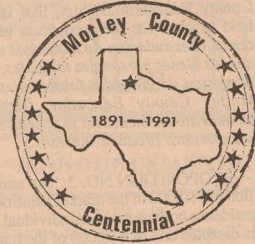

## Commissioners Reach Agreement On Precinct Redistricting

The Mortley County Commissioners Court met Friday, July 12, reconvened from Monday recess at 10:00 a.m., with all commissioners present.

Commissioner Jameson made a motion that the division line between Precinct 2 & 3 be as the redistricting proposal map #1 shows, and to change Precinct 1 and 3 east and west line to come from US Hwy 70 north 1 block from Eubank street, west 1 block to Main street and south 1 block to US Hwy 70. West on US Hwy 70 to intersection of US Hwy 70 and State Hwy 70 and end there. Seconded by Commissioner Fletcher. Vote tied 2-2.

Commissioner Fletcher made a motion for the division line between Precinct 2 and 3 to start at Hall County line,

come south to Tom Ball Creek and follow Tom Ball Creek west to State Hwy 70, proceed south on State Hwy 70 to intersection of State Hwy 70 and FM

Road 2999, proceed west on FM Road 2999 until pavement ends, proceed south on County Road until road turns east, the line then proceeds south to Middle Pease

River, then follow course of river east to State Hwy. 70, then proceed south to

intersection of State Hwy 70 and FM Road 94, then proceed on Hwy 94 east to North Main Street in Matador, proceed

south on North Main Street to intersection of North Main and Buffalo Ave.,

proceed west on Buffalo Ave. 1 block to Bundy Street, then south on Bundy Street to US Hwy 70, then west on US Hwy 70

to Floyd County line. Commissioner Russell seconded. Commissioners Fletcher, Russell and Jameson voted for, Commissioner Hughes voted against.

Commissioner Russell made motion to change Precinct 1 & 3 east and west line in Matador to follow where Eubank Street intersects US Hwy 70, proceed north on Eubank Street 1 block north to Dundee Street, then 1 block west to Main Street, then 1 block south to US Hwy. 70 then west to intersection of US Hwy 70 and State Hwy 70. Commissioner Fletcher seconded. Commissioners Russell, Fletcher, Jameson and Hughes for.

Commissioner Russell made motion that there not be an alternate plan sent in on redistricting to the Justice Department. Seconded by Commissioner Fletcher. All voted yes.

Meeting adjourned at 12:00 noon.

## School Board Meeting Report

The Mortley County ISD Board of Trustees met for their July session with the newly hired Superintendent, George Blanch.

The minutes, bills and budget amendments were approved.

Bids were opened and accepted for milk purchase from Borden's; Bread, Mrs. Bairds; LPG, Cooper Oil Co.; Gas and Diesel, David Fuel Co.

After lengthy discussion and study, the Board voted, 5 for and 2 against, to give the Bank Depository Contract to the First State Bank, Matador for 1991-1993, 2 year school terms.

Superintendent Blanch explained that the new County Education District needed to be formed with the appointment of two board members. Marisue Potts and Coy Franks were selected. The first meeting for this board was set for Thursday July 11, at 7:30 p.m.

The board went into Executive Session at this time, out of closed session, the board accepted the resignation of Cagle Davis; elected to advertise for bids for Fleet and Property Insurance and Student Insurance; set meeting date to canvass ballots of election, August 10; designated Absentee voting, Mortley County Courthouse, Clerk office, 9-12 and 1-5 p.m.

Superintendent Blanch informed the Board that escrow had been established on purchase of teaching.

Board went into closed session again.

Council discussed the Tax Appraisal board meeting. L.B. Campbell, City Representative to this board, encouraged all Council members to attend this meeting.

