"WE ARE A NATION engulfed by conformity," Rev. Miller Robinson, pastor of the First Baptist Church said here Sunday night from the pulpit of the First Methodist Church, bringing the Union Church Service message at the beginning of Youth Week.

Banquet Tonight

Annual Father-Son Banquet, the twenty-sixth, sponsored by the Matador Lions Club for more than a quarter of a century, will be held tonight in the First Baptist Church, with assembly in the auditorium at 6:45.

After a brief program with Scout Ronnie Cox as Master of Ceremonies and announcements by Boss Lion Mike Hoyle, the expected 300 fathers and sons will go to the church basement for the banquet and program.

Featured speaker will be James Jeffery, Ft. Worth businessman, who was an all-Southwest Conference football player at Baylor University in 1949-50.

"Some things in life are too precious to sell," Rev. Robinson said, "including the inheritance of freedom, church, friends, the right to vote, etc. We must not sell our inheritance of freedom to worship in the light, and without fear of our lives. We must not sell out our inheritance of religion."

Rev. Robinson told his young listeners and congregation of adults that "Youth often sacrifices his life to be popular. We should not sell our good name. A good name is chosen rather than great riches. It takes three months to build a house," he declared, "but it takes a lifetime to build a good name."

Rules were established so that I would have equal chances with their animals in the county show.

Date of the county demonstration and share-the-fun contest has been changed to Monday night March 18th. The program will start at 7:30 p.m., and be held in the school where the most entries are received, to comply with the decision of the 4-H leaders and junior leaders in meetings held after the 1962 contests. Junior and senior contests will be held, with senior contestants being 14 or older BEFORE January 1, 1963.

Entries must grade 70 or above to be eligible for district competition, with 1st place winners in all but the Junior Share-the-Fun contest eligible to compete in the district contest on

Saturday, April 27th at Midwestern University in Wichita Falls. Only the 1st and 2nd place senior teams in district are eligible for state competition, which will be held at Texas A & M college on June 5th.

Deadline for notification of intent to enter a demonstration or the share-the-fun contest (talent) is Friday, February 22nd, with entries indicated used to determine the location of the county contests.

Herb Martin of Flomot, planted a grain sorghum variety test plot using two of the dwarf (3x4) hybrids on May 23rd, and harvested the plot on Sept. 15th. Yields of the dwarf hybrids were as follows: A-398, 2250 lbs./ac.; A-3197, 2090 lbs./ac. Used as a check was RS-610, which produced 2480 lbs./ac.

Martin stated that the dwarf hybrids matured quickly, and threshed good. Stalks were about 8 inches shorter than the RS-610, which matured about one week after the dwarf hybrids. Some lodging was noted in A-3197, with lodging also noted in RS-610, but not as much as the A-3197.

Additional tests are planned, as the aim of the dwarf hybrids is to produce higher yields than other feeds during years of very low moisture available.

Cotton Report

Motley County had ginned 15,757 bales of cotton from the crop of 1962 on January 16, as compared to 19,076 on the same date in 1962 from the crop of '61, according to the U.S. Department of Commerce, Bureau of Census.

The entire state of Nevada ginned only 6,557 bales on the same date and the entire state of Virginia had ginned less than 12,000 bales on the same date. The entire state of Florida had ginned 12,272 bales. Kentucky and Illinois combined total was 6,559 bales.

Lubbock County, Texas with 292,595 bales on the same date is impressive but far short of Kern County California with 523,617 bales. The state of California, however, had a total of only 1,894,991 bales as compared with Texas' 4,654,634 bales.

Lubbock County produced more cotton than the entire state of New Mexico, it also produced more than the entire state of North Carolina, and came within 5,000 bales of producing as much as the entire state of Oklahoma.

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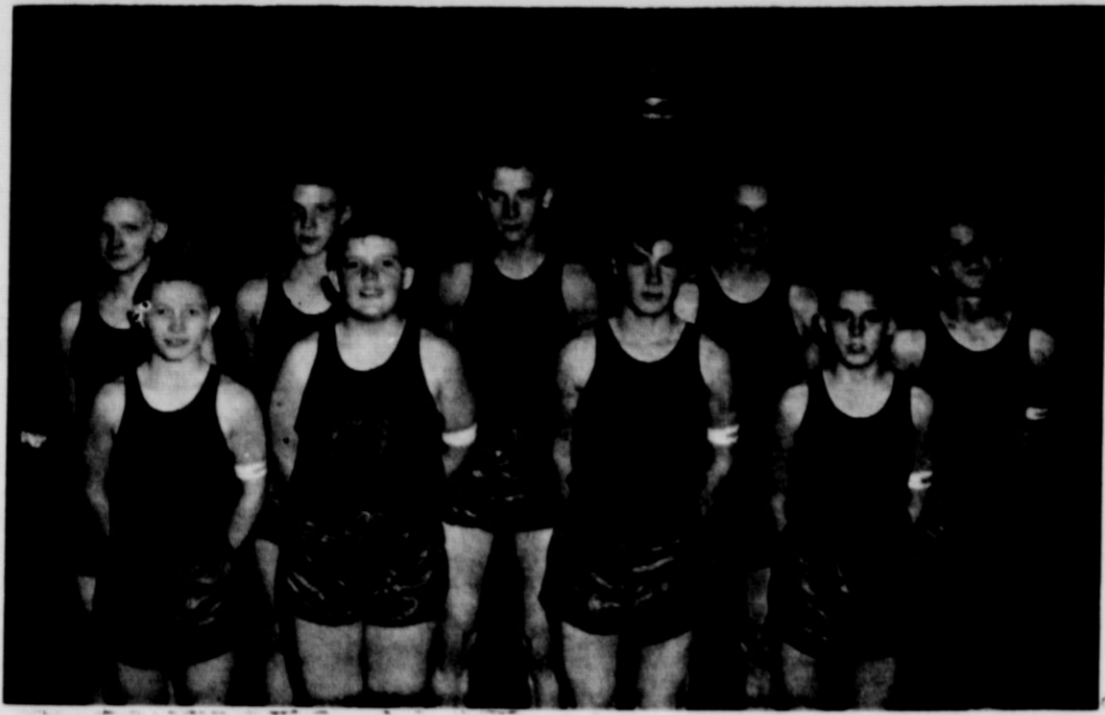
