This observance is from a friend: "Public relations is treating the public like you don't your relations."

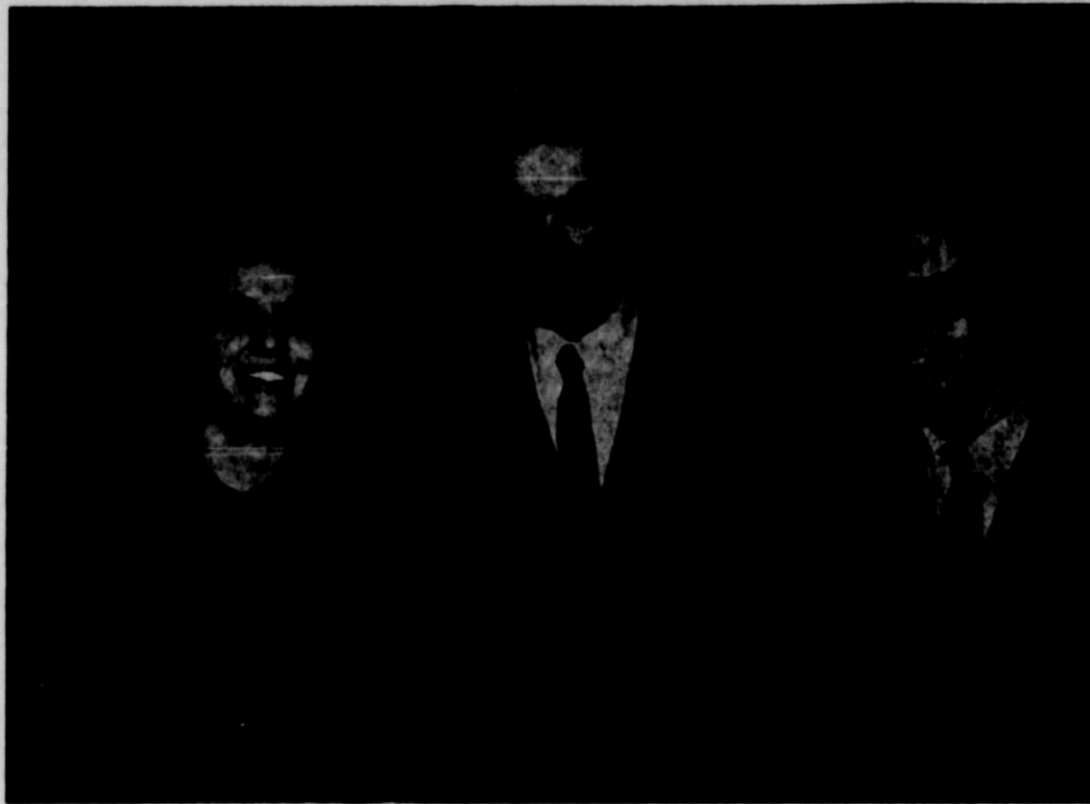
Much more could be said in defense of life if it didn't start when you are too young to understand it, and end when you are too old to do anything about it.

Marrs and Bostick Gold Star Winners

Miss Judy Marrs, daughter of Mr. and Mrs. Bruce Marrs and Steve Bostick, son of Mr. and Mrs. Lewis Bostick received the coveted Gold Star awards Monday night at the 4-H Achievement Banquet. Presented by the Agricultural Extension Service, these are the highest honors which 4-H members can receive.

A precedent is now set for the Bostick's youngest son, Berry, as their oldest son, Larry, now in college is a former Gold Star 4-H winner.

Perhaps the next most treasured awards are the wrist watches presented for the highest grading senior record and junior record. Jeanette Day, daughter of Mr. and Mrs. E. A. Day received the watch provided by Gasoline Farmers Union for the highest senior record. Paula Pallmeyer, daughter of Mr. and Mrs. Bill Pallmeyer received the watch for the highest junior record, which was presented by Motley County Farm Bureau.

Ten-year Leader Service pins were presented to Mr. and Mrs. Ray Cruse of Flomot, and Johnny Stevens and Ott Hines of Matador.

Awards for Outstanding Leader Service for the Year went to Mrs. Ike Reed, Flomot and Bill Peacock, Roaring Springs. These were provided by Lighthouse Electric Co-op.

County Agent Pallmeyer gave a brief summary of 4-H work in the county, which reveals that 270 members were enrolled in nine clubs. Of these, 173 completed projects, representing 64%; 28 moved from the county; 22 dropped out of 4-H work and 47 had no projects. Enrollment is up 18 from the previous year, but completions were down four, he said. Thirty-eight members participated in 20 district contests, and six in four state contests.