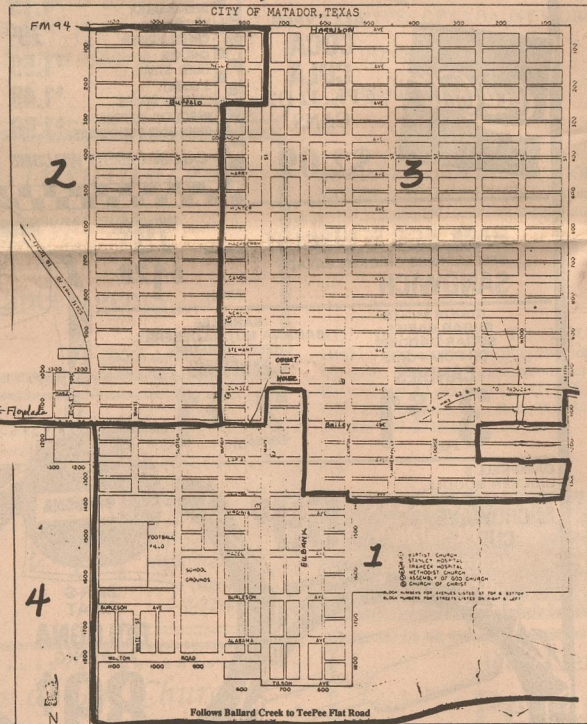
Meeting adjourned.

## Early Voting To Begin July 22

Early voting by personal appearance in the proposed constitutional amendments special, statewide election August 10 will begin July 22 in the offices of the County Clerk, Mortley County.

Held during the Clerk's regular office hours, the early voting period will continue through August 6.

In Mortley County early voting will be on both the proposed amendments ballot and the County Education District tax propositions ballot in the clerk's office.

August 2 is the last day that early voting clerks may receive written requests for ballots to be voted by mail. Requests in Mortley County will be for the two ballots to be voted.

Ballot requests may be placed by writing the County Clerk, at Box 66,

Matador, Texas 79244.

Voters, who have moved to a different election precinct within the county, are reminded that Thursday, July 11, is the last day that they may submit a transfer of registration to be able to vote on August 10 in the precinct of their new residence.

Also residence, who are not registered voters, may become eligible to vote in the August 10 special elections by registering on or before July 11 in the county voter registrar's offices, in the tax office.

The Mortley County Independent School District Board of Trustees met Wednesday night, July 10 in regular session and officially recognized the CED August 10 tax proposal called election and announced its early voting plans.

## Burleson Memorial Roping Offers Action July 19-21

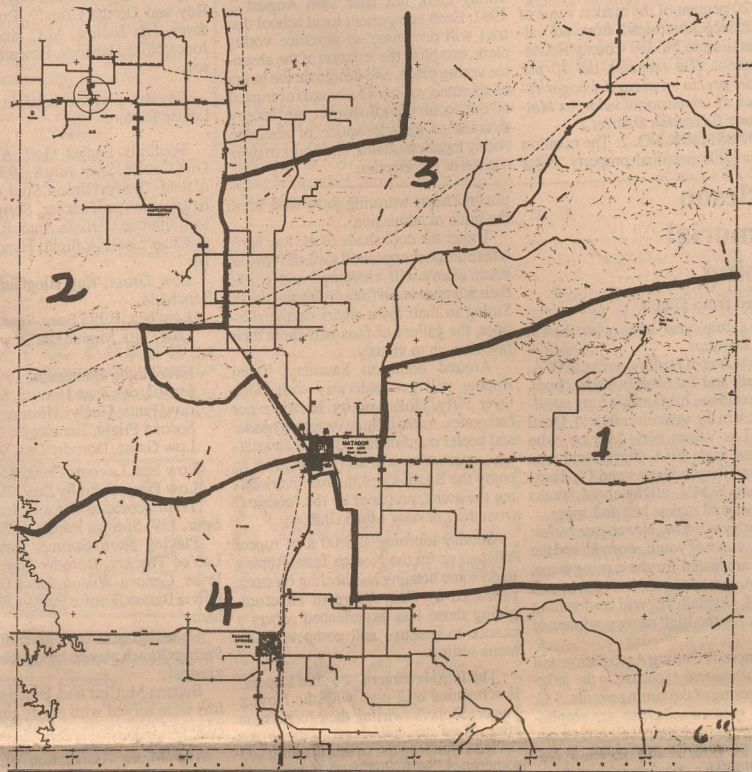
Tired of the same old summer routine? Long for something exciting? Want to get out in the country and experience an event unique to our area?

