A former pastor of the First Baptist Church of Matador, Rev. Bruce Oliver, together with his wife and four children will sail from New York the latter part of August (around the 25th) for Brazil. Rev. Oliver has been approved for appointment and assigned a three year tenure as a missionary in the town of Teresina, Pioul, Brazil which has a population of more than 100,000.

Teresina is located on the equator in the vicinity of the mouth of the Amazon River and is known as one of the "hottest places in the world."

He began his study at Southwestern Baptist Seminary in Fort Worth, while here, and resigned his pastorate to devote full time to his study and in preparation for missionary work. BOWL of an old buggy lamp, found by Melvin Dirickson, a cowboy on the Matador Ranch, in the Russellville area, may be the clue to a pioneer tragedy. In the same vicinity was found an iron buggy step which had been twisted.

The old lamp bowl of extremely early type is now in the collection of pioneer items belonging to Ed D. Smith, a Matador cowboy for over half a century, who is now retired.

Mr. Smith displayed his collection of pioneer items Monday night at the regular meeting of Fleming Post American Legion, as a part of the program following the joint covered dish supper held with the auxiliary.

Foreign Observers Study Ranges Here

STUDY OF MOTLEY COUNTY range conditions and brush control practices was made recently by two foreign observers. One of the visitors was Laurie Louwrens, regional and extension officer of the Federal Department of Conservation and Extension for Rhodesia and Nyasaland, Southern Rhodesia, South East Africa. The other visitor was Marcelo O. Mendes, veterinarian and extension livestock specialist, Rio de Janeiro. They visited seven ranches here June 25.

Their guides were Bobby Joe Ragsdale, A & M Extension range specialist and County Agent Bill Palmmeier.

The morning tour of brush control demonstrations was accompanied by 15 local ranchers and interested spectators.

Stops were made on the Matador Ranch east of town near the Paul Patton farm where root plowing and range reseeding were observed. Next stop was on the former Matador Ranch off the Northfield road where shiner control test plots were observed. Chemical used here was Fenuron.

A stop was made on the J. P. Sturdivant place north of town where the group witnessed the results of stump treatment of mesquite that had been cut down.

Visit Burleson Ranch
The group visited the J. C. (Doc) Burleson ranch where the results of sprayed this year were observed. Final stop was the Hope Fish ranch in the White Star area where reseeding after mesquite had been dozed, was observed.

Results of chaining were also noted, with the trip allowing those on the tour to see the results of different methods of brush control available.

During the afternoon the visitors made a study of grasses and range plants, with 4-H boys on the Harold Campbell and Matador ranches.

FORMER COUNTY RESIDENT DIES

A heart attack Thursday at about 1:30 p. m. claimed the life of W. A. Campbell, 69, at his farm home near Floydada, where he had resided since 1945. He was a former Motley County resident.

Mr. Campbell was born June 21, 1890 in Coleman County, where he grew to manhood and married Miss Laura Scott on Nov. 28, 1908. They came to Motley County in 1914 and lived on the H. H. Campbell ranch for six years. Later they lived in the Darden Canyon community and also in Roaring Springs before moving to Floyd County.

Survivors include his wife, Mrs. W.A. Campbell, one daughter, Mrs. T.E. Hunter; two sons, David and Maurice Campbell, and six grandchildren, all of whom live in Floydada and the vicinity.

Social Security Changes Affect Disabled Persons

One of the recent changes in the Social Security Act now makes possible monthly checks for dependents of a person between 50 and 65 who is receiving disability insurance benefits, according to John G. Hutton, social security manager at Lubbock, Texas.

If the disabled person has a child under 18, a disabled child over 18 whose disability began before age 18, or a wife over 62, an application for social security benefits should be filed. If a child qualified for benefits, the mother also may qualify, regardless of her age, if the child is in her care.

If the disabled person is a woman who has a husband over 65 who was dependent on her for support, he also may be eligible for payments.

Hutton suggests that persons who may be affected by these changes get in touch with his office immediately.

Miss Sue Glenn Spends Colorful Fourth In Venice while Making European Tour

Among Texans abroad who celebrated the Fourth of July holiday on foreign soil, was Miss Sue Glenn of Matador, whose itinerary scheduled her for a visit to Venice, "heart of the Adriatic" for three days, July 4-6.

Miss Glenn left Matador June 13 for a 57 days tour of 11 European countries, several of which she had visited on a previous trip.

She flew from New York City to London, on June 19 where she joined her group, led by Mrs. Alan Strout, of the English department at Texas Tech, Lubbock.

First stop on the trip was Stratford-on-Avon, where she attended a performance at Shakespeare Memorial Theatre, visited Shakespeare's home, Trinity Church, Warwick Castle and Ann Hathaway's Cottage. Returning to London for a day of sightseeing there, they left by train and night steamer for Holland and a sightseeing tour of Amsterdam.

Motoring to Cologne, Germany, the party visited the world-famous Cathedral, continued to Bonn, capital of West Germany, and sailed on a Rhine steamer from Koblenz to Wiesbaden. Traveling to Bern, the Swiss capital and continuing to Interlaken for a day of leisure, they then drove through Susten Pass to Lucerne and from there to Innsbruck in the Tyrol, where they enjoyed watching the Tyrolean dancing.

July 1 found the group at Salzburg, home of Mozart and the Music Festival, with an evening at the theatre.

Following their three-days sojourn in Venice, the tour motored to Rimini, Italy and continued to Rome on Tuesday, July 7 for three days there. From here they went to Florence, Rapallo, Monte Carlo, Nice, Avignon and Nimes, France.

Itinerary from July 16-23 covers a tour of cities and provinces in Spain, including Barcelona, Valencia, Madrid and Zaragoza. Returning to France July 24 the tour will continue through Loudres, Biarritz, Marseilles and Paris, and will sail from Le Havre on July 29. Arriving in Montreal August 5, Miss Glenn plans to spend several days sightseeing in Canada and will then join Escorted Tours in Albany, N. Y. for a 7-day tour of New England states.

Returning to New York City, she will visit there for several days before leaving for home August 20.