Non-Resident is 1st Contributor In Chest Drive

First contribution in the Matador Community Chest annual funds drive was from a non-resident, Mrs. C. M. Schultz of Fort Worth.

The Community Chest, Tuesday received a check for \$50 from Mrs. Schultz, which has been acknowledged by County Judge Forrest Campbell, who is president and funds campaign chairman, of the organization.

The drive is scheduled to be conducted in one day, December 3. Mrs. Schultz, who has visited Matador a number of times, is a niece of the late A. L. Curry.

County Soon to Get Promotion

Motley County will soon get a "promotion" from the 18th to the 19th Congressional District. Congressman George Mahon, who was here Monday, said the county will officially be in the 19th district after Congress convenes in January.

Motley County might have remained in Republican Bob Price's 18th district, had he not inadvertently made a statement after he was elected, to the effect that he "wished he was rid of Motley and Cottle Counties," because he did not carry them. Motley County was picked up by the veteran statesman George Mahon's 19th District.

Congressman Mahon did not have a Republican opponent in the recent general election.

Visiting in Matador Monday a short time prior to attending the 4-H Awards Banquet, Congressman and Mrs. Mahon were impressed by the progress being made here.

Both were impressed by the stores in Matador and particularly the art work displayed in vacant buildings by the Motley County Arts and Crafts Club, also by the flags that were flying at each place of business, and by the City Park and the homes here.

Arriving after 4 p.m. and accompanied by Dale Jones of Lubbock, they visited as many places of business as possible before closing hours. They were met by Judge Forrest Campbell and Douglas Meador who showed them points of interest before the 4-H banquet started 7 p.m.

Club to Present "Citizen" Award

An award to the "Outstanding Citizen of the Year" will be the highlight of a program and game night affair announced by Eternas Study Club for Thursday, November 21.

This will be the second annual award of this nature which the club has sponsored. Last year's "Citizen" award was presented to Mayor Freddie Welling for his untiring efforts in behalf of the city.

The program will start at 7:30 p.m. in the American Legion building and will be followed by dominoes and card games. Refreshments will be provided by the club.

The meeting will be open to the public and everyone in this and adjoining communities is invited to attend. Admission will be 50 cents.

Three young men were killed in two separate car accidents on Farm Road 599 near Flomot in less than three days. A third youth injured early Sunday morning in an accident in the city limits of Flomot, which claimed two lives, is in serious condition in an Amarillo hospital.

Dennis Jouett, 18, and Jackie Maupin, 17, both of Turkey, were pronounced dead at the scene in the Sunday accident, by Motley County Justice of the Peace W. W. Clements.

Motley County Sheriff J. D. Spray and Highway Patrolman Buck Johnson, investigating officers said the accident took place between 5 and 6:30 a.m., when the wreck was discovered. Sheriff Spray was notified about 6:30 after Malcolm Turner of Flomot spotted the wreckage.

According to the investigators the youths' car, going south on FM 599 went out of control when it missed a curve entering Flomot, crossed a ditch and hit a tractor and attached cotton stripper.

The third youth, Perry Lane, 19, of Turkey remains in serious condition in Northwest Texas Hospital in Amarillo, suffering fractures of both arms and both legs, broken ribs and internal injuries. He was first taken to the Turkey Clinic, then to Hall County Memorial Hospital in Memphis, then to Northwest Texas Hospital.

Funeral services for Jouett were held at 3 p.m. Monday at the First Baptist Church of Turkey, and those for Maupin were held at 10 a.m. Tuesday, also at the Turkey First Baptist Church. Burial for both was in Dreamland Cemetery, Turkey, directed by Seigler Funeral Home.

The Jouett youth is survived by his parents, Mr. and Mrs. Preston Jouett; three brothers, Willie, Peery and Eddie, and a sister, Darlene, all of the home. Survivors of the Maupin youth include his parents, Mr. and Mrs. Michie Maupin of Turkey; two brothers, Eddie of Dallas and Jerry of Lubbock; and a sister, Mrs. Milton Mann of Clarendon.

The car was almost demolished but the elderly man did not receive any injuries. He told officers he apparently went to sleep. He had been to Amarillo where he visited a brother and was on his way home.

Sheriff Spray brought him to Matador where he bought a bus ticket to his home in Stamford. Mr. Phelps lost a new pair of glasses in the accident but they were found intact.

Speaker Receives Standing Ovation

A STANDING OVATION led by Congressman George Mahon, followed an address by Mrs. Carl Carter of Plainview here Monday night. She is the former Mary Jane Hamilton of Matador, the daughter of Mr. and Mrs. John Hamilton and made the principal address at the annual 4-H Awards Banquet held in the American Legion Building.

