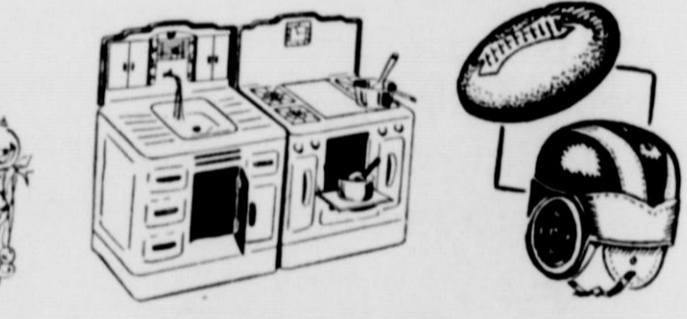

Man Vanishes In Palo Duro

Fred Meyer, 51, of Amarillo, and brother of Bill Meyer of Estelline, formerly of Motley County has vanished into the rugged terrain of Palo Duro Canyon. Fred Meyer has been listed as a missing person. The following excerpt is from the lead article in the Canyon News, issue of October 31:

"Fred Meyer was last seen between 5 and 6 p.m. on Sept. 3, when he parked his car in a barn on the J. L. Upshaw ranch about three miles north of Palo Duro State Park.

"The incident was noted by Upshaw's two daughters. 'They said he was carrying a shotgun,' Bill Meyer said, 'and just stood around for awhile until he noticed the dust from Upshaw's car coming up to the ranch, then, they said he started to walk fast into the canyon.'

"Upshaw, who thought the man was a dove hunter, did not report the incident until the evening of Sept. 4 when he noticed the locked car still in the barn. Randall County deputies went to the scene the following morning, tentatively identifying the occupant of the car as Fred Meyer, and returned to organize a full scale search."

The officers found some boot prints and ashes of a small fire. Fred Meyer vanished in some of the roughest terrain in Texas (he was familiar with the area). Bill Meyer was in the Tribune office Monday and said he had aided in searching every foot of the country, but that the land is rugged, full of caves and crevices. He said he found tracks of wild cougars in the area. He believes his brother may have been a victim of amnesia, or that he may have fallen into a crevice and died. He does not, however, rule out the possibility of foul play.
