Notaries Public Must Re-Qualify

Motley County's approximately 38 notaries public who desire re-appointment for the new term ending June 1, 1965, must re-qualify by the payment of the required fee and the filing of a new oath and bond with County Clerk Pat Sheridan between June 1 and June 10.

The announcement was made recently by Secretary of State Crawford C. Martin in a press release. He emphasized that release. He emphasized that bonds must be approved by county clerks and that re-appointments or new commission applications should be sent directly to the Secretary of State.

County Clerk Sheridan said all present notaries are automatically re-appointed, but that they must re-qualify by a new bond and new oath.

Sheridan said the notary fee is double (now \$4) and that the cost of a bond is approximately \$2.50. Full information may be obtained from his office.

Screwworm Check Being Conducted

Effect of the screwworm eradication program is being checked and farmers and ranchers are asked to cooperate, according to County Agent Bill Palmmeier. At the first detection of worms, the cattle producer is asked to obtain a vial from the agent's office.

Collect ten worms and place in vial (if vial is not available, place worms in water or alcohol). Immediately call Mission, Texas, telephone Justice 5-1646, collect, and report the infestation.

No call should be made unless sample has been collected. Information should include name, address and telephone number of producer. Location should be furnished of the farm or ranch where sample was collected and also location of wound on animal.

From the information received, a determination can be made as to the necessary action. If sample is identified as a true screwworm, sterile flies will probably be dispersed in the area.

Palmmeier said the key to the program is that the sample of worms be collected at the time the wound is detected, and worms killed. Without the sample, it is impossible to tell if the infestation is from screwworm or some other maggot, similar in appearance and characteristics.

Killing the worms prevents spread of flies, and infestations are now at a minimum, prompt reporting and doctoring can prevent the infestation from mushrooming into a large outbreak.

Mad Dog Causes Northfield Scare

A dog belonging to Walter Timmons of Northfield has been declared rabid, according to a report received by the local Veterinary hospital. The dog became ill and was brought to the Children's hospital where he died the next day. The head was sent to Austin and the report was received on Wednesday.

Mr. and Mrs. Timmons and son Mark and the four boys of Mr. and Mrs. R. E. Hoover, are already taking the rabies shots.

No information was given as to the likely source of the rabies. Doctors say that many wild animals, such as skunks, coyotes and other common area animals develop rabies and infect dogs in the area that chase them.

Any suspicion of a dog's contact with skunks or coyotes should be sufficient evidence to have the pets vaccinated. — Children's Reporter.



The Heath Robinson ranch, along with W. H. "Buck" Marshall and Charles Long are land owners who have bermudagrass established. There are several small blocks of Midland and coastal bermudagrass scattered

over the county. These strains appear to be adapted. They offer a valuable source of summer pasture, especially where irrigated. Cost share is available for planting or sprigging pastures through the Great Plains Conservation Program, and the Agricultural Conservation Program. 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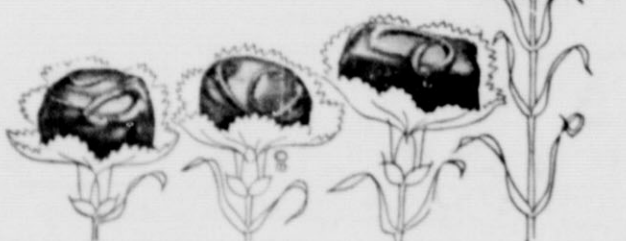
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
