## Voters Ready for Countdown Saturday

EXCEPT FOR THE VOTING the Democratic primary race is about over as far as Motley County is concerned. Saturday the voter will climb into the saddle for a ride, and he is ready. At 5 p.m. Tuesday 48 had voted absentee, according to District and County Clerk Pat Sheridan. The law prescribes no votes can be accepted after 5 p.m. Tuesday, except those through the mail. They must be in by Saturday noon (only three applications are out). It is a big year for absentees, Sheridan said, considering school is still going on and that vacation season has not started.

It will be difficult to estimate the county's vote in the primary. Full voting strength is probably 1200, but the vote may be less than 1000. Five voting boxes are Northfield, Roaring Springs, Flomot, Whiteflat and Matador. In recent years Matador has polled half of the total county vote.

In the county, most interest is centered on the three-man race for sheriff, tax assessor and collector, with B. N. Owens, J. D. Spray and James Meador candidates. Here in Matador Clyde Gilbert who seeks re-election is opposed by Bryan Cammack for Commissioner of precinct 1.

Out at Northfield there is a two-man race for Commissioner of precinct 3 between Reece Timmons and Bill Cook. Timmons, however, is a write-in, since he neglected to file for a place on the ballot. District Attorney John B. Stapleton of Floydada is unopposed.

State Representative Bill Healy of Paducah is seeking reelection over an opponent from Wilbarger County who is on the ballot but has not announced.

Up in Amarillo Herbert C. Martin opposes an incumbent seeking a third term for Associate Justice of the Court of Civil Appeals. The incumbent has passed retirement age and is drawing \$127 per month Social Security in addition to his \$16,000 annual salary.

Most of the fire in the state seems to be centered on the race between Senator Ralph Yarborough and his opponent Gordon McLendon for the US Senate place. They are fighting hammer and tongs, mostly over television. Yarborough aims most of his newspaper dislike at the Dallas Morning News which has allied himself with the Billy Sol Estes scandal.

Precinct conventions will be held in each of the voting precincts according to Furman Vinson, County Democratic Chairman. Conventions will be held at 2 p.m. in each precinct.

At Flomot the convention will be held at the school house with Sam Ross as chairman.

At Northfield at the community center with Jeryl Nimmo as Chairman. At Whiteflat at the community center with Mrs. Wilson Barton as chairman.

At Roaring Springs in the school house, with J. N. Fletcher as chairman. In Matador in the District Court room with Jody Graham as chairman.

## Waco Judges Help Appeals Court Here

The Texas Supreme Court, apparently feeling that the docket of the Seventh Court of Civil Appeals in Amarillo is overloaded, has directed the 10th Court of Civil Appeals in Waco to lend a helping hand.

Two members of the Waco court are in Amarillo today hearing oral arguments in the cases allotted them. The two judges are Chief Justice Frank G. McDonald and Associate Justice Frank M. Wilson.

The Texas Supreme Court in equalizing the dockets of the civil appeals courts in the state has assigned 13 of the appeals filed in Amarillo to the Waco court.

Under statute the cases must be heard in the court in which they are filed. For this reason the Waco judges are hearing arguments in Amarillo.

Elmo Payne, clerk of the Amarillo court, says the Amarillo judges heard oral arguments in nine cases on April 6-7 and currently are working on their decisions in those cases.

The Seventh Court of Civil Appeals in Amarillo encompasses the largest Supreme Judicial District in the State of Texas — with 46 counties, Payne explained.