## Mortley County Educational District Holds First Meeting County Residents Urged To Vote August 10

The Mortley County Education District held their organizational meeting Thursday, July 11, 1991 at 7:30 p.m. in the Mortley County School Board Room.

The meeting was called to order by Superintendent of School George Blanch. Mr. Blanch explained the Mortley County Education District is comprised of only the Mortley County Schools, unlike most CED's, are comprised of several school systems from different counties.

Coy Franks and Marisue Potts were sworn in as members of the newly formed Board. Coy Franks was elected Chairman, Marisue Potts as Vice-Chairman/Recording Secretary and Superintendent Blanch will serve as district administrator.

The Board then called for a district wide election on August 10, 1991. Voters in the county education districts across the state will be asked to decide on tax

exemptions on homesteads, on taxing non-income producing personal property such as automobiles, boats and recreational vehicles, also an additional exemption for disabled and elderly residents, all of which are dependent on the passage of amendments as voted on the same day in county precinct polling places throughout the state.

Places on the ballot for the 3 CED Propositions were drawn and are as follows:

**Proposition 1:** The exemption of 20 percent of the market value of the residence homestead from ad valorem taxation in Mortley County Education District.

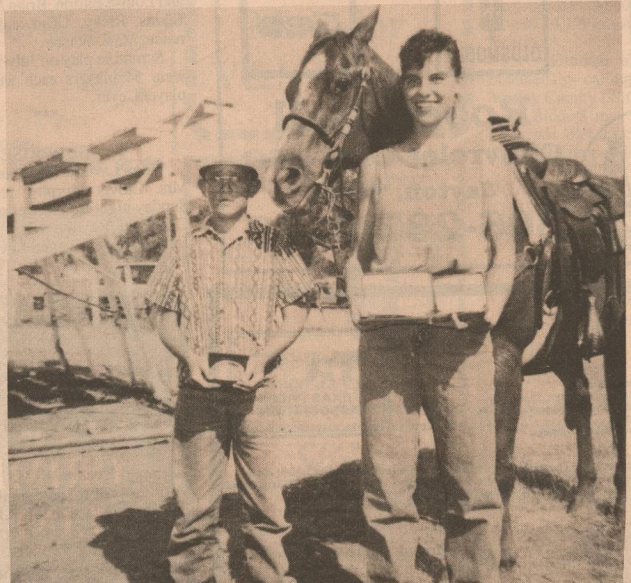
**Proposition 2:** The taxation of all tangible personal property, other than manufactured homes, in Mortley County Education District that is not held or used for the production of income.

**Proposition 3:** The exemption of \$10,000 of the market value of the residence homestead of an individual who is disabled and of \$10,000 of the market value of the residence homestead of an individual who is 65 or older from ad valorem taxation in Mortley County Education District.

The Board urged each and every voter in Mortley County to be aware of the election date and the consequences of each of the propositions that are being voted on.

The Board requested submission of bids for the CED's Bank Depository Contract for the 1991-1993 biennium which begins Sept. 1, 1991. Bids will be accepted until 4 p.m. August 14, 1991.

Other items of discussion were the statutory responsibilities of the CED, continued on page 2

### ORDER OF ELECTION FOR THE MOTLEY COUNTY EDUCATION DISTRICT

An election is hereby ordered for August 10, 1991, for the purposes of voting on the following issues, pursuant to House Bill 2885, 72nd Legislature, Regular Session:

PROPOSITION NO. 1: The exemption of 20 percent of the market value of the residence homestead from ad valorem taxation in Motley County Education District. (La exención del 20 por ciento del precio en plaza del hogar residencial, de impuestos al valor, en Motley County Education District.)

