A SNOW BLANKET which wrapped around The Quitaques and spread across the Foothills Monday produced a changed effect on the landscape and a greater change in the outlook of farmers and businessmen. The snow, rain and sleet produced .68-inch of moisture here according to Bob Stanley's rain gauge, after the contents had been thawed.

The moisture provided the greatest benefit to wheat pasture, which, in most instnces, was suffering. The benefit also extends across plowed fields and pasture lands.




