Carr says the conference will be held annually and that plans are already being considered to accomodate over 1500 delegates next summer.





able to take part in a pilot program of six-month school sessions for the children of migrant workers during the 1963-64 school year. That is if the Texas Education Agency can find five districts that can handle the program.

Migrant School Experiment

San Benito and Edinburg school districts are ready to participate. McAllen and Pharr-San Juan-Alamo districts are readying proposals to submit to the State Board of Education.