Congressman Mahon said it was one of the best addresses he had ever heard. He and Mrs. Mahon were honored guests at the banquet. Mrs. Carter is a native daughter of Matador and a graduate of Matador High School, and is presently an instructor in Plainview's school system. She was a member of 4-H here for 10 years and was Gold Star girl, after receiving other numerous awards.

"I am proud to have had 4-H work," Mrs. Carter said, "because it has much to offer the young person . . . it will return to you what you are willing to put into it . . . 4-H has no room for the lazy and it selects the cream of the crop of boys and girls . . ."

"After entering college," Mrs. Carter said, "I was a jump ahead of those who had not had 4-H training . . . so many are willing to take important things for granted and this includes 4-H activities, the programs and the time spent by adult leaders . . . We must be thankful for dedicated adult leaders and learn to be good losers; learn to face the world . . ."

With reference to the present unrest among young people, Mrs. Carter said she believed it was due to lack of discipline in the home and the lack of communication between young people and their parents.

The Generation Gap

"They speak of the generation gap," Mrs. Carter declared, "but it is not changed. Every generation has experienced a generation gap . . . it is a lack of home discipline . . . and a lack of self discipline, which is a tool with which to make decisions . . ."

In her advice to her young listeners, Mrs. Carter said . . . "young people have much for which to be thankful, including the opportunity to secure an education . . . the guidance of your parents is important . . . set your goals early . . . what you are today will determine what you are tomorrow . . . 4-H keeps you striving . . ."

Mrs. Carter paid tribute to County Agent Bill Pallmeyer for his leadership in county 4-H work, and to the dedicated adult (Continued on back page)

The Matador Matadors made another great come-back Friday night, running over the Nazareth Swifts 44 to 0. The Matadors, still flushed from Saturday's triumph over Turkey came on the field with a determination to win again.

The first quarter was sluggish for both teams. The second quarter, however, burst aflame when Darrel Cruse blasted through the Swifts, racking up 20 yards and putting the Matadors on the one foot line. Cruse went into action again blaring over the goal line for the first touchdown. Don Cox had no trouble kicking the extra points, making the score 7-0.

Don Pitts proved his tremendous speed with a pass completion and an astonishing run of 40 yards, leaving the Swifts far behind. The kick for extra points failed, ending the half with the score 13-0.

The Matadors did not hesitate to get the score board rolling again in the second half when a pass completion was made to

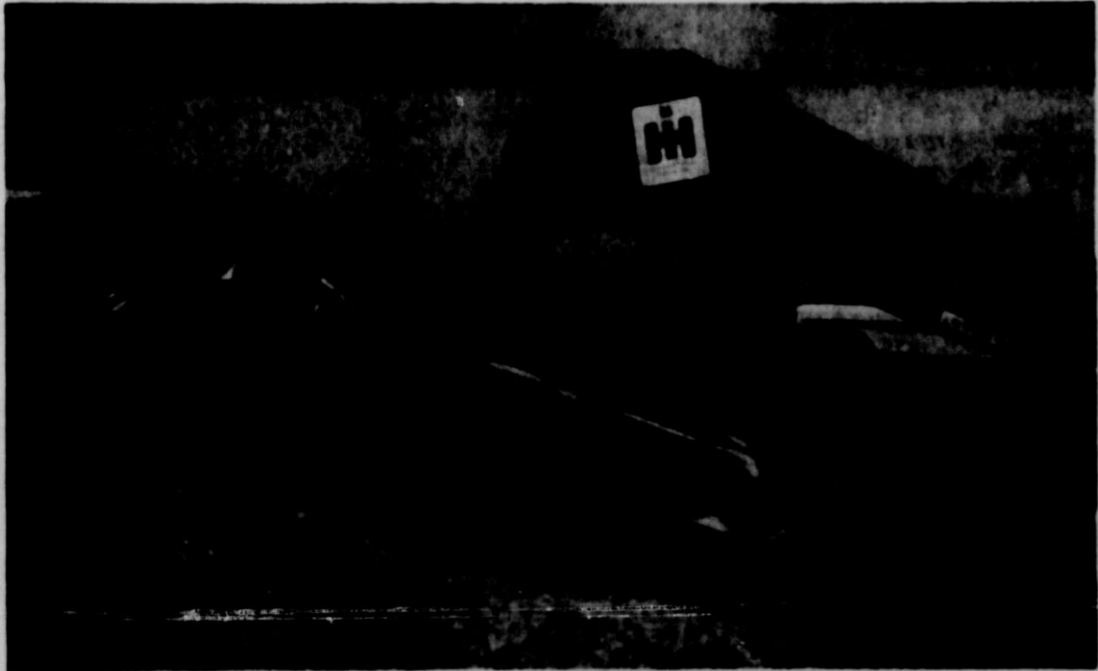
Bill Barnhill putting the Matadors over the goal line once again. Cox succeeded in kicking the extras, making the score 20-0.

