"Our most valuable asset is our young people," Mayor Braselton said, "and we have lost them. Between 1953 and 1957 Roaring Springs graduated 61 young people (22 girls and 39 boys). Twelve of them now live in the county and only two are following livestock and agriculture. Four are teachers and two more received college degrees. 




