Benjamin Tanner
Dies in Hospital

A Tanner, 68, long-time
member of the Flomot commu-
nity and also a former Matador
businessman, died at 2:00 a.m.
today in the Veteran's Hospi-
tal, Big Spring.

Funeral services were held at
7 p. m. Wednesday at the
Baptist Church, Flomot.
Denzil Leonard of Hart,
pastor of the church, of-
ficiated, assisted by Rev. L. W.
Hart of Halfway, a former Flo-
mot Methodist pastor.

Funeral services in the Flomot
Cemetery were held at the Flomot
Funeral Home in charge of
arrangements. Pallbearers
were Joe Degan, Tom
Pope and Harley
Casey of Flomot; C. B. (Casey)
of Matador and Murrey
Strawn.

Benjamin Allen Tanner was
born February 5, 1891, at De-
Laware, Texas and died July 28,
at the age of 68 years, 5
months, and 23 days. He was
married at Matador, May 16,
1914, to the former Olive Ash-
ley of Ranger, and they made
their home in the Flomot com-
munity, where Mr. Tanner farm-

ed and Mrs. Tanner moved
to Matador in 1952 and they op-
erated a cafe here for about a
year. Mrs. Tanner died suddenly
of a heart attack on July 27,
1959.

Leaving no children of their
own, the couple had adopted
two small girls, sisters, and fol-
lowing his wife's death, Mr. Tan-
ner continued rearing them. He
has been in ill health for sev-
eral years, and since the first of
this year, had made his home in
Matador with the daughters. Mr.
Tanner was converted in 1934
and united with the Flomot Bap-
tist Church. He was a veteran

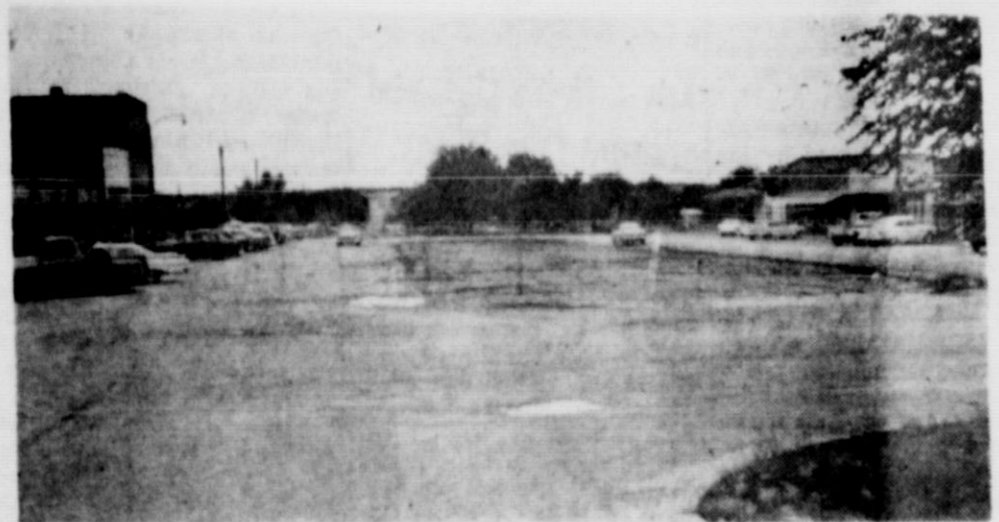

Roaring Springs Stakes Deep Test



AVENUE OF PROGRESS in Roaring Springs is shown in the above photograph, showing the wide street after the removal of the old center park area on Broadway. The new street is now 150 feet wide and accommodates the intersection of the Farm to Market road which will connect Roaring Springs with Dougherty. This photograph was made by a Lubbock Avalanche-Journal staff photographer, from a point a short distance from the bank building, and looking northwest from the approach of the paving project.

A DEEP TEST WELL on the (J. R.) Moore estate property, located near the northwest corner of Air Port Golf Course and a short distance from State Highway 70, is being staked today. Newest well in the Roaring Springs area, the explorer will be located on Sec. 4, and drilled to a projected depth of 8,500 feet.

FIVE additional wells will be started in the Roaring Springs area within the next two or three weeks, the Tribune learned yesterday, unofficially, but from a reliable source.

Activity in Roaring Springs oil development is now greater than at any time since the first discovery was made in May, 1957. It is significant at this time when development in Western Texas and Eastern New Mexico is reported sharply curtailed.

Birnie Well Moved
The following excerpt is from the Tuesday edition of the Lubbock Avalanche-Journal:

In west Central Motley County, General American Crude Oil Co., Abilene, has skidded its rig 30 feet east for its No. 1-A O. E. Birnie scheduled 9,600 foot wildcat.

