I drank water out of a gourd dipper for 20 years before it was brought to my attention that sanitation and pleasure do not always share the same degree of respect.

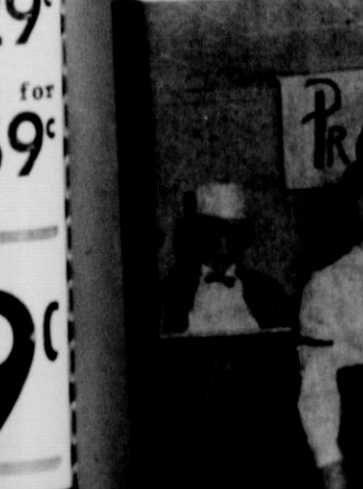
Lions will Meet At Luncheon

Lightning Hits Toll Phone Line

A freak winter storm that swept across West Texas late Friday caused Matador and Roaring Springs to be without long distance service from 7:15 p.m. Friday until 11 a.m. Saturday.

Sherron T. Lee, General Telephone District Manager at Ralls told the Tribune this week that the interruption of service was caused by lightning.

He said the storm resulted in lightning striking the Bell System line (used by Gen-Tel) five times in 45 miles between Paducah and Quanah.

Emergency crews worked continuously until service was restored. While the clouds were threatening here, no lightning was observed.

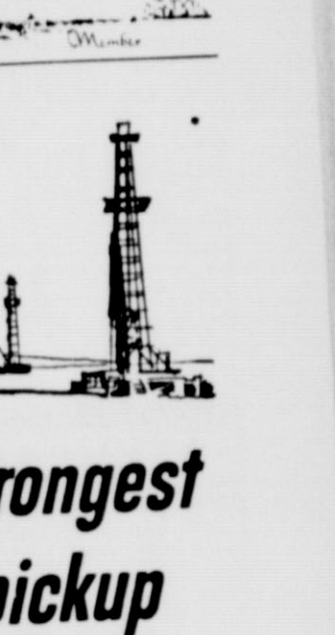

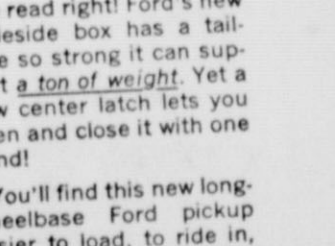

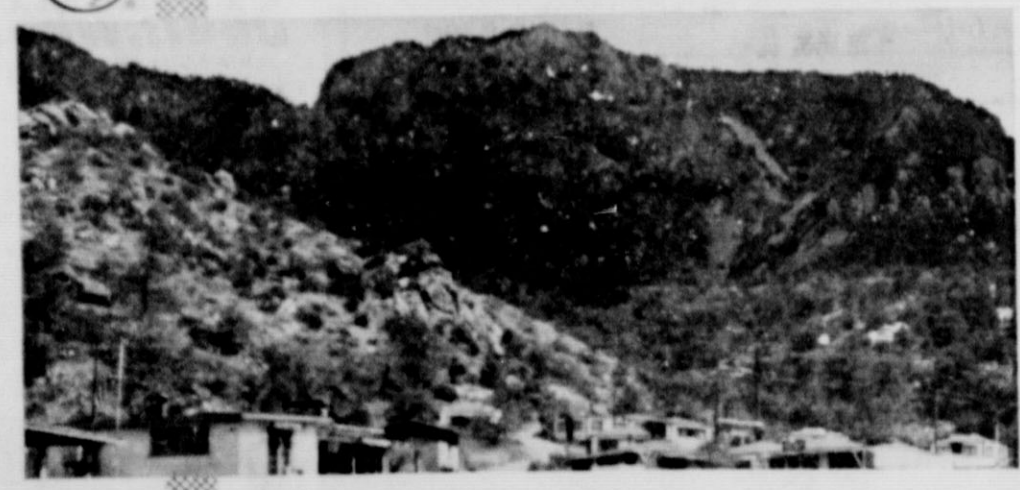

made during the spring to secure more information as to places of hibernation, and to determine percent of weevils that live through the winter. W.L. Owens and Don Rummel, Entomologists, are heading the work in the caprock area.