PROPOSITION NO. 2: The taxation of all tangible personal property, other

than manufactured homes, in Motley County Education District, that is not held or used for the production of income. (Recaudación de impuestos a todos los bienes personales tangibles, con excepción de viviendas fabricadas, en Motley County Education District, cuando dichos bienes no se posean ni se utilicen para producir ingresos.)

PROPOSITION NO. 3: The exemption of \$10,000 of the market value of the residence homestead of an individual who is disabled and of \$10,000 of the market value of the residence homestead of an individual who is 65 or older from ad valorem taxation in Motley County Education District. (La exención de \$10,000 del precio en plaza del hogar residencial de personas incapacitadas, ye de \$10,000 del precio en plaza del hogar residencial de personas de 65 o mas años de edad, de impuestos al valor, en Motley County Education District.)

Absentee voting by personal appearance for this election will begin on July 22, 1991, and will end on August 6, 1991. All applications for ballots to be voted by mail must be received by the absentee voting clerk not later than August 2, 1991. Each component local school district will designate an absentee voting clerk, establish the location of the absentee voting place, and designate the hours of absentee voting. The boards of trustees of the local school district are hereby directed to include notice of absentee voting locations, dates, and hours in their notices of the election.

# Home Economically Speaking

## TELEPHONE NUMBERS BEGINNING WITH 900

Most people are familiar with telephone numbers with an area code of 900. Unlike 800 numbers which are free of charge to the caller's telephone. Charges may range from two dollars to as much as \$100. These 900 numbers are used for such things as obtaining sports scores, ordering merchandise, entering contests, employment assistance and obtaining credit cards.

Not all advertisements using 900 numbers are deceptive. But the number of complaints about 900 numbers has increased a great deal in the past year. Consumers are often told to call another 900 number, given useless information, put on hold for extended periods of time or disconnected. Many of these calls result in high phone charges to the consumer who has not received what was expected. Young children have also called 900 numbers not knowing their parents would be charged for the call.

Here are some things you can do to protect yourself from 900 number scams:

- \* Deal only with reputable companies or organizations. They usually state the cost of the call -- which is usually low -- upfront.

- \* Know the total cost before you make the call. Many advertisements tell you the cost per minute but don't tell you how long the call will last.

- \* If you are the victim of a 900-number scam, call your phone company. While not legally required to, they may delete the call from your account. The telephone company generally will not disconnect your telephone for not paying a disputed 900 charge. You are also covered under the Fair Debt Collections Practices Act if a 900-information provider tries to collect the charge from you.

Telephone customers in certain parts of Texas can have a "block" placed on their telephone to prevent anyone from making a 900-number call. Contact your local telephone company to see if this is available in your area.

Be cautious of 900-number advertisements which make promises to fix "bad" credit, get you a "gold" credit card, or find you a job. Remember, offers that sound too good to be true often are, and in these instances are likely to cost you a lot of money for useless information or information you could obtain free elsewhere.

The Federal Communications Commission (FCC) has proposed regulations for 900 numbers. These include requiring a message at the beginning of the call stating the total cost of the call, reminding children to get their parents' permission and a grace period at the beginning of the call to allow the caller to hang up without being charged.

Good news from the Coast Guard. For the fifth consecutive year, boating fatalities are down. These numbers are an improvement, but are of little comfort to the families of the 865 fatalities. The U.S. Coast Guard notes that "the fatality count has fallen 36% in the last ten years." The decline is attributed to an increase in public awareness of the dangers of drinking and driving in cars and boats.

After looking at all the fancy boats with huge engines, it is remarkable that fatal accidents are few and far between. It is estimated that nearly 20 million recreational boats are on the water each year.

