VFW Barbecue Nets Ball League \$400

A chicken barbecue sponsored by the VFW Monday night aided the Matador Baseball League approximately \$400, according to a report made Tuesday by President Forrest Campbell at the meeting of the Matador Lions Club.

He paid high tribute to the Veterans of Foreign Wars for their contribution to the boys' season. He said the total cost of operation would be in the neighborhood of \$1,000, but that Forrest Park concession stand had netted approximately \$400 last season.

Lion Campbell said the gross proceeds of the chicken barbecue were about \$455 and that the net would be approximately \$400. He said the baseball league had \$200 indebtedness from improvements made last year, but that he felt the new season would provide adequate operating funds. Matador Lions also sponsor the baseball activities for the season.

Campbell said approximately 60 boys will participate in baseball this season (after the end of school) and will make up four teams.

There will be two Freshmen League teams (boys 9-12 years of age), one Junior League team (boys 13-15 years of age) and one Senior League team (boys 16-18 years of age).

Girls Place 3rd In District 8-9B

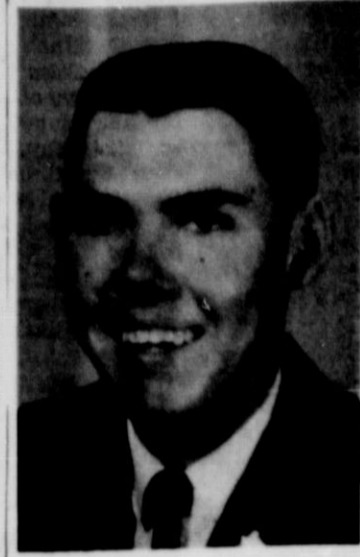
The Matadors traveled to Estelline Tuesday, April 9, where they advanced into the finals by defeating Turkey 2 out of 3 games.

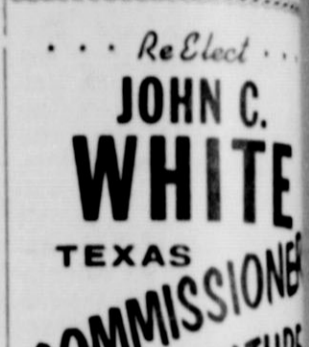

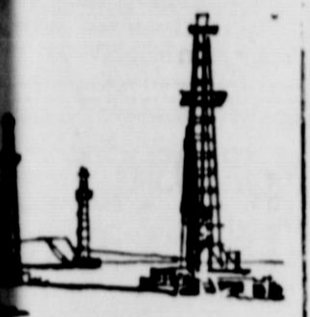
