

Infant Year Shivers Under Frosty Blanket

LITTLE 1959 arrived a few hours ago. The infant year received a cold reception in much of the nation and the Panhandle of Texas is shivering under the coldest "spell" of the season. Area of the Foothill Country apparently escaped the blunt of the par-

alyzing storm that left hundreds of stranded motorists across New Mexico and the upper Panhandle. The mercury here registered a low of 17 degrees Tuesday morning. The blizzard that moved in from the west after dumping

14 inches of snow in Albuquerque, arrived with little warning. Summerlike atmosphere Sunday afternoon was swept away by the mass of cold air and overcast of gray clouds. About 10 o'clock Monday morning a violent sleet storm struck Matador and in the mat-

ter of a few moments approximately one inch of ice covered the streets. Warm earth beneath the ice soon melted the covering. Intermittent snow continued to fall through Monday and Tuesday but the fall was very light. The mercury continued a slow downward glide through

most of Monday and stood at 20 degrees at dark. A slight moderation had started Tuesday but the temperature hovered around freezing all day. **Wheat is Benefitted** The light moisture left by the sleet and snow will greatly benefit young wheat, farmers de-

clared, and perhaps "hold it" until more moisture arrives. At least three deaths in Texas were attributed to the storm that made driving extremely hazardous all the way to the central part of the state. No accidents were reported in Motley county and all roads in the

county remained opened. Tucumcari, N. M. had snow drifts 3 to 4 feet high and the city was "host" to about 400 stranded motorists as roads in all directions were blocked. At Conchos Dam, 35 miles north of Tucumcari, 20 inches of snow was reported.

Fort Worth, (Special) James William (Dub) Drace, field inspector for Texas and Southwestern Cattle Raisers Association in 22 counties in the South Plains and Cap Rock region, has been honored as December "Inspector of the Month" by the ranchers' organization Norman Moser, DeKalb, president, made the announcement in the Association's monthly newsletter, THE CATTLE RAISER.

Drace, a resident of Lubbock, was cited for his 17 years of outstanding service to TSCRA members in Bailey, Castro, Cochran, Cottle, Crosby, Dickens, Fisher, Floyd, Foard, Hale, Haskell, Hockley, Jones, King, Lamb, Lubbock, Motley, Nolan, Parmer, Stonewall and Swisher counties.

He was described as the "personal envoy" of the more than 85 per cent of all cattlemen in the area who are Association members. COUNTY AGENT PALLMEYER SAYS:

Winterize Farm Machinery

Up to 30% can be added to the life of farm machinery by giving it proper winter care. Time will also be saved in getting the machinery back on the job when it is needed.

Machinery should be kept un-dressed if possible when not in use. All bright metal parts such as mower sickles, plow wings, cultivator and other plow points as well as all working parts of the machines should be coated with grease. Rubber tires should be blocked up to take weight of the machine off of them while in storage.

Gasoline should be drained from auxiliary motors. Spark plugs should be removed and three or four ounces of cylinder oil dropped into each cylinder. The motor should be turned a few times to distribute the oil and the plugs replaced.

Cooling systems on all motors not used during the winter season should be drained. A cover should be placed over the engine exhaust pipe to keep out moisture. All machinery should get a thorough lubrication job when it goes into storage and batteries removed and checked regularly to see that they remain fully charged.

While the machines are in storage, check them thoroughly for worn and broken parts. Repairs can be made during the slack season and no time will be lost when the machines are again needed in the field.

Since spraying machines are precision equipment, they need special care at storage time. The sprayer should be flushed with warm, soapy water and rinsed with clear water. Dismantle the tank, pump, valves, hoses, pipes and nozzles. All water should be removed to prevent possible damage from freezing.

A light coating of oil should be applied to the inside of the tank after it has dried and metal piston and gear pumps should be filled with oil. Nozzles should be cleaned and stored where they will not be damaged. Farm costs can be cut and machinery life lengthened by proper winter care.

Legume Demonstration Test
Ten legumes were planted on the Frank Montgomery place north of Matador on May 28th for observation of growth char-

acteristics. The first check on July 25th showed that Mesa guar, New Era cowpeas and Pelican soybeans got their growth the quickest, but another check on Aug. 20th showed that Sesbania, Crotalaria and New Era cowpeas provided the most cover.

Mesa, Groehler and Tessel guar were in the check and Mesa proved to be the best guar, with Tessel giving the poorest results.

New Era, Brabham and Chinese Red cowpeas were checked, with New Era easily the top variety. Bottom variety was Chinese Red, which burned up before the check on Aug. 20th.

Pelican soybeans were superior to Lee, and the most growth of any of the legumes was produced by Sesbania and Crotalaria.

The demonstration was under the supervision of County Agent Pallmeyer.

historic "White House"—where her husband was employed as a cowboy.

In 1900, her husband began his own ranching operations in southern Motley County and the couple built their first home on that spread four miles south of here. Mr. Moore actively operated the ranch, which still remains in the family, until his retirement about five years ago.

Mrs. Moore again became a resident of Matador in 1913, when the family moved from ranch to town to be nearer schools. Her last residence, built on the same location as the first, stands squarely across an old cattle trail which Mr. Moore traveled from Childress, then the closest rail point as a 21-year-old headed for his first job on the Matadors.

Mrs. Moore is survived by her husband, a Motley County resident since 1888 and currently a patient in Stanley Hospital here; two sisters, a brother, four daughters, nine grandchildren and 16 great-grandchildren.

Two Daughters in Lubbock

Two daughters live in Lubbock. They are Mrs. Sam G. Dunn and Mrs. Chas. A. Guy, wives, respectively, of a physician and the editor of the Avalanche-Journal. Another, Mrs. J. Farris Fish, is the wife of a Matador attorney and ranch-owner, and the fourth, Mrs. Charlotte Hunsucker, lives in Corpus Christi.

Ranch, the son of Mr. and Mrs. Willie J. Drace. Prior to his employment with the Association in 1941, he worked on the Matador Ranch, the VVN Ranch in Farwell and the U Bar Ranch in Hachita, New Mexico. With his father as a partner, he operated his own ranch before the war.

His wife is the former Corene Russell, daughter of Mr. and Mrs. J. E. Russell. Mr. Russell also served the Association as brand inspector for 29 years until his death in 1952.

Each year, the 62 field and market inspectors of the 10,169 member Association validate the brands on 2,000,000 cattle to recover strayed or stolen beef on the hoof for rightful owners. This year, according to Moser, the corps of inspectors recovered \$148,116.40 worth of stolen cattle. Charges were brought against 131 offenders, with 54 cases brought to trial and 51 offenders convicted.

"Most stealing today is limited to unbranded stock, especially unbranded calves," Drace says, warning that ranchers should brand their calves by weaning time, keep fences in good repair, gates locked and guard against carelessness.
