Costliest Drug of All

The HIGHLANDER, weekly newspaper in Marble Falls, recently featured the following editorial - which TEXAS PHARMACY believes worthy of reprinting.

An ancient saw tells us that figures can't lie, but liars can figure.

One is reminded of this by the continuing charge that sufferers are being robbed by scandalous profits made by the pharmaceutical industry, and that it is high time and then some that the government did something drastic about it. Instances were offered in evidence to show that some extremely successful and widely used drugs have presented their discoverers and producers with very handsome returns.

This is a way of taking facts out of context. Nothing is said of the vast number of research projects which fail-no one can guarantee success when he ventures into the unexplored-leaving their backers with heavy out-of-pocket loses. Nothing is said of the number of available drugs which have an extremely small sale, but which are kept in production on a profitless or even a loss basis in order to help a limited number of sufferers from rare and obscure diseases. Nothing is said of the enormous and costly research programs the industry supports, and must support if new, better and more valuable remedies are to be found, tested and marketed. These programs now cost some \$250 million a year - and what they are doing and will do for the minds and bodies of sufferers from disease can never be measured in terms of money.

Finally, it is always implied, if no directly stated, that drug prices soar. The facts: Since 1949 the government's own consumer price index shows a rise in price for all commodities of 29 per cent. But the cost of prescription drugs fell 13 per cent.