The first hole, No. 1 O. E. Birnie, was lost below 4,200 feet at an unreported depth, and the rig skidded for a second attempt to drill the test.

The No. 1 O. E. Birnie, 15 miles northwest of Matador, will be dug 1,980 feet from south and 900 feet from west lines of Section 9, Block G-P, C&M survey on an 80-acre lease. It is two miles southwest of a 10,010 foot dryhole, about four miles south of Pan-American's lone producer and Birnie (Pennsylvania) pool opener.

Public Impressed By Lubbock's New Newspaper Plant

THE TAJ MAHAL of newspaper plants, the new Lubbock Avalanche-Journal, at 8th and Avenue J, received visitors at an open house Sunday afternoon.

The plant, which is one of the most efficient and modern in the nation, is housed in a palace of a building. The entire property of the newspaper, including a paper warehouse (connected by an underground tunnel) covers more than one and one-half city blocks.

Between 4,000 and 5,000 people visited the plant Sunday afternoon. Towns all over the South Plains were represented, but most of the visitors were Lubbockites, who are justly proud of their fine newspaper building and plant.

The main floor of the two-story (and basement) building, looks like the interior of an ultra-modern bank. The editorial department on the second floor is only slightly less impressive than the ground floor.

To celebrate the opening of the new plant the Avalanche-Journal published a 224-page edition Sunday, which traced the pioneer history of the Lubbock area from about the turn of the century to the present day.

Letters of congratulations reprinted in the edition were from President Eisenhower, Senator Lyndon Johnson, George Mahon and other nationally known political figures.

EPIDEMIC FEARED IN LOCKNEY AREA

Officials of the Lockney General Hospital have confirmed that help from the State Health Department has been requested in combating what may become a full-scale encephalitis epidemic.

At least six suspected cases have been reported and one has been confirmed.

One patient, Paul Cooper, about 50, a Lockney area farmer, was hospitalized at a Plainview hospital, because of crowded hospitals in Lockney General Hospital. Diagnosis was made at the Lockney hospital.

Cooper has the only confirmed encephalitis case, also known as "sleeping sickness," but it was described as mild.

Doctors pointed out a positive diagnosis of encephalitis is difficult because symptoms are similar to many other diseases, especially polio. Laboratory tests over a period of several weeks are necessary to confirm an encephalitis case.

CATTLE OWNERS TO HOLD MEETING

Motley County beef and dairy owners as reflected on the 1959 tax roll, are urged to attend a meeting in the District Courtroom here Tuesday Aug 4th at 8:15 p. m. for the purpose of hearing an explanation of the Brucellosis (Bangs) Control Bill, as recently passed by the Texas Legislature, and its effect on cattle producers.

The decision as to whether Motley County becomes a control area or not, rests with the cattle owners in the county, and no steps will be taken to make the county a control area unless the local cow owners petition the Livestock Sanitary Commission to designate Motley County as a Brucellosis Control Area, thus allowing for free movement of cattle to other areas.

Two types of programs are available. Type I, where calves are vaccinated at the cost of the owner, and Type II, where cows are tested at no cost to the owner, other than the gathering of the animals in a pen suitable for testing, and providing help to restrain the animals while samples are being taken.

Mrs. W. H. Rattan were pioneers of the county, and the Rev. Rattan was the second pastor to serve Matador Baptist Church after its organization in 1893. Mrs. Seigler had been a member of this church since early girlhood.

She was married at Matador, February 27, 1926 to Eldred Seigler, and they made their home on the Seigler ranch in the north part of the county for a number of years. They moved to Matador when their two oldest children became school age, and have lived here since.

As a young homemaker and neighbor, Mrs. Seigler fast became known for her kindnesses, and her life through short, had been replete with good works.

The community experienced shock last summer when she went to the hospital for surgery for a malignancy. A heart attack while convalescing from the operation further impaired her health. Although she had rallied from both ordeals to the extent that she resumed her former activities to a degree, her recovery was incomplete, as disclosed by a physical check-up early in June.

The grief of friends and family at this knowledge was not visibly shared by Mrs. Seigler. With Christian forbearance she comforted them. She counseled with her husband and children and helped them map a course for the future after her departure.

Reading from Proverbs 31: 10-31, Rev. Hawkins cited the description of a perfect woman in his eulogy of Mrs. Seigler, and Rev. Vaughn further expressed the consensus of the congregation when he said briefly, "I've never known a better woman."
