He came to Matador as bookkeeper for the Matador Ranch shortly after the end of the war and many years ago became a naturalized citizen.

Matadors, 'Hounds Meet for Regional

WINNERS of the 1963 5B-6B bi-district championship game at Clarendon Friday night over the strong and previously unbeaten Wheeler Mustangs (16-12), the Matador Matadors will end their season in a clash with the Knox City Greyhounds.

The game, scheduled for 2:30 this afternoon on Burleson Field, is the first regional championship game ever scheduled in Matador. A record crowd of fans is expected. Admission prices will be 50 cents for students and \$1.50 for adults.

Gates to the football field will be open all day for the parking of automobiles. Drivers are asked to park cars at least four feet from cable.

As local fans know, all seats in the east grandstand are sold on a season basis and have been bought and paid for by supporters of the Matadors. The seats are the property of the buyers who will expect them to be vacant when they arrive for this afternoon's game.

The Matadors have defeated the Greyhounds earlier this season (18-6) but scouts report the Greyhounds have vastly improved. To win bi-district the Greyhounds defeated Robert Lee 33-8.

Campbell Is Workhorse Richard Campbell was the workhorse at Clarendon Friday night, both on offense and defense. He carried the ball 48 times that gained 151 yards against the Wheeler Mustangs defense.

Kenneth Pitts "bundle of power in a small package" carried the leather 16 times for a gain of 40 yards. Tim Green carried only 7 times to gain 9 yds. but sparked on key blocks. He also stood out in the defense department.

Charles Ezzell ground out 22 yds on 6 carries while constantly keeping Mustang defense on its toes.

The first quarter was scoreless but on the second play of the 2nd quarter Charles Ezzell rolled out around left end and went into the end zone one yard away. Richard Campbell plunged the line for the extra points.

Near the end of the first half the Matadors failed on a 4th down attempt and Wheeler took over on their 36 yd. line. Third play from scrimmage Dunk Powell charged 31 yds. for a touchdown. Extra point try failed.

Disaster again hit the Matadors when Wheeler recovered a fumble on the Matadors 34. On the first play Daryl Snelgroves romped into the end zone unopposed and the Matadors trailed 12-8 at the half.

Recover Fumble In the 3rd quarter the Matadors recovered a fumble on the Mustang 25. Charles Ezzell again scampered around left end for 10 yds. and a touchdown. Richard Campbell applied the additional sting as he plunged into the end zone for the extra points. Remainder of the game was strictly a defensive battle with the Matadors gathering an 89 additional yds. but finding it impossible to again cross the goal line.

President Kennedy was the guest of Dallas on a goodwill tour, which had included visits in San Antonio, Houston and Fort Worth. The mayors of all four cities attended

Mourning Observed By Stricken People

BULLET from an assassin's gun which took the life of President John F. Kennedy on the streets of Dallas Friday, and wounded Texas Governor John Connally, spread its grief across this small community and the surrounding area.

Flag at the post office was lowered to half mast, as at the Legion and VFW. The people here, as throughout the world moved in dazed disbelief. Business here was at a standstill until Monday afternoon, after burial of the late President in Arlington.

The subsequent bizarre murder of a Dallas policeman and the Sunday assassination of the handcuffed man accused of President Kennedy's murder, contributed further to the feeling of unreality.

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