Eighteen Motley County 4-H boys and girls have been studying grasses and range plants, competing for places on county judging teams. On Jan. 20th, two teams were entered in the Amarillo contest, with the Senior 4-H team consisting of Don Tardy, Joey Thacker, Ronnie Clifton and Stacey Watson, all of Roaring Springs, taking the top four individual places, and naturally the top team score.

A junior team, consisting of Chester Dye and Bill Williams of Roaring Springs, and David White and Tatt Garnett of Matador was entered also. Juniors are not eligible for awards, but on the basis of scores, their score was the 2nd high 4-H score or 3rd high overall score in the contest.

For the Fort Worth contest on Feb. 1st, Stacey Watson, Ronnie Clifton and Chester Dye, all of Roaring Springs, were on one 4-H team, which placed 8th in a field of 40 teams. Watson posted the 8th high individual score. The 2nd 4-H team consisted of Davie White, Tatt Garnett and Mike Moore, all of Matador. This team placed 30th in the contest.

Also competing in the contest was the Roaring Springs FFA team, consisting of Don Tardy, Joey Thacker and Rogene Swim. This team placed 3rd in the

contest, with Tardy posting the 6th high individual score.

Some farmers have asked about powing and sale of castor beans. I have contacted the Baker Castor Oil Co., Box 328, Plainview, Texas, and received the following information: "We are now contracting for 1964 irrigated production. Our present contract offering is market price at time of delivery, but not less than \$4.75 per cwt., clean weight, with delivery to Plainview, Tex." Interested farmers should contact this company or myself for additional information.

Will 1964 be screwworm free? Vigorous participation in the screwworm eradication program by Texas farmers and ranchers will be necessary if the Southwest is to become screwworm free in 1964. Detection, treatment and submission of samples will be even more important this year than it has in the past, so if you don't have a mailing kit, ask for one now, and carry it in the pickup or car. Only one screwworm case was detected in January of 1964 as compared to 157 in 1963. A single unreported case could set the eradication program back for several months as well as causing livestock owners more work.

The big problem this year is to maintain a barrier 200 miles wide from the Gulf of Mexico to the Gulf of California across Mexico to prevent the mid-

Mexico to the Gulf of California spots in the United States will also be treated, but must be reported to initiate treatment.

Two Meetings Scheduled Here

Growing more crops on the same acreage, at less cost will be the theme of two meetings to be held in Matador Monday, February 24, and Thursday, February 27. According to county agent Bill Pallmeyer, Speakers will be tops in their fields.

The meetings will be held in the District Courtroom in Matador at 7:30 each of the nights. At the first meeting, Feb. 24, Bill Gunter, Area Extension Agronomist will discuss in detail the "Why's, how's and when's" of using commercial phosphate fertilizers.

On the same program, Harvey Walker, Agronomist at the South Plains Research and Extension Center, Lubbock, will cover soil management. Pallmeyer says Walker is expected to discuss thoroughly the many phases of this important field.

At the second meeting, February 27, Jim Valentine, Area Extension Soil Chemist, will discuss use of commercial nitrogen. This topic, says Pallmeyer, is expected to cover the various sources of fertilizers the farmer can use for adding nitrogen, among other important points. A report will also be made on soil testing and management by a recognized authority in this field.

Livestock Show Rules Announced

The annual Motley County Livestock Show will be held at the Matador FFA building on Saturday, April 4th, according to plans made by the Motley County Livestock Assn., Malcolm Turner, President. Classes will be provided for beef steers, beef heifers, barrows, open gilts, bred gilts and sows. All animals in market classes must be weighed and placed by 11:00 a.m., and showing will start at 1:00 p.m.

Steers will be divided into three classes: 850 to 900 lbs., 801 to 950 lbs.; and 951 lbs. and up. Barrows and gilts to be shown as marked animals will also be divided into three classes: 190 to 210 lbs.; 211 to 230 lbs.; and 231 to 250 lbs. The top four animals in each steer class and each barrow or market hog class will be eligible to sell at the auction to be held after completion of placing of animals.

All steers must be dehorned and shown at halter, while heifers must be shown at halter. Gilts in the breeding classes must weigh over 150 lbs. Owners must show their animals unless they have more than one animal in a class. Animals will be weighed only once to determine eligibility, and must be owned by the individual by Jan. 1st, 1964. Heifers must be 9 to 18 months of age.

The membership drive to secure funds to provide prize money for exhibitors is underway. Backing is necessary to provide a worthy show for the exhibitors.
