for publicity purposes, to keep public awareness of the department's existence. It is driven purposely as much as possible to remind the public.

**Period of Danger**  
Lion Welling reminded the Lions that we are approaching a period of extreme fire danger because of dryness and high winds.

Members of the department have built much of the equipment (with the aid of Jameson Machinery Co.). In addition to mobile tanks for grass fires, the department has 12 firemen's coats, loud-speakers, gloves, smoke masks, oxygen equipment, new type nozzles, special mobile generators capable of supplying current to local hospitals in case of an emergency.

Ten members of the department are on a fire alarm system which rings their telephones simultaneously until they are answered.

All of the department's equipment is free of debt, paid mostly by donations from ranchers and farmers and direct contributions. Last year the City of Matador paid the firemen a total of \$880 for answering calls.

Welling warned against driving over the hose. "It costs \$1.38 per foot in 50-foot lengths (without couplings). Driving over a hose usually breaks it, or later results in a break."