**OUTRAGE OF THE YEAR** - People for the Ethical Treatment of Animals (PETA) raised some \$10 million from the public and then killed 32 "rescued animals" that had been liberated from research experiments. According to the monthly news letter of SCOT (Sportsmen Conservationists of Texas), Ingrid Newkirk, director of PETA, confirmed the killing of 32 roosters and rabbits was done "with a great deal of concern." Maybe PETA should quit the self-righteous antics about animal rights and admit that their real concerns are fund raising and staff salaries, not concern for the animals.

Next time some animal rights group shows an animal with a leg trap and wants your money, think about the 32 "rescued" animals that were not worth a few hitches and pens. PETA, of course, does have money to file lawsuits and other legal harassment of animal research projects.

By the way, SCOT is an excellent and reasonable conservation group that is worth the support of the hunters, fishermen, and real conservationists. Contact SCOT-Alan Allen, 807 Brazos, Suite 311, Austin, Texas 78701. Membership is only \$25. The legislative updates in both Austin and Washington, D.C. are worth far more than the \$25 dues.

The anti-hunting, anti-fishing and animal rights crowds have banded together. The hunters and anglers need to unite before it is too late. Check out SCOT because it is one of the best groups in Texas.

# Betty's Tax Talk

## VOTE AUGUST 10 ON ADVERTISEMENTS

The County Education District hopes that voters will not allow lack of interest a common occurrence at area polls to plague the August 10 countywide election concerning tax exemptions for the new County Education District and two constitutional amendments.

The two proposed constitutional amendments on the county ballot would allow voters in the district to adopt certain exemptions for residence homesteads, taxation of personal property and would allow the issuance of general obligation bonds to provide educational loans to students.

The Motley County Advertisements read as follows:

No. 1: "The constitutional amendment to allow the voters of a county education district to adopt certain exemptions from the district's ad valorem taxation for residence homesteads and to provide for the taxation of certain tangible personal property."

State Property Tax Board states that a taxpayer owns tangible personal property if he or she has something other than real estate that may be seen, touched, measured, moved, or weighed. An example is an automobile.

No. 2: The constitutional amendment providing for the issuance of general obligation bonds to provide educational loans to students."

The County Education District ballot has three different propositions to be voted on. They are the same items as Amendment No. 1 on the county ballot. The items on the CED tax exemption ballot will be: the exemption of 20 percent of

the market value of a residence homestead, the exemption of \$10,000 of the market value of the residence homestead of an individual who is disabled and of an individual 65 or older, and the taxation of all tangible personal property in the district, other than manufactured homes, that is not held or used for the production of income.

The 20 percent homestead exemption on Proposition 1 is the same exemption that the school is presently offering, but if voters wish to receive this exemption on their CED taxes, they would need to vote for this proposition.

The \$10,000 disabled and elderly exemption on Proposition 3 would be a new additional exemption for homesteads. Regardless of the results of the August 10 election, the state-mandated \$10,000 exemption for 65 over and disabled homeowners will apply to the CED. The 65-over homeowner with an established tax ceiling will not pay above the ceiling. The combined CED tax and local school tax cannot exceed the ceiling.

Voters need to be especially cautious when considering taxation of personal properties on Proposition 2. According to Shellie Hoffman, an attorney and member of the Texas Association of School Boards, if passed, it would mean that all personal property in the county items such as automobiles, boats, and furniture would have to be appraised and the owners would pay taxes on the appraised value.

All of the CED propositions are contingent upon the passage of the Constitutional amendments proposed by the 1991 Texas Legislature in the county election.

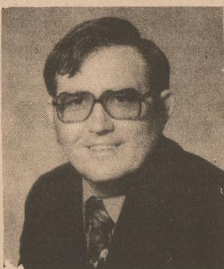

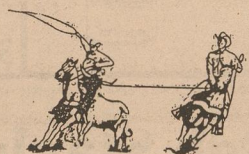

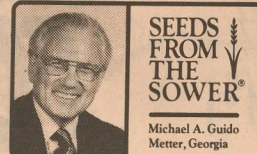
