Young Legion Speaker Says

Next War Can Start With Short Warning

LESS THAN 15 MINUTES is the amount of time experts concede as a period of warning in event nations of the world engage in another war. Peace, and within 15 minutes the earth can become a sphere of flaming death and destruction.

These startling words were spoken Monday night by Bourland 'Bodie' Keith, modest, soft-spoken young man, but one of the best qualified authorities on the subject of modern warfare in West Texas. He is the son of Commander and Mrs. D. P. Keith and he made the principal address at the regular meeting of Fleming Post American Legion. Mrs. Keith is president of the Auxiliary.

Young Keith, who is a member of the American Society of Engineers, is a graduate of Texas Tech. He served for a time at Holloman Air Base and later went to White Sands proving grounds where he served for 33 months before enlisting in the US Navy. Only recently he suffered a serious ailment and underwent an operation.

His subject Monday night was: "Missiles, Our Nation's Defense." He explained the urgency in the nation's missile program and said that we are behind the Russians in development of the deadly instrument of defense and destruction.

He explained the various types of missiles — the successes and failures — and said the solid propellant in fuels is one of the greatest advancements made in the program. He said that missiles fired from submarines may play an important part in this nation's security, and also that missiles fired from planes are in the mighty movement for supremacy.

Young Keith named the various types of missiles, their purposes, scope, fuels, advantage and shortcomings with the same ease that an average young man his age might name outstanding baseball players and their batting averages.

"We must be prepared, in the event of war," he said, "there will be no warning, we must be ready to go."

Lions Hear Bourland Keith Discuss The Last, "The Vertical Frontier"

"THE LIMITS OF SPACE are diminishing" Bourland "Bodie" Keith said Tuesday as he explained the assaults of the new "pioneers" on the last frontier this world is to know, "the vertical frontier." He was principal speaker at the regular luncheon meeting of the Matador Lions club held in the basement of the Methodist Church.

"The Chinese made the first assault on space with rocket powered instruments, before the birth of Christ," he said, "and the Germans made the first use of the rocket with V-2's which were captured during World War II... since then this country and Russia have tracked rockets hundreds of thousands of miles into outer space."

Dougherty Road Bid Awarded

Contract for 17.7 miles of construction FM Road 684 in Floyd and Motley counties has been awarded to an Amarillo firm, it was announced this week by the State Highway Commission.

Cooper and Woodruff, Inc. submitted the low bid of \$200,165.57 on the project.

Construction work includes grading, structures, base and surfacing from Loop 42 in Roaring Springs west to the Floyd County line, State Highway 70 one mile southeast of Roaring Springs to 5.5 miles east, from three miles southeast of Dougherty on FM Road 28, east to Motley County line.

It is expected that 175 working days will be required to complete the project according to Palmer Massey of Childress, Dist. Highway Engineer.

Resident Engineer Algie Groves of Matador will be in active charge of the project while it is under construction, the Highway Commission announced.

MORE rainfall early this week brought cotton planting to an abrupt halt in this area of the Panhandle. With "planting time" rapidly passing, farmers are desperate to get crops in the ground.

Rainfall which began early (after midnight) Tuesday, measured one inch here in Matador. A few hours of sunshine through partly cloudy skies were lost as far as drying out the rain-soaked soil was concerned. More rains started about 10 p. m. Tuesday and continued through the night. Honored Dead Receive Memorial Day Eulogy

A WHISPER of wind stirred the flag, and quail called softly in the dew-fresh morning Saturday as a fitting tableau of peace at Matador East Mound Cemetery gate. A group of veterans from two wars held their rifles unasily as they awaited their place in the Memorial Day program.

Three bright wreaths were arranged before the truck that served as the speakers' platform. The flowers were a tribute to heroes buried in foreign lands and lost at sea. Following the program, flags were placed on graves of war veterans buried in the cemetery.

Opening prayer was by Rev. W. B. Vaughn. Scripture reading was by Rev. Gene Hawkins, and Rev. L. W. Tucker, pastor of the First Methodist Church brought the Memorial message.

Appreciation for those who paid the supreme price of freedom with their lives, was stressed by Rev. Tucker as he raised the question of whether we, as a nation, are defending this heritage of freedom.

"Consider The Price" "As we look backward, we need to consider the price they paid in laying down their lives that we might have life," he asserted.

"We need also to take an inward look as we consider this question," Rev. Tucker declared. "We know that we are not defending this heritage of freedom because there is such a small percentage of people who take religious life seriously... we need to support the church because we need to depend on the church and Christian to lay the groundwork for the future... we need to build a firm foundation to keep the peace." Besides his wife, Mrs. W. S. Smiley of Roaring Springs, he is survived by two daughters, Mrs. W. H. Marshall of Roaring Springs and Mrs. John Belaska of Afton; 3 grandchildren; 1 sister, Mrs. Roy Riney of Merkel; and two brothers, Bud Smiley and J. C. Smiley, both of Roaring Springs.

