Associate Justice of the Court, based on this audit and the applicable law, I wrote a dissenting opinion holding that the sergeant was only entitled to his equity in a 1955 Station Wagon for which he had traded an old Station Wagon owned by him at the time of the marriage.

Other similar and equally inequitable opinions were rendered by the Court acting as a majority and on which I dissented, but the above opinion is discussed here because the same reflects clearly and unequivocally the opposite points of view on the duty of the Court as held by me and my opponent for Associate Justice. The most essential element of every judgment of the Court of Civil Appeals should be justice under the law and facts. If the citizens of this district will take a few minutes

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time to go to a lawyer's office and read the Stanley opinion, I am confident I will be elected to the Court of Civil Appeals by an overwhelming majority vote.

As a member of such Court, I never have and never shall subscribe to the proposition that justice under the law and a citizen's property rights should be bartered for political favors. No Court judgment should dissipate in elderly person's savings of a lifetime where the basis of such judgment is a strained and superficial ruling under a highly technical theory not supported by the evidence. The personal rights of every citizen and the property rights of every citizen have always been a sacred trust of the Courts. This essential and vital element of our judicial system should not be lightly cast aside in order to favor a friend or political supporter. I am certain the present members of the Court with whom I would serve subscribe to the principles herein set forth.

I ask every citizen to support me on the principles enumerated herein. I particularly ask every client whom I have ever represented to give me in the coming campaign the same untiring loyalty and effort toward my interests that I have exhibited over the many years of my practice for their interests. I pledge to every citizen that their rights and property shall be secure under the law. It shall be my constant endeavor to write opinions of the Seventh Court of Civil Appeals that shall be based soundly upon the law and the facts and shall reflect credit and honor upon such Court.

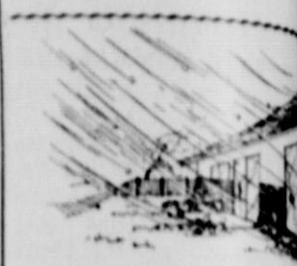

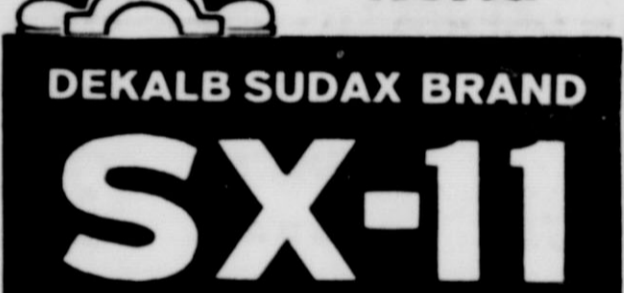
