## Directors Complete Old Settlers Plans

A NEW LOOK has come to Pioneer Park Pavilion and Rodeo Grounds at Roaring Springs, for the 40th annual reunion of Motley-Dickens Counties pioneers, which opens for three days and nights, August 22, 23 and 24. About 80 gallons of paint and a great amount of labor has created the changed appearance of the pavilion and rodeo grounds. Many other improvements have been made including an enlargement of the young people's open air dance platform.

John Stotts reported at the directors meeting held at the pavilion Saturday afternoon that the silver-mounted bits and spurs had arrived for prizes and that the saddles were about ready. He said interest was high this year in the rodeo contests.

The meeting was called to order by President Maurice Goodwin of Afton. Minutes of the previous meeting were read and approved by secretary treasurer Corby Lee (Corky) Marshall.

Report was made that the Seaboard carnival of children's rides will be on the ground next week in advance as usual.

**Meador To Speak**

Joe B. Meador, manager of the Veteran Chamber of Commerce, a native son of Motley County, graduate of Matador High School and Texas Tech, will make the memorial address at 11 a.m.

Rev. W. B. Vaughn, retired Methodist minister, of Matador will give the invocation.

Meador was previously associated with the Lubbock Chamber of Commerce, later was manager of the Halls and Lovington, N. M. Chambers of Commerce, before moving to Vernon two years ago. He is the son of Joe Meador of Matador, a Motley County pioneer for almost 70 years.

**Attendance Is Urged**

Attendance of pioneers from the entire area is urged by President Maurice Goodwin. "This association belongs to the Old Settlers," he declared, "and we hope every one will attend. The program includes the Sullivan-Clifton Singers (singers of Gospel songs) Thursday afternoon following the business meeting. ## Fall from Horse Fatal to Child

Carlina Osborn, four-year-old daughter of Mrs. Mark Kiser of Winters, Texas, was the victim of an accident Thursday afternoon, August 8, on the Bird ranch 23 miles southeast of Matador.

The child died in Richards Memorial Hospital in Paducah, where she was conveyed after falling from a horse which she had been riding.

The mishap occurred shortly after noon on the ranch, operated by her maternal grandparents, Mr. and Mrs. Carl Bird, with whom she was living, in Matador.

She was riding on the saddle in front of a half-brother, Ros Bearden, 19, who halted the horse and dismounted to open a gate. The horse started trotting, and the child, directed by her brother, pulled on the reins to stop the animal. Instead of stopping however, the horse began running, and the little girl became unseated and fell.

The child was brought by car to Matador and after failure to locate a doctor, she was taken by a Eudy-Seale ambulance to the Paducah hospital, where she died about forty-five minutes later.

Carl Bird related that he had sent his son, Ros to turn cattle out of a trap and the child had wanted to ride along with her brother. The horse they were riding was a yearling.

George L. Lewis, Superintendent of the Matador Colored school announced that registration will be held Friday, August 30, at 8:00 a.m. and classes will begin on Monday, Sept. 2.

A faculty meeting is announced for 8:30 a.m. Thursday, August 29.

The Matador Drum and Bugle Corps is reminded of the first meeting of the season, set for 5:00 p.m. Monday, August 26, with the new director, Donald Ford, in charge.

**Others Start August 26**

Announcement was made last week by Supt. E. J. McKnight at Roaring Springs, that the Roaring Springs schools will start Monday, August 26, and a similar announcement was made this week by C. W. Giesecke Jr., Superintendent of the Patton Springs School.

First faculty meeting and building workshops at Roaring Springs are scheduled for Friday, August 23, at 9 a.m. according to Supt. McKnight. Other activities scheduled there for the school term, are listed elsewhere in this issue of the Tribune.

A brief assembly at 8:30 a.m. August 26 will open the Patton Springs School, and regular schedule of classes will be held, beginning at 8:40 a.m. and dismissing at 3:45 p.m. Supt. Giesecke announced.

### Higher Speeds on Texas Highways Start August 23

Under the speed control law passed by the Legislature this spring, all highways not zoned down by the Commission will automatically go to the new 70-mph speed August 23. This means that some 41,500 miles of the state-maintained highway system will be allowed to come under the higher maximum speed.

The Commission today passed a Minute Order which zoned some 18,640 miles of the highway system at a maximum of 60 miles per hour daytime and 55 miles per hour at night for passenger cars, effective August 23. These highways will be restricted to the lower speed limit because engineering studies indicate they are inadequate to accommodate a 70-miles-per-hour maximum.

A large percentage of Texas' vast Farm to Market Road System will come under the 70-mph maximum, although some of these roads (and some of the older primary routes) will be restricted to the lower 60-mph maximum where conditions warrant.

### Tardy Will Be County's Voice At State Meet

Don Carl Tardy, son of Mr. and Mrs. Carl Tardy of Roaring Springs will represent Motley County Saturday and Sunday during Attorney General Waggoner Carr's Youth Conference in the State Capitol.

The conference is a new approach for combating crime in Texas and will give the youth of the state a big hand in solving the problem.

The program resulted from a meeting of 100 Austin high school youth leaders and Attorney General Carr. The meeting this week end will be a workshop for youth leaders from throughout the state to exchange ideas and to initiate definite programs for action against "some adult crime in their communities."

Students will be joined by experienced community service leaders in developing their own programs. Prominent speakers will be featured and over 600 delegates will register in the State Capitol Rotunda. Carr has said this will become an annual conference with plans already being considered to accommodate over 1,500 delegates next summer.

The conference will concentrate on six major areas: law enforcement, public awareness, community service, sparetime and recreation, employment to combat "dropout," school administration and the delinquent.

Carr said purpose of the conference with youth leaders is to further enlarge the scope of their attack on youth crime by becoming partners with their community leaders.

### Turney Sparks Dies After Heart Attack

Turney Sparks, son of an early-day cowboy on the Matador Ranch, was found dead on his ranch near Robert Lee, Thursday after apparently dying of a heart attack. He was about 55.

A former juvenile officer in Abilene, Sparks resigned to enter the ranching business several years ago.

Services were held at 10 a.m. Saturday in the First Baptist Church of Robert Lee.

Survivors include his wife, a sister, Mrs. Virgie Hunter of Slaton, and a brother, Bunyan Sparks, of Houston.

Their father, the late Frank Sparks, moved here from Coke county in the "early days," and with his family, lived at Rustler Camp. Mrs. Sparks died in 1910, and the three small children lived with their grandmother until her death. Afterwards, the late Mr. and Mrs. J. S. Lambert, long-time friends of the family, took the motherless children into their home and reared them.

Mrs. Henry Ford, the former Lucy Lambert, attended the funeral services and remained to visit with relatives in Robert Lee.

### Former Resident Injured In Wreck

A former Matador resident is in critical condition in Plainview Hospital and Clinic, following a highway accident about 8 p.m. Sunday. He is Albert Thrasher, 19, son of Mr. and Mrs. John Thrasher of Plainview, formerly of Matador.

The accident occurred four miles south of Edmondson on a county paved road. The car in which the youth was riding with a cousin, Richard Brown, 21, of Tucuman, N. M. went out of control, traveled several hundred yards, striking mail boxes, a barbed wire fence and borrow ditches. Both youths were critically injured and hospitalized.