Mr. Smiley was a member of the Roaring Springs Masonic Lodge and of the First Christian Church. He was a veteran of the Spanish-American war.

Courthouse to Get Face Lifting Job

Work was started Monday to repair faults in Motley County's almost new quarter of a million dollar courthouse. Rains have caused severe damage to the building because of water seeping through the walls and through faults in the masonry.

During a recent "blowing rain" seven mop buckets of water were collected from the lobby floor. Walls on the north are badly damaged because of water.

A contracting firm is going over the masonry from roof cornice to the ground and forcing concrete into openings under high pressure. When that is completed, the building will be completely waterproofed with a transparent material. Cost of the work will be in the neighborhood of \$5,000.

New Well Started

Cement was drying early this week on Motley County's newest oil development venture. It is the Perkins-Prothro Co. (Wichita Falls) wildcat venture, the No. 1 Hamilton Estate, two miles east of Roaring Springs.

Lubbock Avalanche last week said the exploration is scheduled to 4,600 feet to test the Permian zone. It is one mile northwest of the nearest production in the West Roaring Springs Field.

The well is located 720 feet from north and 1,980 feet from west lines of Section 47, IRR survey.

North Main Closed To Rebuild Bridge

Traffic was turned away from the Hackberry branch of Balardi Creek bridge on North Main Street Monday as the State Highway Department started demolishing the old structure. The new bridge will be the full width of the street with walks on the east and west sides, it was announced.

In connection with the project the city will lower the water supply line that crosses the creek under the old bridge.

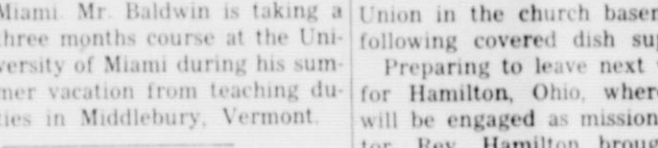

Speaker Asserts Complacency is Threat to Nation

Contrary to popular belief, complacency rather than communism is the nation's number one enemy, believes Rev. Bill Rowland, pastor of the Sandhill Baptist Church in Floyd County.

Rev. Rowland was guest speaker Thursday night at a joint meeting of the Baptist Brotherhood and Woman's Missionary Union in the church basement, following covered dish supper.

Preparing to leave next week for Hamilton, Ohio, where he will be engaged as mission pastor, Rev. Hamilton brought a new insight to Baptist home missions work, in his talk here.

There are more churches in Hamilton, but less Christianity than any place I have ever been," declared Rev. Rowland. "Communism is not the worst threat to our nation. Our Number One enemy is complacency which lets Communism come in, and which permits the church to grow weak... we're too satisfied, and if we aren't careful, our complacency will destroy America."

Using a Scriptural text from the Book of Judges, Rev. Rowland charged his listeners with the task of: 1. Locate the enemy; 2. Design a plan; and 3. Go into action.

"We will then see the victory."

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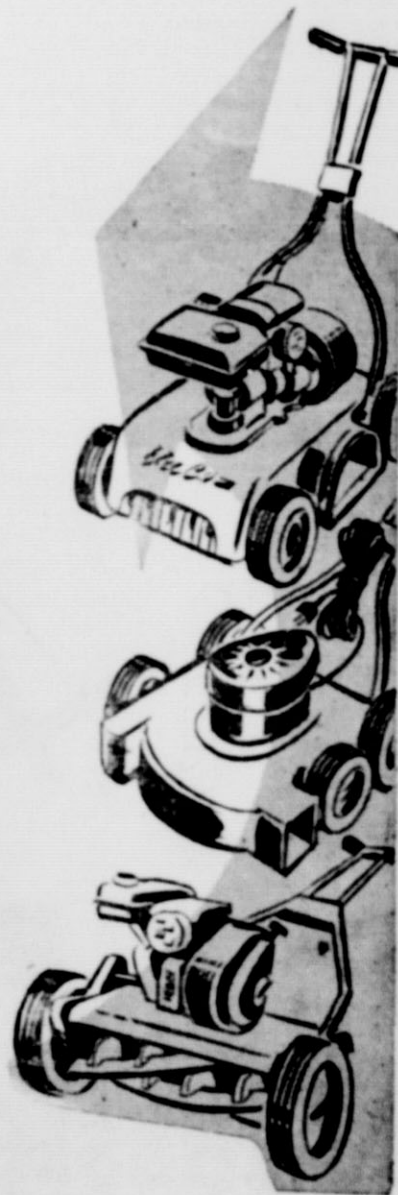
