Do you always refrain from weaving from one lane of traffic to another? Do you keep your eyes on the road, and look for possible trouble ahead? Do you always slow down at sundown? According to traffic experts, if you score 11 or 12, you may live to a ripe old age, but if your score is seven or less, stay in your own back yard, you are living on borrowed time.

There will be a meeting in the District Courtroom in Matador, starting at 10:00 A.M. Tuesday, March 2nd for training leaders who would like to help with the girl's 4-H clothing program. In counties where leaders and parents have received training by specialists, the 4-H girls may compete for district, state and national honors, as well as appearing in the County Dress Review. Miss Rhea M. Boyles, Extension Clothing Specialist from College Station is in charge of the meeting. Mothers of 4-H girls interested in this program are urged to attend along with 4-H leaders.

Joe Ike Clay of Flomot reports the following results where cotton burs were added to the land. Thirty two acres were treated with burs at a cost of approximately \$25 per acre. The 32 acres produced 50 bales of cotton. On 50 acres of untreated land, 50 bales of cotton were produced. Acreage was irrigated and fertilized the same.

Average production on the cotton bur land was 781 lbs./ac., while on the untreated and, average production was 500 lbs./ac. The increase of 281 lbs./ac. at 30 cents lb. was a gain of \$84.30 per acre, or less the cost of treatment, \$59.30 per acre, with results of burs to be gained for several years to come.

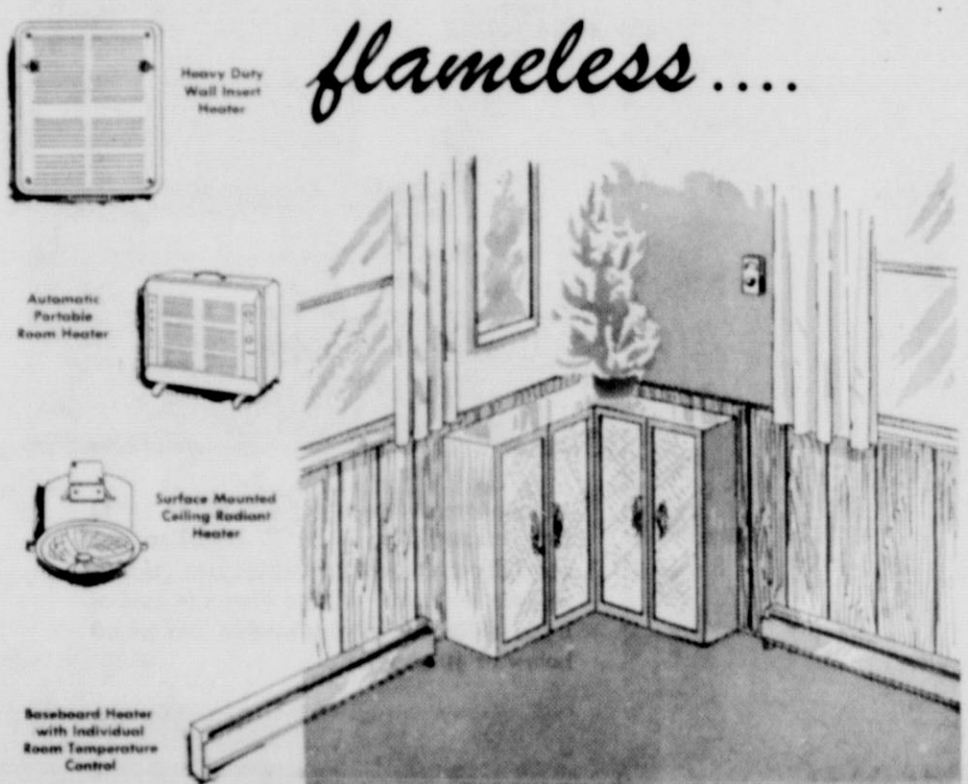

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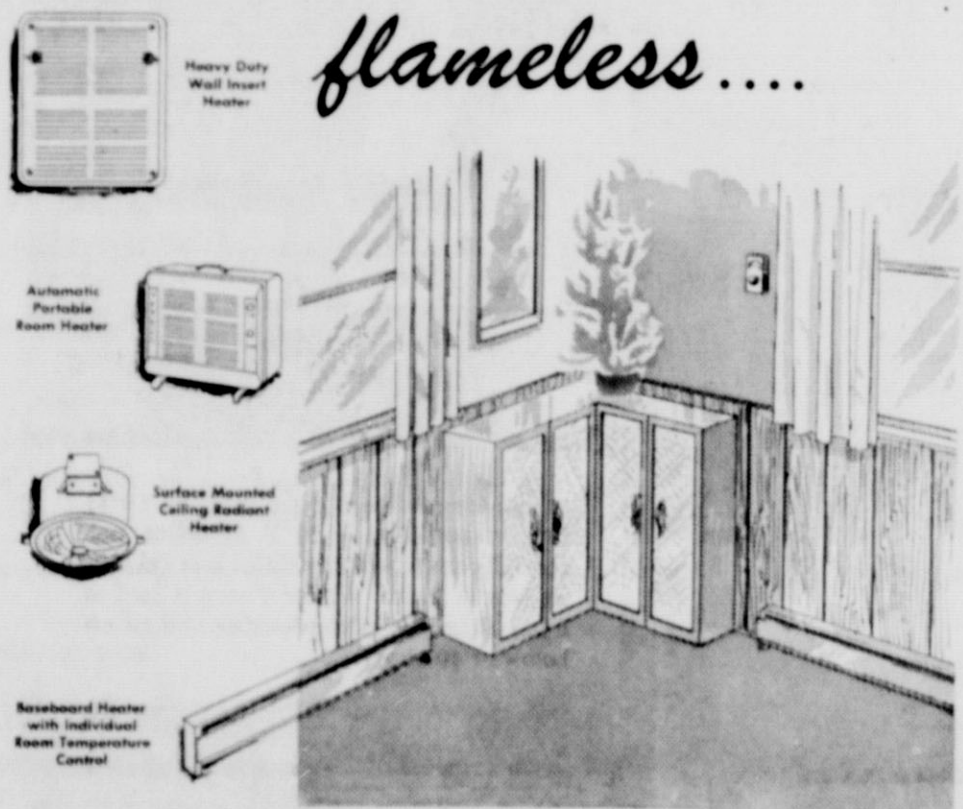
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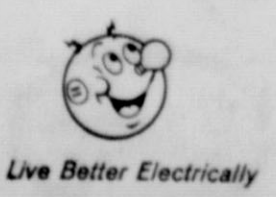