Cox then set the stage for action with a 20 yard run putting the Matadors on the 10 yard line. The gain allowed Ronnie Welling to make the next touchdown. The try for extra points was called back because of a penalty against the Matadors. The next try was foiled, making the score 26-0.

The untiring Matadors started the last quarter with more spirit than ever. Welling got things started by dashing down the field with a pick up of 20 yds. and 6 points, but his run for extras failed. On the Matador kick off, the Matadors charged down the field to recover the kick. Hurt kept up the charge with a dash to the 2 yd. line. The gain enabled Cox to speed over the goal line making the score 38-0.

The Swifts showed their only sign of come-back when Gerber intercepted a pass on Matador's 20 yd. line. However, the overpowering strength of the Matadors kept the Swifts from a further gain. In closing minutes of the ball game, Cox raked up the final score with a 15 yd run, making the score 44 to 0.

AN ORDINANCE PERMITTING THE CENTER PARKING OF VEHICLES ON THE STREETS OF CITY OF MATADOR.

BE IT ORDAINED BY THE CITY COUNCIL, CITY OF MATADOR:

1. Hereafter it shall be lawful for any person to park an automobile or other vehicle, as parking lines indicate, in the center of the following streets within the City of Matador to-wit: On Dundee Avenue between Eubank Street and Bundy Street and on Main Street between Stewart Avenue and Lariat Avenue.

Highlights and Sidelights FROM YOUR STATE CAPITAL By Vern Sanford

AUSTIN — General election day was a rosy one for statewide Democratic contenders.

Not only did Texas endorse liberal presidential candidate Hubert Humphrey, but also all statewide Democratic standard bearers. No incumbent congressmen lost their jobs and the partisan lineup in the state legisla-

ture remained just the way it is. Preston Smith of Lubbock won the gubernatorial race with about 57 per cent of the votes over his opponent and first-time candidate GOPer Paul Eggers of Wichita Falls.

Ben Barnes, 30, of DeLeon will become the youngest lieutenant governor in history by virtue of his overwhelming triumph over Republican Doug DeCluitt of Waco. Barnes was the top statewide vote-getter on the ballot.

All incumbent statewide officials seeking re-election won handsily.

In congressional races, three Republicans seeking new terms had no great trouble, but none of their colleagues seeking to unseat incumbent Democrats was successful. Congressional lineup remains 20 Democrats to three Republicans.

Eight Republican state House members were elected—four incumbents, four newcomers. Three incumbent GOPers were

defeated. Two GOP state senators were re-elected. Lineup remains 142 Democrats to eight Republicans in the House, 29 Democrats to two GOPs in the Senate.

Boasting that no other state can compare with Texas "regarding its support of, loyalty to or victory for the Democratic party," former State Democratic Committee Chairman Will D. Davis observed:

Texas is the most populous state to have a Democratic governor and only one of 10 largest to have solid statewide Democratic administration.

Texas was the only one in the southern and southwestern regions to give Humphrey plurality; and only Texas, Washington and Hawaii west of the Mississippi voted for the Democratic presidential nominee.

MOST AMENDMENTS DEFEATED—Voters showed they are in an economy frame of mind in their decisions on 14 proposed

state constitutional amendments.

They voted November 5 to cut out the state property tax, but they refused to go along with raising the state's public welfare ceiling from \$60 million to \$75 million a year or to increase legislators salaries from \$4,800 to \$8,400 annually.

Approved were changes in state employees' pension system, university fund investment liberalization, removal of the \$504 a year ceiling on contributions to teacher pensions, wiping out the property tax and clarification of a legislator's eligibility to run for other office by virtue of the termination date of his elective term.

Texans turned thumbs down on tax exemptions for warehouse-stored property, El Paso local governmental consolidations, Dallas road bonds, tax aid for Texarkana tobacco merchants, state contract changes, tax benefits for anti-pollution equipment purchasers and indus-

trial bond issues.

COTTON GIN RIDER DUMPED—A controversial appropriations bill rider twice vetoed by Gov. John Connally was stricken from a budget draft on motion of Lt. Gov.-elect Ben Barnes. Barnes got some opposition from House Speaker-designate Rep. Gus Mutscher of Brenham and Rep. W. S. Heatly of Paducah, but Gov.-elect Preston Smith held his motion carried on voice vote.

Rider sought to keep funds from being spent to police air pollution by cotton gins. Mutscher said the problem is insignificant and is used by politicians to "demagogue." Connally has maintained that the problem caused by gins is major. Barnes argued that the rider is unneeded and is simply a "political factor."

Plenty of time during the legislative session to work it out," Smith said in sustaining the vote on deletion.
