The bride wore a beige silk dress with beige accessories.

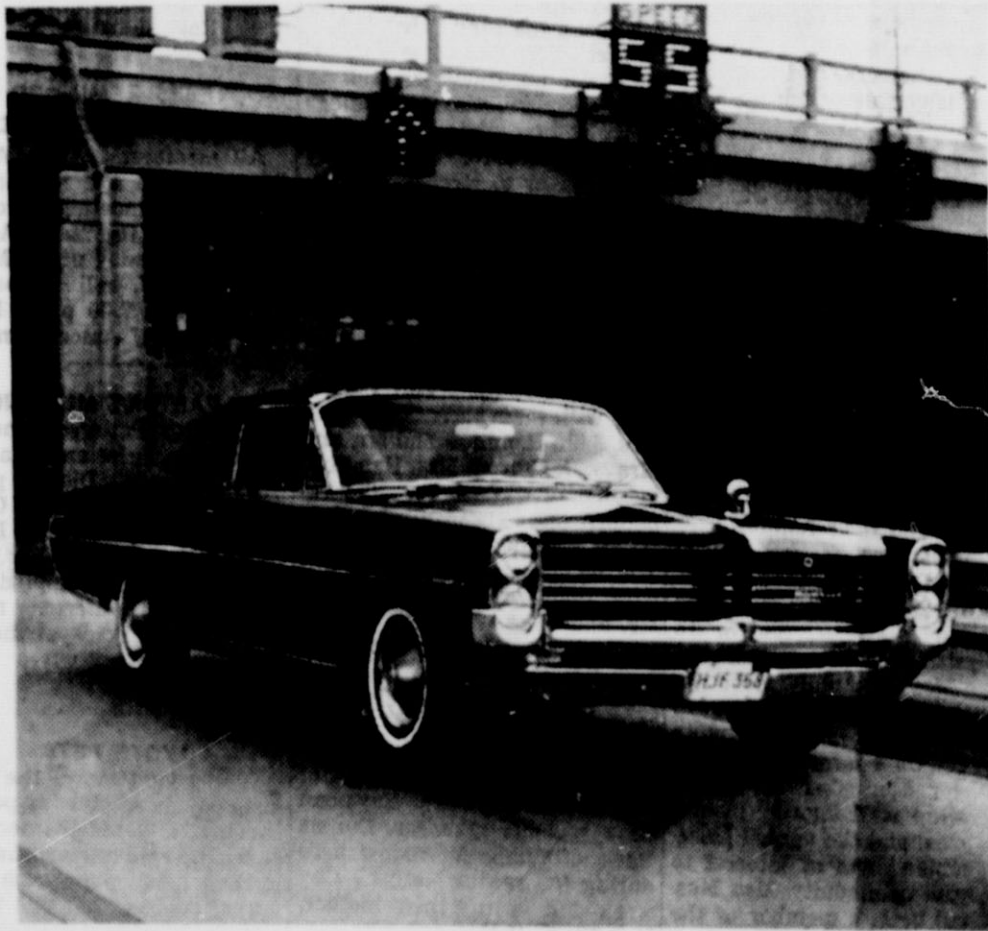
Mrs. Watt, a 1962 graduate of Matador High School, and her husband have attended South Plains Junior College, Levelland for the past two years.

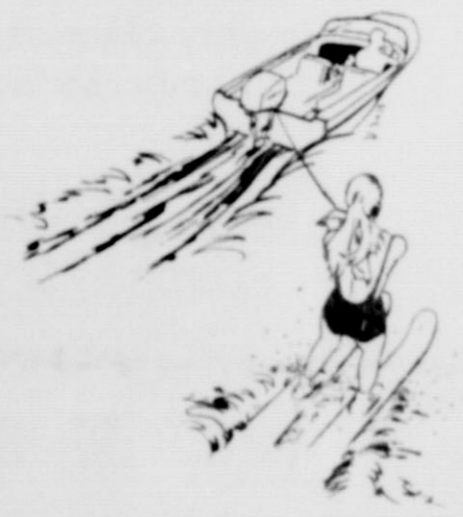
There are just a fourth as many girls as boys in the class.
