## City to Enforce Prompt Payments

Delinquent payments for city services, water, sewer and sanitation, has been a recent problem to the City of Matador, but a new, rigid rule has been approved by the city council.

All bills are due and payable by the 10th of the month. When bills are not paid by the 25th, service will be discontinued. City employees have been instructed to notify the user and then discontinue the service without any exception.

A member of the council said the rule was necessary to be fair to the majority of city customers who pay their bills promptly.

"We have instructed employees to make no exceptions to the minority who abuse the courtesy of the city," he declared, "and the city needs its money to operate the same as any other business."

Another matter brought before the council was the problem of children riding bicycles on the sidewalks. It is a violation of city ordinances, highly dangerous, and the council is issuing a warning to instruct children that bikes on the sidewalks is a violation of the law.

Survivors include his wife, of New Orleans; one son, Hal, of El Paso; his mother, Mrs. J. M. Duren, Roaring Springs; three brothers, Hubert Gunter, Amarillo; Francis Gunter, Floydada; and Robert Gunter, Duncan, Okla.; and one sister, Mrs. Estelle Mize, Amarillo.

### Farm Safety Week Proclaimed by County Judge

County Judge Elbert Reeves has officially proclaimed July 21-27 as FARM SAFETY WEEK in Motley County, according to Harold Campbell, President of the Motley County Farm Bureau.

President Kennedy and Governor Connally have previously designated that week on national and state levels as a period to call attention to worthwhile safety practices that can reduce disabling injuries and death.

The county farm leader said that farm accidents have been reduced in the past few years; however, farmers cannot afford to let down their guard against accidents. He emphasized that farming remains one of the most hazardous occupations in America today.

In his official proclamation, County Judge Reeves said: "All the citizens of Motley County are concerned about the safety and well-being of farm families from whom we receive our abundance of food and other essential agricultural commodities."

WHEREAS all the citizens of Motley County are concerned about the safety and well-being of farm families from whom we receive our abundance of food and other essential agricultural commodities; and

WHEREAS farm accidents result in over 150 deaths and thousands of disabling injuries in Texas each year; and

WHEREAS farm accidents are responsible for needless suffering and incapacity, and greatly effect the economic well-being and progress of our agricultural population in our county, state, and nation; and

WHEREAS the president of the United States and the Governor of Texas have designated the period of July 21-27, 1963, as FARM SAFETY WEEK; and

WHEREAS throughout this special week, a statewide farm accident prevention and educational program will be undertaken by the Texas Farm Bureau, the Texas Farm and Ranch Safety Council, the Texas Agricultural Extension Service, the Texas Safety Association, and the Motley County Farm Bureau with the theme "Inspection plus Correction Equals Protection"; and

WHEREAS records show a notable and steady decline in the number and rate of accidents among farm people as a direct result of such worthwhile safety education program:

NOW, THEREFORE, I Elbert Reeves, County Judge of Motley County, do hereby designate the week of July 21-27, 1963, as FARM SAFETY WEEK and urge all farm families, persons, and organizations allied with agriculture to engage in a purposeful concerted effort to reduce further the number of farm, home, and highway accidents.

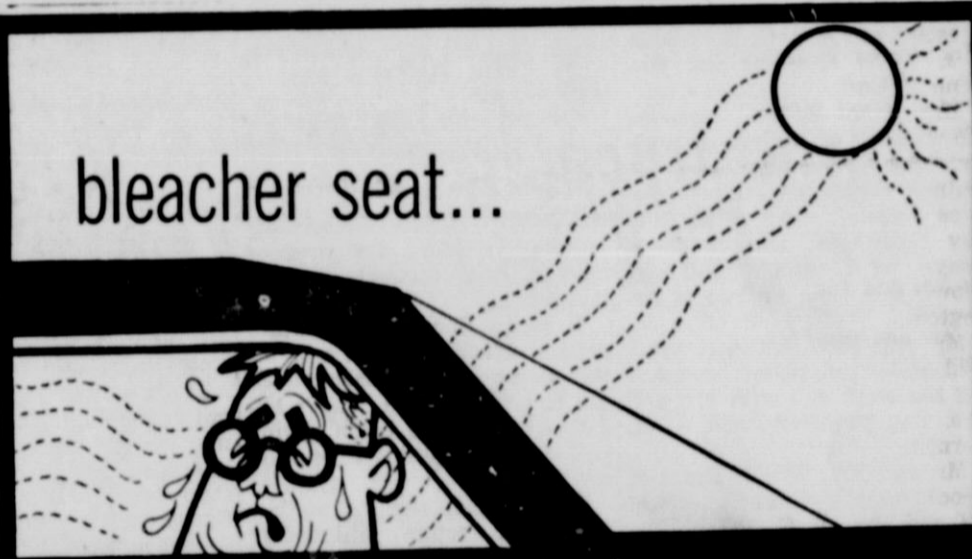

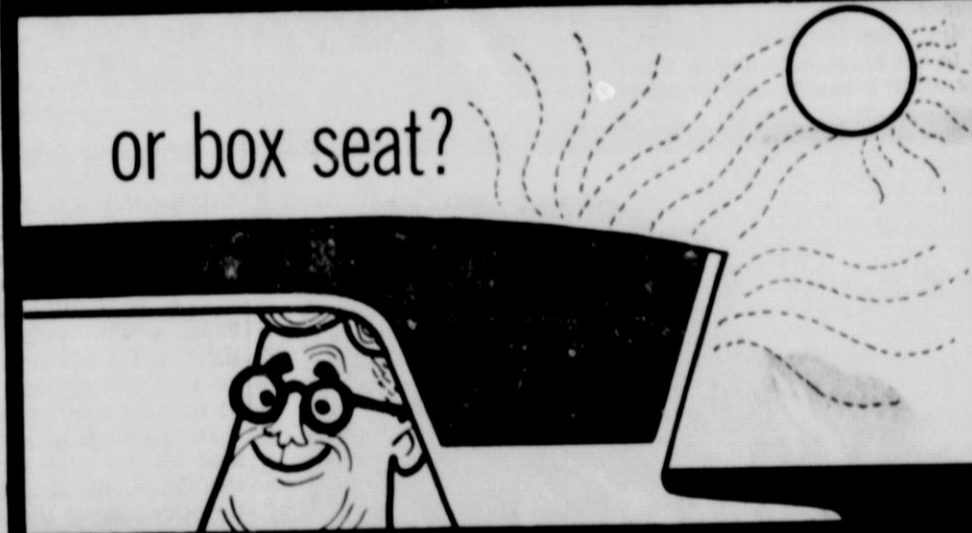

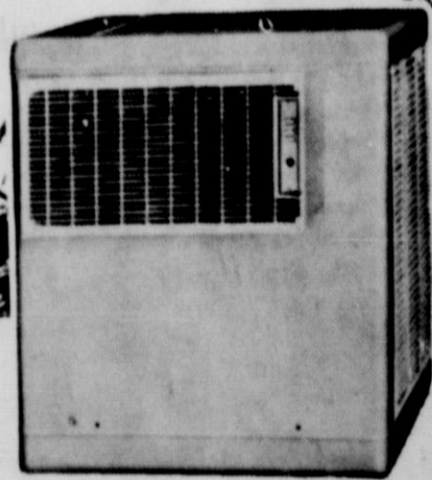
